## SLAUGHTER OF OIL AND GAS PERMITS IS TAKING PLACE

(Associated Press Special Wire)  
WASHINGTON, April 5.—Secre-tary Wilbur announced today that 1,223 permits to prospect for oil and gas on the public domain had been cancelled during the past week. In addition 1,350 holders of such permits were called upon to show cause why their permits should not be cancelled.  
Commissioner Spry of the gen-eral land office reported to the secretary that during the week 3,443 permits had been acted upon. During the first week of activity the interior department committee appointed to carry out President Hoover's oil conservation program, 1,618 such cases were handled, making the total number of cases acted upon to date 5,079.  
Of the pending applications for permits to prospects which the department had on file, 2,606 have been finally rejected and the cases closed.
