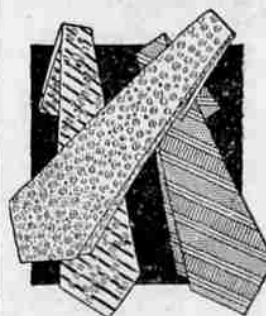
Visitor Leaves for Seattle—

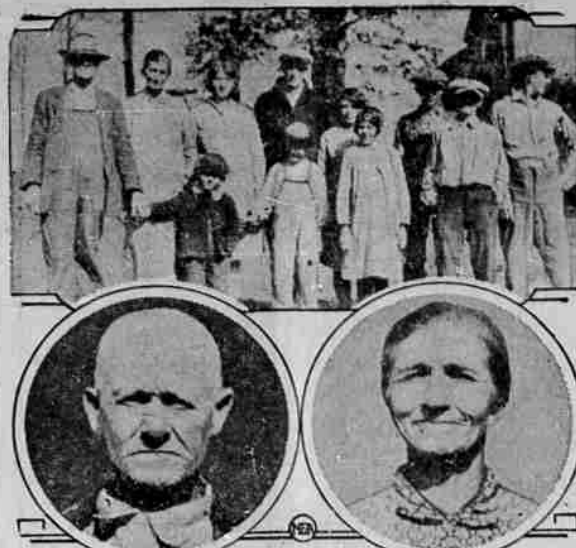
Captain Osborn Home—

CANADIANS STUDY I'M ALONE SINKING BY AMERICAN BOAT

WASHINGTON, Mar. 27.—Official reports of the British consulate at New Orleans on the sinking last Friday of the Canadian rum runner 'I'm Alone' were received today by the Canadian legation.

It was said at the legation that the only point in the reports which has been studied so far is that of the distance of the 'I'm Alone' from shore when first hailed by the coast guard cutter Wolcott.

Diplomatic circles said there is a possibility that the case may not reach the point of diplomatic representations by the Canadian government since, if it is established that the 'I'm Alone' was inside American jurisdiction, the case probably would not be pressed. In case the ship was proven to be outside American territorial waters, it was believed, probably that the state department would acknowledge the Canadian position and take steps to have the matter settled.

Britten Criticized.

Chairman Britten of the house naval committee today declared the situation created by the sinking of the 'I'm Alone' was very serious.

"If the United States government is going to chase vessels 200 miles off the coast and sink them because they are suspected of rum running," Britten said, "it will be able to chase them through the English channel and into the North Sea and sink them."

"Such acts as this lead to war. I would not be surprised if the incident would result in very strained relations between the United States and Canadian and British governments."

Britten said that if any government desired to pursue the practice of using force such as was carried out in the 'I'm Alone' affair, it should have the largest navy in the world so that it could dictate terms to other governments.

tion could provide something equally as good for controlling the agricultural surplus without subsidizing the farmers of the nation. But, he added, his organization had found nothing else that would insure the refund of money provided by the government for stabilizing prices.

Hoover Spokesman
George Shipley, of Washington, who described himself as a philanthropist and able to present the views of President Hoover, said the president favored a federal farm board to provide self regulation for the farmers. He read at length from the campaign speeches of the president.

The farm board idea was advanced also at the senate agriculture committee hearings by several witnesses who said the board should have broad powers along production and marketing lines.

J. P. Hill of Indiana, president of the Farmers National Grain Dealers association, said the laws relating to rural credits should be strengthened and expanded so that the farmer could more easily obtain loans.

A certification of irrigation and drainage so as not to bring more land under cultivation at this time was suggested by John J. Dillon, publisher of the Rural New Yorker. He also advocated a strong federal board with board powers to deal with cooperative associations in the marketing of crops.

The general phases of the McNary bill which provides for a federal board and stabilization agencies, were endorsed by Harvie Jordan, of Greenville, S. C., representing the American Cotton association.

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., was added today to the list of magnates invited to give their views on farm relief before the committee.

Chairman McNary said that he had invited Rockefeller along with Henry Ford, Charles M. Schwab, J. P. Morgan, Paul M. Warburg and Owen D. Young.

GOVERNOR LONG OF LOUISIANA LOSES ROUND WITH FOES

BATON ROUGE, La., Mar. 27.—Political lines were awry today as a great push started in the state legislature to drive Governor Huey P. Long from office on impeachment charges, embracing 19 counts, including one to plot murder.

Fighting the battle of his tumultuous political life, the 38-year-old governor struck back sternly and silently under the handicap of his thinning ranks. He went down to defeat in his first major counter attack when he lost in his attempt to adjourn the legislature by a vote of 38 to 55.

As the smoke of battle cleared away, he found himself face to face with impeachment charges and the house of representatives prepared to take them up at this morning's session to determine if he will be brought to trial before the state senate, sitting as a high tribunal with the chief justice of the state supreme court presiding.

For weeks his opponents, bitter at his official actions, have been working toward this end but they held back through fear they could not muster the necessary two-thirds majority for impeachment. But developments of recent days, including desertion from the Long ship of state of virtually the entire press of Louisiana, have given them hope and they will enter the arena today bent on a kill.

The administration forces, however, believe they can muster sufficient strength to their cause to thwart impeachment efforts. They brand the charges as "political."
