OFFICIAL investigators report that the airplane crash in Portland the other day that claimed the lives of two men was an unavoidable accident.
The ship itself, they assert, was in perfect condition. The trip was authorized. Weather conditions were good, and Lieutenant Ralph A. Floyd, the pilot, was thoroughly competent.
Something, it is evident, "just happened," and no one is alive to tell the tale.

HERE is a statement made to this writer the other day by an experienced aviator:
"Given licensed planes and licensed pilots, nine accidents out of ten are caused by trying to make an airplane do something it isn't designed to do. Let me illustrate: If you try to take a sharp curve on a slippery pavement in your automobile while traveling at a speed of 70 miles an hour, a crash is inevitable.
"The same rule holds good with an airplane. There are certain things which it won't do, and if you try to make it do these things a crash follows."

TO a layman, that is an interesting explanation. If it is as accurate as it is interesting, it explains many of the numerous fatal accidents of which we read.
As pilots come to know better what an airplane will do, and come to know also the fatal results of trying to make it do what it isn't designed to do, aviation will become much safer.

ALREADY it is astonishingly safe. Here is a statement vouching for by competent authorities: The number of fatalities on the established air lines, using licensed ships and licensed pilots, is smaller in proportion to passenger miles covered than the number of fatalities on the railroads.
When we consider the amazing safety record made in recent years by the railroads, that statement is significant.

Note, in all these discussions, the stress that is laid upon "licensed ships" and "licensed pilots."
The department of commerce keeps a firm hand on the business of flying. No airship can receive a department of commerce license until it has met rigid safety standards. No pilot can receive a license until he has demonstrated fully his ability as a flier.
So, if you would fly and still be reasonably safe, see to it carefully that you go up only in a licensed ship flown by a licensed pilot.

SIX girl students of Robert E. Lee high school, in Jacksonville, Florida, were sent home the other day for wearing "sunbuck" dresses, cut low in the back "to permit the absorption of more sun rays."
An interesting question arises here. Did these six girls don low-cut dresses with the sincere and single desire to obtain all the benefit possible to their health from the direct rays of the sun?
If they did, they were wholly within their rights, as well as within the proprieties, and the prudish-minded teachers who sent them home were in the wrong and should be reprimanded.

BUT this writer has a cynical notion that these six girls of Jacksonville were intent far less upon gaining benefit to their health from the sun's rays than upon putting out the eyes of beholders—especially masculine beholders.
In that event, the teachers who sent them home were quite right and should be commended. High school girls—or other girls—should not be encouraged to make a show of themselves merely for the sake of making a show.
Nudity for health and comfort and nudity for the mere sake of display are two different things.

LAST fall the turkey growers of Douglas county formed a marketing association for the purpose of disposing of their product. Now they are taking a further step by forming a breeders' association for the purpose of improving their product.
The second step follows logically after the first. Find a market for your product. Then proceed to improve your product so that the market for it may be greatly extended.

REBELS RACING FEDERAL ARMY FOR FRESH BASE

Calles Tries to Intercept
Insurgent Force South
Bound to Entrench
for New Fight.

American Pair Routs Whole
Garrison—U. S. Planes
to Shoot if Border
Is Crossed.

JUAREZ, Chihuahua, April 8.—Rebel forces are believed to be making every effort to reach Casa Grande today through Pulpito pass before General Calles cuts off the southward advance of the revolutionary troops.
Six heavily loaded rebel troop trains that left here Sunday morning were reported to have passed through Guzman, Chihuahua, thirty miles from Columbus, N. M., several hours later. It is believed that if the rebel forces fail to reach the pass before the arrival of General Calles' troops that the anticipated battle in that territory may be the graveyard of Mexico's latest rebellion.

2 Americans Take Fort
Two American cattlemen forced the rebel garrison at Palomas, Chihuahua, last night to evacuate the city. The turnover of authority to the two Americans was reported to have been even more peaceful than had been the seizure of the federal garrison by General Aguilar, a rebel general, a month ago. Colonel Fernandez Gonzalez, revolution leader who was in charge of the Palomas post, surrendered his sixty men to Frank Williams of San Pedro, Calif., and Gerald Thompson of Santa Rosa, N. M., who represented the Mexican federalists, rebel headquarters.

EX-LION TAMING WOMAN PUNCHES SCHOOL TEACHER

KANSAS CITY, April 8.—Mrs. Charles Woodside, small but belligerent former lion tamer, today told a judge she was glad she administered a beating to Miss Inez MacKinnon.
Miss MacKinnon, a Kansas City, Kan., school teacher, was said by Mrs. Woodside to have influenced Lorene Woodside, 16, against her when the girl, a few months ago, complained her ex-lion tamer mother had beaten her with a coat hanger.

"Judge I hit that woman on the nose. I am glad I did it, and I am ready to plead guilty," Mrs. Woodside said.
The judge smiled. "I'll give your anger a chance to cool off," he replied.
Miss MacKinnon was not in court.
Mrs. Woodside attacked the teacher when she met her on a downtown street Saturday. Lorene, whose charge against her mother was dismissed when they became reconciled, is attending a school in Texas.

