

ENDURANCE FLIGHT RECORD BROKEN BY MARTIN JENSEN

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Mar. 29.—Martin Jensen today holds an unofficial solo endurance flight record of 35 hours 33 minutes and 21 seconds.

The record was established when he landed at 4:34:55 p. m., yesterday, having been in the air eight minutes and 22 seconds longer than the time of the late Royal V. Thomsen.

It was unofficial because the National Aeronautical association does not list solo records. It keeps only one endurance record irrespective of the number in the plane and without regard to sex. Officials of the association, however, supervise and time solo endurance flights.

When Jensen landed he had one gallon of high test automobile gasoline left in his tanks. One object of his flight was to demonstrate that auto gas could be substituted for highly refined airplane fuel successfully.

He said he was not tired by the long hours alone in the air, adding that bumpy air currents both days had forced him to use his 40 gallons of gasoline more rapidly than he had expected, frustrating him in his plan to remain aloft 40 hours.

Jensen, who was second to Art Goebel in the Dole flight from San Francisco to Hawaii in 1927, was born in Kansas. He went into aviation when he joined the navy and resigned with the rank of ensign. He is 27 years old.

He flew a Bellanca monoplane powered with a 200 horsepower Wright whirlwind motor.

P. F. FARRINGTON, WELL KNOWN JOURNALIST, DIES

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 29.—Paul Payton Farrington, brilliant newspaperman, was found dead in bed in his room at the Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon. Death is believed to have been due to natural causes superinduced by a nervous breakdown.

Farrington was a native of Eugene. He had been employed by newspapers in Eugene, Salem, Portland, Klamath Falls, Butte, Mont., and Brooklyn, N. Y. He was 31 years old.

His ability as a stylist and feature writer brought him important

assignments, particularly while he was in the employ of the Brooklyn Times. His last employment was with the Salem Capital Journal.

He was a native of Eugene, the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Farrington, and in 1902 he was a member of Phi Delta Theta fraternity. He was in the service during the World war.

F. B. MEYER, NOTED FREE CHURCH LEADER, DIES

BOURNEMOUTH, Eng., Mar. 28.—The Rev. Frederick B. Meyer, noted free church leader who was widely known in the United States, died today. He was 81 years old.

The body will be taken to London for funeral services at Christ church, Westminster, where he was minister for many years. The body then will be brought back to Bournemouth for interment beside that of his wife.

Mr. Meyer was president of the National Federation of Free Churches in 1904 and 1920 and was president of the Baptist union in 1906.

PERRY JOHN FOUND GUILTY OF MURDER IN 2ND DEGREE

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 29.—Perry John, Klamath Indian, was convicted of murder in the second degree by a federal court jury here today. John was tried for the killing of William L. Ward, white fencer, near Chiloquin on February 7, last.

The maximum penalty is life imprisonment, and the minimum is ten years. The jury made no recommendation for leniency.

Sentence will be pronounced in federal court on April 8.

Ward was stabbed to death in a drinking party in a cabin near Chiloquin. The defense attempted to show that Clara Weeks, an Indian woman, was responsible for the death. Testimony placed her in the cabin at the time of the killing.

LOUGHRAN BEATS MICKEY WALKER BY 2 TO 1 DECISION

CHICAGO, Mar. 29.—Tommy Loughran, boxer courageous, still rules the light heavyweights of the world.

Throwing up his most formidable defensive weapon, a straight left jab, the Philadelphia Irishman easily retained his crown last night by routing the heavy first midweight champion, Mickey Walker, over the 10-round route in the new \$7,000,000 Chicago stadium.

The battle, strictly one between a good big man in Loughran and a mighty little man in Walker, was fought before 20,000 spectators, who paid approximately \$175,000 to see it.

Loughran obtained the verdict of the two juries. The referee, Davey Miller, cast his ballot for the challenger, whose dream of equalling the triple ring title record of the great Bob Fitzsimmons was shattered.

Boxer Beats Slugger

Loughran won because he was a superb boxer. He waged a running, jabbing fight and belted Walker with resounding smacks whenever the New Jersey Bulldog made his characteristic, two-fisted rush.

