

SUPPORTING BOUTS ON COMING CARD DRAWING INTEREST

Semi-Final, Special and Preliminary Fights Threaten Eclipse Main Event.

While the boxing card to be staged here next Wednesday, April 10, is to be featured by a 10-round battle between George Dixon of Portland and Olympia Kid Johnson, of Olympia, Washington, local fans are showing nearly as much interest in the supporting bouts as in the main event. From all appearances every fight on the entire card is a natural match. Frequent fans attend such a card without knowing the names of the respective fighters and may suspect a "set-up," but there is no indication of any such thing on the coming program. Every fighter is known to have a wide reputation, while fans have seen most of them in action in a local arena and are able to measure their qualifications as a result of their past work.

The 6-round semi-final between Austin Pendergrass and Orlando Farmer of Eugene is undoubtedly of as great interest to the local fans as the main event. Pendergrass is an exceedingly popular boxer in Roseburg, and by his gameness and flashy style of fighting has made many friends among the fight followers. The Eugene boy holds the same place with the fans at Eugene, and so their meeting is being watched with interest, particularly as each has won a decision in their two previous meetings. Both boys are reported to be working hard to get in the finest possible condition and each is determined to win, so that it should be a most even and interesting fight.

The 4-round special event is also attracting much attention. It will undoubtedly be a "set-up" from view to finish. It will be fought between Tiger Dunn of Roseburg, and Buzz Ramsey of Eugene. Both boys are hard hitters and able to absorb lots of punishment, so fans will see a battle that will be full of hard hitting and clever boxing.

A four-round preliminary between Battling Judd of Roseburg and Young Franco, also of this city, is another bout that promises a great deal of action. Both of the boys are well known to local fans and can throw gloves in a whirlwind fashion with lots of damage. Franco, who heretofore has had little skill but unlimited ability to absorb punishment, has been training regularly and has developed more boxing skill than he was previously possessed with, so should be able to make a good showing against Judd, who is a more experienced fighter. Judd in his last fights here did not show up so well, but has recently been taking training more seriously, and in his last two fights, both fought at Coos Bay, he has been doing well holding Tommy Williams, the first North Bend slugger to a draw in a bout at Marshfield a short time ago.

REIGH COUNT, 3-1 FAVORITE, 11TH IN HANDICAP FINISH

LINGFIELD, Eng., April 6.—Square Rock, by Rock Flint out of Quartette, today won the Lingfield handicap of a mile and a quarter over a field including the famous American colt Reigh Count.

THYE DEFEATS ALLEY

Alley was knocked unconscious during the last period when he made a dive at Thye and went through the ropes. Thye took the first fall in 23 minutes with a wrist lock. Alley evened it up with a headlock in seven minutes after butting Thye around the ring.

RISKO WHIPS PORAT

BOSTON, April 6.—Johnny Risko, the triathlete of the heavy weight division, has tested Otto Von Porat, late of Norway, and found him wanting as a serious contender for championship honors.

Johnny broke his losing streak here last night by administering a 4-round beating to Otto. Risko carried the honors in every round and his rugged fighting prevented Von Porat from doing much with his right hand, reported to be a terrific weapon.

New U. S. Judge



Allen Cox of Baldwin, Miss., a Mississippi chancellor, has been named federal judge of the newly created district of North Mississippi. Cox, who is only 42, is the son of a former justice of the Mississippi supreme court and nephew of the famous "Private John" Allen of Confederate army fame.

JUNIOR BASEBALL LEAGUE SPONSORED BY UMPQUA POST

Veterans of Douglas County Arrange Participation in the National Contest.

Arrangements for a junior baseball league for Douglas county are being handled by Umpqua post of the American Legion, and play will be started as soon as weather will permit. The Douglas county competition will be a part of the big national baseball movement backed by the American and National leagues and sponsored by the American Legion.

Each town in the county will be urged to form a team composed of boys under the age of 17 years. Any boy is eligible to play who will not be 17 years old until September of this year. In Roseburg there will be four teams, one from each of four parts of town.

The four Roseburg teams will play a series of games for the city championship, and the city champions will meet teams from the county districts, until the best county team is selected. From among the best players developed there will then be chosen a Douglas county team, which will go to Portland to play for the championship of the Pacific Northwest.

The winners from the northwest will then go to New York City for the national playoff.

Expense of this national contest is paid by the big leagues, which have appropriated \$50,000 and have put the money in the hands of the American Legion to support the movement which the veterans organized as a method of interesting boys in athletic activities. The big leagues have recognized the great value of this activity in creating additional interest in baseball and in developing baseball material, and have promised the American Legion all the cooperation within their power.

Each American Legion post in the country is responsible for the operations of the league in its own territory, and this year Umpqua post, which last year entered the contest on a small scale, is going into the movement in a very enthusiastic manner.

Vincent O'Brien, chairman of the committee on community service, is at the head of the organization work, and is being assisted by E. A. Britten and H. H. Turner and numerous legionnaires.

The teams will be organized, each under a Legion leader, within a short time, and the schedule for elimination games will then be made up and play will be started.
