LIQUOR CHARGE HITS LAWMAKER BACKED BY DRYS

his office would be closed all day today because of the Good Friday holiday.

Backed by Dry League CHICAGO, Mar. 29.—Congressman M. Alfred Michaelson, of Chicago, indicted on charges of violating the national prohibition act at Jacksonville, Fla., has been backed in his political career by the Anti-Saloon league and he has voted for several laws favored by the league, including the Jones law.

Michaelson was first elected to represent the seventh Illinois district in 1920 with the backing of the organization headed by Mayor "Big Bill" Thompson. He had served two terms as city alderman.

Native of Norway
Born in Norway in 1878, Michaelson came to this country at the age of 7. He was educated in Chicago and taught in public schools here from 1898 to 1914.

Congressman Michaelson's name was mentioned several times in the investigation of real estate expert Joe Coates and during his campaign of 1924, though nothing came of it.

A capias for Rep. Michaelson's arrest is in the office of the district attorney here. The congressman is expected to appear there in a few days to make bond. George E. O. Johnson, district attorney, refused to make any comment.

Miss Troxel, a pretty brown-haired waitress, had "kept company" for several months. They became engaged. Bryant went to Washington to work and letters followed from Miss Troxel.

When he returned, testimony indicated, he started drinking and more than once the pretty waitress remonstrated.

One night when Miss Troxel feared Bryant, she asked Dickerson to accompany her home. That night Bryant armed himself with a butcher knife and waylaid them. He contended the knife was to be used at a picnic, but Miss Troxel said the knife, according to Bryant, was to be used to "slit somebody's back."

Bryant accepted the verdict stoically. His mother collapsed. Sentence will be passed next Monday morning.

Slain Man Popular

Dickerson's home was at Weiser, Idaho. He played football for Oregon State in 1924, 1925 and 1926, and was rated as an all-coast star several times, as well as receiving all-American mention. He was one of the most popular students at the college. While completing his work for his degree he was working as an assistant freshman coach. He stood 6 feet 5 inches and weighed 220 pounds. He was a member of the Sigma Chi fraternity.

Bryant was a native of Oklahoma.

COOPERATION IN SAVING LIFE OF GAME IS URGED

or not trout follow salmon runs, a question that has agitated sportsmen of varying opinions for several years, was argued, and the question of commercial fishing also came in for much discussion.

Senator Ed Miller, of Josephine county, declared vehemently for conservation not only of the wild life, but of the scenic beauties of the state, the forests and the streams, arguing that they be kept in their natural state to provide greater recreation. He urged that the pressure on timber owners to force them to cut their timber, be relieved, so that the forests might be preserved. He also spoke for the restocking of streams, particularly the South Umpqua, which he pointed out, was at one time a great fishing stream, but which is now practically devoid of game fish. This, in his opinion, is due to the fact that the net fishing at the mouth of the Umpqua has destroyed the salmon that formerly came up the river bringing the trout with them. Two-thirds of the so-called trout caught in Oregon streams are steelhead or silver-salmon returning to the sea from the spawning beds. Senator Miller declared.

Fish on Decrease

Ralph Cowgill, of Medford, who has been making a fish survey for the fish and game commission, made a very startling statement when he said that for the past 15 years the state has liberated from 90 to 100 fish for every one caught. Under natural spawning conditions, he stated, the female salmon lays an average of 4,500 eggs, but so great is the loss that only three of the fry ever reach maturity. The natural enemies of the fish, the foxes, predatory fish and animals, destruction of the eggs, the all cause heavy losses, but in late years men have added to the destruction through irrigation ditches, pollution of streams, power development, etc., so that the increase is below the percentage of loss. Then in addition to all of this the commercial interests have been taking out tons of salmon until the take last year was only one-ninth of what it was a few years ago.

Some plan must be worked out, he declared, whereby a balance can be obtained that will provide for an increase in the number of fish. He spoke of the development of electric seines, fish lifts, and other devices that are being created to prevent wholesale destruction.

Organization Discussed

Practically every speaker during the evening pointed out the need for an efficient state organization, sufficiently financed to be able to carry out programs for fish preservation.

C. A. Lockwood, of Roseburg, president of the Oregon State Sportmen's association, outlined the means by which it is hoped to obtain these results. It is proposed to increase the dues to the local clubs to \$3 per year. At present most of the clubs have a \$1 membership. The money will be divided \$1 to the local club and a similar amount to the state organization, while a subscription to the sportmen's magazine, "Western Outdoors," will be paid by the remainder.

At present, Mr. Lockwood stated, there are 17,000 men enrolled in Oregon in various sportmen's organizations. This number can be greatly increased, he stated, urging that each club put on vigorous membership drives.

Oregon, Mr. Lockwood says, is rapidly gaining a reputation as being a wonderful playground and an increasing number of tourists come to the state each year. This is rapidly becoming an important industry. It is not only a matter connected with pleasure to preserve the fish and wild life of the state, but it is a monetary affair, for the state realizes hundreds of thousands of dollars annually from the tourists who visit Oregon. It is impossible to hatch enough fish to restock the streams, he declared, and therefore it is necessary to have regulations that will reduce the destruction to a point where the streams can be restocked naturally. At present, he pointed out, deer and trappers take the fish from the feeding grounds, and the commercial fishermen in the rivers strip the spawning beds, so that the fish have no chance.
