ROSEBURG GIRL IS ON DEBATE TEAM
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LANZA BRYANT'S CASE EXPECTED TO GO TO JURY TODAY

State Offers Rebuttal on Basis of Evidence That Accused Youth Made Death Threats.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Mar. 28.—The case of Lanza Bryant, 20-year-old town boy, charged with the murder of Lewis (Bill) Dickerson, Oregon State college football star, is expected to go to the jury sometime today. Both sides rested late yesterday, and this morning the prosecution followed with rebuttal based on testimony of Bryant's brothers that he had made advance threats against Dickerson's life.

Rebuttal is predicated further on certain testimony of Miss Mae Troxel, the waitress over whom Bryant and Dickerson had their fight in this city on the night of December 17 last. Miss Troxel testified that Bryant told her the two butcher knives he carried were to "kill somebody's car."

Bryant, formerly engaged to Miss Troxel, claimed he stabbed Dickerson in self-defense and to protect the girl from Dickerson's "advances." The state branded Bryant as a willful murderer who slew the football star in a fit of jealousy.

The girl's story. On the witness stand yesterday, Miss Troxel testified that at one time she had an affection for Bryant but said this affection had cooled last fall after he had accused her of coining to parties and dances with other men.

The state charges Bryant with having attacked Dickerson in a fit of jealousy.

The state through Miss Troxel introduced evidence tending to show that Bryant had removed his coat before reaching Dickerson and Miss Troxel and that he struck first with his left fist to Dickerson's face, the blow glancing off and striking the girl. The two men then grappled and Dickerson, whose revolver that he was stabbed, Miss Troxel testified that she went with him to his boarding place five blocks away, accompanying him over his protest. Dickerson died five days later.

Miss Troxel denied that Bryant had had a date with her that night and said she believed he had been drinking.

Under cross-examination she admitted having sent Bryant a Thanksgiving day card addressed to "my sweetheart."

The stabbing occurred a few minutes after midnight on December 17.

Liquor Figures. William Gates, a friend of Bryant, who was present when Dickerson was stabbed, said Bryant declared: "I guess I cut that—up pretty bad. Next time I'll use a gun."

Three other witnesses produced by the prosecution offered testimony tending to show that Bryant had been drinking on the night on which Dickerson was mortally wounded.

In cross-examination the defense sought to show that Miss Troxel and Bryant were engaged and that Bryant's use of the knife was in self-defense after Dickerson had first attacked him.

Apparent evacuation of the town of Jimenez in southeastern Chihuahua was reported by federal airplanes today.

The insurgents were proceeding northward in the direction of the rebel stronghold of Chihuahua and the government looked for a battle at point south of that city.

The rebels, on the other hand, indicated that a clash was expected in the vicinity of Jimenez, no confirmation being given of the reported evacuation of that town.

General Escobar, rebel commander-in-chief, has repeatedly asserted that he would lead an advance on Mexico City itself.

Otherwise a strict censorship veiled the plans of the insurgents.

Federal relief forces were expected to reach Matamoros on the west coast today, relieving the garrison which successfully held off a rebel attack early this week.

The governor of the northern district of Lower California today denied that loyal Mexican troops had been transported across Arizona territory to reach Naco, where a federal garrison is holding out.

The federals at Naco, strongly entrenched, were still awaiting a long delayed attack by the rebels encamped ten miles away. Unless an attack develops soon, they declared they would start "some activity" themselves.

K. of C. Are Target. MEXICO CITY, Mar. 28.—Alberto Terrones Benites, provisional governor of Durango, in a message to the government, said: "We are taking drastic measures against the Knights of Columbus of Durango City who are acting as spies for the rebels and Cristeros."

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He also said he was mobilizing Durango Agrarians to combat the "Cristeros."

"Cristeros" is a name applied in some parts of Mexico to those so-called religious insurgents who use the battle cry "Viva Cristo Rey" or "Long live Christ, King."

Federals Take Sasabe. TUCSON, Ariz., Mar. 28.—In a brief fight early today, Mexican federal troops captured a small rebel post across the international line from Sasabe, Arizona, the United States immigration office announced here.

The federals were believed to have come from San Luis, Sonora, swooping down upon the rebel forces at Mesquite, which is 20 miles west of Nogales, Sonora.

wall before dropping in a heap in the northeast corner of the room and the other hit the ceiling before landing in the opposite corner. Steiner's body was blown backward from the gaping hole in the floor that marked the scene of the tragedy.

The large frame farm house was a virtual wreck from the terrific blast. All windows were blown out and the meagre amount of furniture tossed about the room. Part of the wing in which the three lost their lives was caved in and the door and small porch were demolished. One tiny limb was found outside the house beneath the timbers while a portion of Geck was found in the front yard near the road, about 100 feet away. The house is located on the old Peter Christensen place, half way between the Grassy Pond school house, on the Mt. Angel-Woodburn highway, and Monitor.

Steiner's actions in the past have never caused any comment by neighbors. It was stated, and he appeared normal other than to be the possessor of a temper and on occasion showing signs of jealousy toward his 25-year-old wife, Lucille, was concerned.

day that such travelers are granted the courtesy of the port and that if they bring in liquor, it is a "matter for their own conscience."

Representative Wm. M. Morgan of Ohio, one of the Panama party, denied here last night that he knew of any intoxicants being found in the party's baggage by customs men.

Assistant Secretary Lowman said that returning members of congress are granted the freedom of the port and that the practice generally means that their baggage is not examined.

"This does not mean that he can bring in liquor, narcotics or other contraband," he said, "but the chances of detection are remote when he has freedom of the port."

"I do not know whether congressmen have abused this privilege, it is a matter for their own conscience. It is very clear, however, that a congressman going to the canal zone except as a member of a congressional committee, is not entitled to the freedom of the port and his baggage is subject to examination."
