Hero's Captive Aids Medal Plea



Ten years after the war, a rival to Sergeant Alvin York, famous hero, has been discovered. Lewis Poppe of New Bremen, Ohio, above, has been revealed as the unnamed single-handed captor of 17 German soldiers at an outpost in France on Oct. 9, 1918. Max Christochowicz, below, German veteran who headed the captured squad, bears out his story, and is aiding in an effort to give him a medal. Poppe, going for water, came upon the Germans in a dugout and bluffed them into surrendering by telling them he had 50 Americans at his back. Later Poppe and Christochowicz met in a hospital and became fast friends. With the result that after the war Poppe induced him to come to this country. Christochowicz is now an accountant in Lima, Ohio.

Gigantic Farm Employs Alabama's Convicts

Abolishment of Inhuman Mining System Leads to Project in Agriculture.

Alabama has turned to agriculture for solution of its convict labor problem. A gigantic farm project, designed to supply work for at least 1,000 prisoners, calls for the early planting of from 8,000 to 9,000 acres of cotton, corn and other crops on land at four major prisons.

Abolishment of the convict leasing system under Gov. Bibb Graves brought more than 4,000 prisoners out of the mines and ended a labor that had become traditional in Alabama. At the same time it confronted the state board of administration with the serious task of finding employment for the convicts. For a time they were transferred from the mining settlements to "road camps" where they were put to work on the extensive road building program that also had been a part of Governor Graves' campaign platform.

The program slackened, and while legislators are advocating a special session of the state assembly to authorize a road bond issue, the prison man power has been turned into agricultural channels.

In accord with the plans of Alabama growers to enlarge the state's strawberry industry, the prison department will devote a large acreage to the Altmore prison farm to berry production. It coincides with the state department of agriculture's desire to make Alabama a leading strawberry state following inauguration of state-federal inspection service and the interstate commerce commission's granting of express refrigerator car service for Alabama strawberries.

A canning factory, to supply all state prisons with vegetables, is to be erected on one of the penitentiary farms.

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FRESH EVIDENCE AGAINST ILLEGAL DETECTIVE FIRM

(Associated Press Local Wire)
PORTLAND, Ore., April 2.—A new branch of the "state detective agency" activities of P. N. Forsythe, ex-policeman now in jail on extortion charges, was uncovered by police here today.

Ben Mager told investigators that Forsythe had taken money from him as a fee for procuring his agency and had told him to go out and sell protection contracts to merchants in the downtown districts.

Forsythe told him, Mager said, that he had a number of "operatives" doing that work and that he could charge the merchants whatever he could get in return for promises of burglar protection. The fees collected from this activity were to be split between Forsythe and Mager.

Forsythe's attorney said today the man would waive preliminary hearing and would go directly to the grand jury.

Carl Miller, Ellsworth Martin and Clifford Hayes, held under arrest as accomplices of Forsythe, had not decided today whether they would waive hearings.

CONFESSION FROM ALLEGED DIAMOND THIEF IS DENIED

TOPEKA, Kans., Apr. 2.—Mike ("Black Mike") Marino today denied through two sources his purported admission that he had participated in the theft of diamonds valued at \$400,000 from a jewelry salesman in San Francisco last week.

After talking to the robbery suspect, R. L. Thurman, Kansas City police detective, late yesterday said Marino admitted he had participated in the theft, saying "It was the sweetest job I ever pulled." Marino was quoted as saying he and John Schopen, also charged with the theft, had trailed Harry Amols, New York salesman, from Kansas City to San Francisco where Amols, on being called by name by Marino, handed over the jewels.

Denial of the admission was made today by Marino's attorney, Charles Rooney, following an announcement from Sheriff Wayne Horning that "Black Mike" had denied he had admitted anything to the Kansas City detectives.

The two robbery suspects were arrested here as they stepped from an eastbound Union Pacific passenger train.
