

BEAVERS' WINNING STREAK BROKEN BY 'FRISCO SUNDAY

SAN FRANCISCO, April 1.—Ball clubs of the Pacific Coast league spent a hectic season yesterday, the Seals breaking the winning streak of the Portland Beavers, the Angels taking two in a double header from the Indians, the Senators at Sacramento winning both from the Hollywood Stars, and the Oaks winning a couple with the Missions. In the latter game a near riot occurred when Empire Kells delivered a decision in the ninth that gave the Oaks the game and series.

The Seals won the afternoon game from Portland five to nothing. Portland won the morning game four to five and eleven. The Seals won four of seven.

Nick Williams sent Sam Laufford, Seals centerfielder, to the bench in the afternoon game because the Sox failed to find Laufford hitting stride, and Jerry Donovan replaced him, socking out a home run that brought two tallies.

The Beavers took the morning game in the eighth. With one man out, Hills singled, Keesey's infield out moved him to second, and he scored Jahn with the winning hit. The Seals won the afternoon game five to seven.

The Oaks blasted the hopes of the Missions by taking the first week's series four games to three. The Missions won in the morning four to three, and the Oaks came back in the afternoon by the same score. The Missions clinched out 13 hits off Harst and Daglia in the morning. The teams went scoreless five innings in the afternoon and the Oaks went into a permanent lead in the sixth with a three run flurry.

Los Angeles took the morning game from Seattle 16 to 6, and repeated the winning process 7 to 3 in the afternoon. The Angels scored 9 runs off Jim Edwards in three innings during the opening, and despite the substitution of Cipriani, Lamansky and Ault, continued their heavy hitting.

Sacramento won the morning game from the Stars 7 to 3, and came back later to win 12 to 7. The Solon sluggers were credited with having won both games with attacks which Hulvey, Clisterfield and Marty were unable to withstand.

This week the Missions will play the Seals here; Seattle will play in Oakland; Portland will play at Sacramento, and Los Angeles and Hollywood will meet in Los Angeles.

Sacramento, Portland and Los Angeles are tied for first place in the series.

FAKE DETECTIVES GET "HUSH" COIN IN PORTLAND DENS

PORTLAND, Ore., April 1.—A "detective" bureau that riddled gambling dens and brothels on Portland's waterfront, extracted "protection money" and split the proceeds among the "operatives," had been broken by the police and sheriff here today. Police headquarters announced that signed confessions had been made by E. R. Martin, 31, and Clifford Hayes, 41, who said they were "operatives" of the "state detective bureau."

The state detective bureau is unlicensed by the state and has no official status.

Martin and Hayes said P. N. Forsythe, 57, ex-policeman and former ship carpenter, was head of the bureau. Police were searching for Forsythe today.

The confessions of Martin and Hayes revealed the operations of the bureau and told of three "ralls" made by the men during the past week.

Martin told police he had to pay Forsythe \$25 to become a "state detective." The three ralls netted Martin \$100, he said, that sum representing one-fourth of the total bribe money.

Both Hayes and Martin insisted they had been duped by Forsythe. They believed, they said, that they had full legal right to make the ralls, and thought the bribe money was "legitimate graft."

During the ralls guns were held on the victims and large police stars flashed as a means of extracting "protection money," Hayes told his questioners.

ILLINOIS BOOZE FEUD BLAMED FOR MURDER OF 2 MEN

WILSONVILLE, Ill., April 1.—Rum rivalry was advanced by county authorities today as a motive for the slaying here yesterday afternoon of Frank Hines, 28, and his brother-in-law, Smith Tucker, 27, Wilsonville farmers.

The two men were shot to death as they drove into Wilsonville by an automobile load of men, who apparently had followed them from Chicago, a nearby mining town.

After the shooting, the slayers wheeled their car around and escaped in the same direction from which they came.

Three school boys saw the shooting, but were unable to tell how many were in the death car.

MONTANA COPPER MINERS NOW GETTING RECORD PAY

WILKINS PLANNING SUBMARINE TRIP THRU NORTH POLE

NEW YORK, April 2.—Sir Hubert Wilkins, polar explorer, announced yesterday he was considering a voyage across the north pole by submarine, possibly this summer or next.

