Victor Hugo's Immortal Story "The Man Who Laughs" at Antlers Sunday

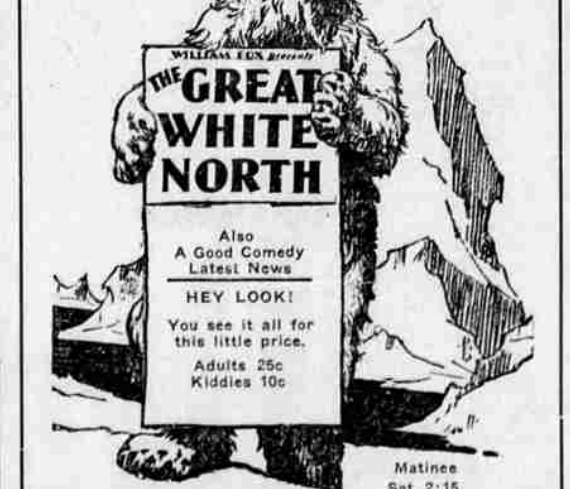
