TWELVE CARS OF BROCCOLI HAVE BEEN SHIPPED

qua valley must keep up its quality in order to preserve a safe market. Growers are, therefore, being urged to keep up the quality of their shipments in order to safeguard the reputation for quality.

Out of the twelve cars shipped up to the present time nine cars have been loaded in Roseburg by the Umpqua Broccoli Exchange and three have been shipped from Myrtle Creek by the South Douglas pool. Fred Hamilton, local buyer, is getting out a carload today. The Edenhovser warehouse of the Umpqua Broccoli Growers will be opened next week and packing started there, it is expected.

So far the market has been quite satisfactory. The bulk of the California crop has been moved, and as the peak of the local harvest has not yet been reached, the outlook is quite encouraging.

Cannery is Working

The local cannery is also active in canning broccoli and is operating part time each day. Up to the present time the cannery has not been able to secure as much broccoli as is needed and Mr. Norton states that he fears he will not be able to get out as large a pack as he had desired. There is a good market for canned broccoli, and the demand has been growing steadily since the cannery here developed the method of successfully canning the vegetable. It is, of course, impossible to pay prices that compete with the market on the "back" product, so that the supply for cannery purposes is limited. Mr. Norton is also building up a big trade on pickled broccoli, which is shipped in barrels. At the present time pickled broccoli is imported from Holland and the domestic trade is open for a large volume of broccoli from Oregon, as the mid-west can thereby compete with the Atlantic coast in prices.
