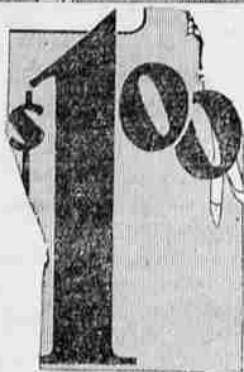

TOD MORGAN BEATS ZORILLA IN HARD 10-ROUND BATTLE

Superior Endurance Tells in Closing Stages and Enables Champion to Keep Title.

LOS ANGELES, April 5.—Tod Morgan might be the truest of the ring kings, but he also is the toughest of them all—in more ways than one.

The junior lightweight champion last night in the same Olympic auditorium ring, where in 1925, he battered Mike Hallerino, stocky Bayonne, N. J., ring man, almost senseless to win the 120 pound dream—thrust aside with decisive second title challenge.

Santiago Zorilla, 21-year-old native of the Panama jungles. The bushy haired San Blas Indian battled Morgan to a draw last December at San Francisco.

Morgan's victory over the dusky challenger gained at the cost of a badly slashed left eye, was his without question of a doubt. A crowd of 7,778 fans witnessed the titanic fray and few were the dissenting voices raised when Lieut. Jack Kennedy of the U. S. navy, lifted Morgan's hand. Ringsiders almost unanimously agreed that the title holder had won six of the ten rounds, gave one to Zorilla and labeled the remainder even.

Morgan, facing a tiring foe, took the last four rounds. The bobbing, weaving, kinky haired challenger made his biggest bid in the early rounds, but the pace, a fairly fast one, combined with Morgan's sharpshooting and great ring generalship combined to thwart him through the deciding rounds. Zorilla was continually boring in with gloves volleying punches, but Morgan scored heavily at long range with his stinging left hook and used a chopping right effectively, when in close.

Morgan's eye was cut in the second round, either by a bump from the black head of the challenger or from one of Zorilla's looping rights. The injury but spurred the champion on, and although Zorilla frequently landed to the cut, none appeared to trouble the titleholder.

Zorilla Fights Unfairly
Zorilla was warned several times by the referee against hitting low and butting with his head. In the clinches, in the ninth round Zorilla landed a low blow that caused Morgan to double up. After a brief pause to recuperate the champion signified willingness to continue.

Morgan has defended his crown 15 times since winning it December 2, 1925.

Women Oppose Dry Law
NEW YORK, April 5.—The New York Herald Tribune today quoted Mrs. George Orvis as saying her recent resignation as republican national committeewoman from Vermont was due to a desire to work for a change in the prohibition law.

"I believe it will be women who will in the end be responsible for the repeal of the eighteenth amendment," she said. "When it becomes clear to the men that women are not all dry, as is so often said, they will be willing to consider a change."

Mrs. Orvis announced her resignation several weeks ago, shortly after that of Mrs. Charles H. Sablin, committeewoman from New York. Mrs. Sablin later said she had quit to work against prohibition.

Dry Agent to "Tell"
AUBURN, Ill., April 5.—Eugene Boyd Fairchild, county dry investigator who was arrested last night on charges of perjury, said he had been "doubled crossed" by county authorities and that he was "going to tell everything" he knew about events leading to the fatal shooting of Mrs. Lillian De King during a dry raid.

Fairchild said when officers found him at his father's home in Odell, Ill., that he did not even read the search warrant which he signed and which was the basis of the raid in which Mrs. De King was shot by Deputy Sheriff Roy Smith. "I signed the affidavit because I was told to do so by Walter Miller, the chief investigator," Fairchild said. "I told him I hadn't made the buy myself, but that another man had, and he said it made no difference."

Blames Superiors
Fairchild also blamed his disappearance after the inquest on his superiors. The chief investigator came to him, Fairchild said, and told him to get out of town again. (He had previously disappeared the day after the shooting.)

"I told him I had nothing to fear," Fairchild said, "and wouldn't go. Then he got mad and handed me the \$15 and said: 'Here, get out of Kane county and stay out.'"

When told of Fairchild's statements, Miller said he had given his assistant \$15 "because he was broke," but he denied the rest of Fairchild's assertions.

had time to check up on federal casualties.

Virtual Slaughter
Other accounts of the La Reforma action described it as a "virtual massacre." So surprising was the federal attack that the rebels, caught on a dry barren plain without any other protection than their own arms, in some cases lay down on the ground where machine gun fire killed hundreds. Airplanes dropped 75 pound demolition bombs.

Success is attending the west coast campaign also. General Lazaro Cardenas, in command there, reported the rebels of General Roberto Cruz and Ramon Iturbide were retreating from Cuicacian, capital of the state of Sinaloa, and that he expected to occupy it within two days, using it as a base for operations against southern Sonora.

Church Rebels Target
In revealing his plans for operations against the so-called religious insurgents of Jalisco and Guanajuato, General Calles said the 5,000 men he is sending south under General Saturnino Cedillo would be joined by forces from Vera Cruz and Michoacan and by 1,000 volunteers gathered in the state of Zacatecas.

Calles has ordered repairs on the rail lines between Jimenez and Reforma, which the rebels pulled up behind them as they fled from Jimenez Wednesday morning.

Rebels Turn Tables
JUAZAR, Chihuahua, M. ex., April 5. Passengers on a train from the south which arrived at Juarez yesterday, and messengers from rebel generals in the field last night, said that General Almazan, the federal leader, whose troops captured Jimenez, had been caught in a trap between insurgent forces under General Marcelino Caraveo in Escalon, and the rebel army in Jimenez.

Some 5,000 cavalrymen under Garfalo, whose movements had not been reported here for several days, were said to have flanked the federal army and captured Escalon, cutting the federals off from their base. General Jose Gonzalo Escobar, rebel commander-in-chief with 7,000 infantrymen and a squadron of airplanes, was said to have occupied the outskirts of Jimenez after a counter attack.

Caraveo, with his cavalry, was left as a rear guard when Escobar withdrew from Jimenez. Caraveo is reported to have engaged in a skirmish with the federals in Diaz, a few miles north of Jimenez, and then to have made a wide circle to the west of the federal army into Escalon. He stormed Escalon and took the town yesterday, the report said.

The passenger train which arrived here yesterday leaving Wednesday and its safe arrival was taken as an indication that the rebels controlled the railroad line at least that far south.

The rebels have received no advice of the overwhelming rebel defeat and slaughter reported by the federal army.