Loughran never had Mickey in trouble, and was content to pile up his wide margin by his brilliant boxing skill.

Walker had but one chance last night. That was in the fifth round when he nailed the champion with a terrific right cross to the jaw. Loughran reeled, his eyes were glassy and he appeared to be in pain. Sensing victory, the Bulldog rushed, aiming his flying fists at the same spot. But Loughran, always a smart fighter, tied him up each time, shook the cobwebs from his brain and stalled the nearly disastrous round out.

The fight itself was a disappointment to the large crowd, the largest indoor fight assembly in Chicago's history, because of its purely defensive nature.

Loughran Loses Money

Financially, it was a loss for Loughran. Under the terms of his contract, he received 55 per cent of approximately \$67,000. Out of

this, he had to pay Walker \$50,000 and \$13,000 to Leo Lomaki and Tuffy Griffith, who fought a rollicking 10-round semi-windup. Thus, he had left a gross profit of but \$4,000 for himself, his manager and for expenses.

Morally, however, it was a big night for Loughran. Not only did he retain his title, but his victory kept him in the rank of the outstanding contenders for the vacant heavyweight throne. Defeat would have dropped him definitely from consideration there.

For Paddy Harmon, product of Chicago's east house district, the program was the realization of his lifetime dream—the successful opening of the stadium, the largest and most luxurious sports amphitheatre in the world.

Almost Another Riot

But for his alertness, however, this great dream might have been blasted. Just before the show opened, some roofing and paint of tar on the top of the huge grey stone building caught fire, creating a mild stir among thousands who remembered the riot in the coliseum at the Jackie Fields-Young Jack Thompson fight just four nights before.

The battle between Lomaki and Griffith, which Griffith won, was the highlight of the program. They traded heavy smashes for 10 rounds and the crowd roared its approval. By his victory, Griffith won a promise from Harmon for a match with Loughran for the title.

Stadium De Luxe

The fight was fought before a crowd, many members of which were dressed in formal attire. It gave Chicago fans their first home town glimpse of the latest style ring, with its 36 specially-cooled, 1500-watt lights boring down on the fighters; of drifty water fountains, a la dentist's office, to refresh the batters between rounds; of an auditorium with flaming red chairs—nearly 25,000 of them on the main floor and in the two balconies; and a score more innovations aimed to put professional boxing on a big business basis in the middle west.

STILL UNABLE TO GET DATE FOR THE GEORGIE DIXON GO

Further postponement of the Dixon-Johnson fight was announced today by Clyde Ward, local boxing promoter. Mr. Ward talked with Dixon last night over long distance telephone, and the Portland colored boy states that his hand is still weak and that he is afraid to risk it in a hard fight.

He is working hard to get the hand back into condition, but it still gives him considerable pain when he tries to punch the heavy bags. The hand was broken several weeks ago in the fight with Homer Sherman and has been very slow in healing. Dixon realizes that he will have a hard fight with Olympia Kid Johnson and so wants to have his hand back in perfect shape.

Dixon, however, assured Mr. Ward that he will not contract any fight until he has met the Roseburg engagement. He expressed his appreciation of the courtesy given him by the local promoter in postponing the fight and not trying to force him into a match before the hand had healed and stated emphatically that he would appear against Johnson at the earliest possible date.

He expressed the belief that it would be possible for him to fight about the 10th of April.

Three of the other bouts for the card have been arranged by Mr. Ward. In the 6-round semi-final, Austin Pendergrass, the popular Roseburg boxer, will meet Orlando Farmer of Eugene. Each of the boys has a victory to his credit, so that their third match, over the 6-round route, will undoubtedly be a fight well worth seeing.

The 4-round special event will be fought between "Tiger" Dunn of Roseburg and Buzz Landles of Eugene. Landles recently fought a draw with Billy Church of Portland on the Portland card, and if Dunn can make the grade against the Eugene boy he will be able to step out into the semi-final class anywhere in the state.

Young Franco, of Umpqua Park, and Battling Judd, of Roseburg, will stage a 4-round preliminary, and there will also be a snappy curtain raiser.