Commander Simon Danenhower, technical expert of the Simon Lake Submarine company, who plans to navigate the craft, said the submarine which is to be used was being fitted out at the company's works at Bridgeport, Conn.

Sir Hubert said the idea of a submarine trip across the Arctic sea had been in the minds of submarine designers and explorers since 1899 when Simon Lake invented it. Stefansson and Peary both had considered it, he said.

"On the face of it," he said, "it seems risky. Still as a mathematician I consider it no more risky even less so than an airplane flight over the polar seas."

The submarine would be equipped with a special diving lock through which a diver might be sent out to blast the ship free of retaining ice, Danenhower said. It also would have a bar sloping over the bow to the conning tower to ease it under an unseen iceberg and carry a large quantity of chemicals to melt ice.

RECORDS OF TRIBE EXTINCT 1000 B. C. ARE UNDER STUDY

BERKELEY, Cal., April 1.—Preserved for three thousand years under 250 tons of debris in a Nevada mountain cave, the records of an extinct race are being studied by University of California anthropologists. Ten thousand specimens recovered from the grotto in a remarkable state of preservation are being regarded as the chronicles of a fighting, redheaded tribe of American Indians who were exterminated while Europe was still a howling wilderness.

The cavern is known as the Lovelock cave, a shelf-like niche in the hillside formed thousands of years ago by the wave action of an ancient lake, long since disappeared, which is still called by geologists Lake Lahontan. It is about 22 miles southwest of Lovelock.

The people who inhabited it are vaguely mentioned in Pite Indian legends as cannibalistic savages, devoid of fear, who were annihilated in a three-year war with the Pites about the year 1000 B. C.

Among the objects discovered, some of them buried under 14 feet of bat guano, were polished flint, material, including baskets and moccasins, wooden implements, weapons, sandals and other relics.

Professor A. L. Kroeber of the University of California declared the material almost wholly pre-Columbian, having strong relations with the native culture of California in historic times. He termed it immensely valuable because of the richness of the whole series of objects discovered.

CLYDE L. NANCE, MISSION TWIRLER, KILLED IN WRECK

MERCER, Cal., April 1.—Pitcher Clyde L. (Farmer) Nance, 21, of the San Francisco Mission baseball team, was killed Sunday in an automobile accident. Nance was enroute from Turlock to Fowler with T. J. Patton of Turlock. While driving at high speed at a point four miles south of here, according to authorities, who are investigating, Nance attempted to pass another machine without sounding his horn. The other car at the same moment swerved to the left to pass a preceding car without sounding its horn, Patton told officers. Nance's car was crowded from the highway and plunged into the ditch where it overturned. He died shortly after reaching the hospital. His companion was injured.

Nance had an excellent record as a pitcher and was expected to have developed into major league material. He came to the Mission club from the Seattle coast league club last year.

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TOD MORGAN MAY DROP HIS TITLE TO SANTIAGO ZORILLA

NEW YORK, April 1.—Tod Morgan, who holds the junior lightweight championship, and Santiago Zorilla, who will try to lift it, clash this week's fight feature. They meet Thursday night at Los Angeles.

The fight originally was carded for Tuesday night but a bolt on Morgan's leg forced a postponement until Thursday.

Never has a challenger entered a ring with more public backing than will Zorilla. From those who have seen him from the first to those who have only heard of him, the fans are with him to a man.

HARSH AND GALLAGLY RECEIVE LIFE TERMS

ATLANTA, Ga., April 1.—George R. Harsh and Richard G. Gallagly, wealthy former Oglethorpe university students, today pleaded guilty to murder and were sentenced to life imprisonment.

On agreement of Solicitor General John A. Boykin, the action was taken immediately after Harsh, member of a Milwaukee family, had been granted a new trial following his conviction and sentence to death for the murder of Willard Smith, a drug clerk, during a hold-up. At his previous trial he had

entered a plea of not guilty by reason of mental irresponsibility.