"REVOLT" SCHEME CLOAKS SWINDLE IN PHILIPPINES

MANILA, April 8.—Sixteen Filipinos were under arrest today charged with planning a "grand revolutionary army" to overthrow the present government and substitute an independent administration.
Police, however, say the scheme was not serious in its intent and that it probably would have gone little farther than the swindling of a number of natives into purchasing officers' commissions in the "revolution."

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KANSAS GOVERNOR THREATENS OUSTER OF LAX OFFICIALS

PARSONS, Kan., April 8.—Seven sheriffs and about as many county attorneys in Kansas will face ouster proceedings if they "do not mend their ways," Governor Clyde Reed has announced.
The governor issued his threat during an address last night in the First Methodist church here. It was the first speech he had delivered in Parsons, his home, since assuming office. He reiterated his desire to "clean up" Kansas moving pictures and his declaration for law enforcement.

Referring to a show he saw recently in Topeka, the governor said he "was tired of the cheap trash and filth in motion pictures of today."
"I'm finding that the governor has a lot of authority and I am going to use it in the interest of decency, law enforcement and good business."

Referring to the attorney general in dry law crusade, the speaker said undercover men had established evidence that would cause seven sheriffs and about as many county attorneys to be ousted within a short time if they did not mend their ways. Two of the sheriffs are in southeastern Kansas, he said.
Almost \$7,500 of a special \$10,000 enforcement fund allotted for use between the first of the year and July has been spent, he said. In addition \$40,000 of the contingent funds of both the governor and the attorney general's office would be used in enforcement work, he declared.

SCHOOL ORATORS HEARD IN DOUGLAS CONTEST FINALE

Deliveries So Near Alike
Judges Are Compelled
to Award on Basis
of Percentage.

The Douglas county declamatory contest, the final meet in which students representing the north and south zones and Roseburg, competed for first, second and third honors, was held Saturday night in the Junior high school auditorium.
The contest was one of the best ever to be held. There was a very large and appreciative audience and especially good was the fine representation from all parts of the county.
The speakers were very uniform in their deliveries and the contest was so close that the judges resorted to a percentage basis to determine the winners. The judges were Miss Margaret Magill of Portland, Professor Kenneth L. Shumaker of the English department at U. of O., and Professor Howard of the university law school.

There were two representatives from each zone and Roseburg competing for places in four divisions, making 12 contestants receiving first, second and third places.

BOMB INTENDED FOR ROOSEVELT FOUND IN MAILS

Parcel Addressed to N. Y. Governor Smokes When
Accidentally Hit
With Broom.

Prompt Action of Sweeper
Saves Lives—Several
Hurt by Exploding
Bomb in India.

NEW YORK, April 8.—Police today sought the sender of a bomb addressed to Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt.
It was accidentally discovered by a porter in the parcel post room of the general post office at 33rd street and Eighth avenue yesterday.

The infernal machine consisted of six ounces of dynamite in a six-inch length of one-inch pipe, capped at both ends and provided with a fuse and detonating device. The whole thing was imbedded in wax in a tin candy box wrapped in brown paper.
The detonator was a strip of sandpaper against which four matches were held by a spring in such a way that if the lid of the box were lifted the fuse would be ignited.

On the wrapper was the hand-printed address: "The Hon. F. D. Roosevelt, Mansion House, Albany, N. Y." In the corner was printed "H. Bup. 459 Twenty-Ninth street." Police found the name and address fictitious.

FIRE DEALS \$15,000 LOSS IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, April 8.—A fire vulcanizer that worked overtime when it had no tire to vulcanize or attendant to control its operation is believed to have been the cause of the fire that brought between \$15,000 and \$25,000 loss to tenants of a seven-story "fireproof" building at Broadway and the blazed streets here early today.
The blaze took up traffic at the busy intersection for two hours.
The fire is thought to have started about 5 a. m. in the basement of the Sunset tire corporation. Eleven engines, three trucks and two chemical companies reported.
The chief loss was the Sunset Tire company with loss estimated at \$10,000, largely new stock of tires and equipment. Other tenants of the building suffered damage to stock by flooding.

CREEK YIELDS BODY OF MISSING CHILD

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., April 8.—A country school principal's search for wild flowers resulted yesterday in discovery of the body of Edith Mae Dierdorf, 10-year-old West Terre Haute news girl who disappeared January 27.
Lodged against a log in Boeser creek near Paxton, Ind., hands and feet wired together and a wound in the top of her head, the body was found by Nimrod Slaven, Pleasantville, Ind., school principal, who, with his wife and four children, was picking wild flowers in the woods.
Officers said the girl had been tossed from the bridge into the creek which was flood-swollen at the time of her disappearance.

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CANADA STATES CASE IN BOOZE BOAT SINKING

Destruction of I'm Alone
by U. S. Coast Guard Is
Officially Before
Washington.

Incident Itself Said Not
of So Much Importance
as Uncertainties
of Rum Treaty.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—Formal representations on the sinking of the rum-runner I'm Alone by a coast guard patrol boat in the Gulf of Mexico have been received from Ottawa by the Canadian legation for presentation to the state department.
Except for the brief announcement by the Canadian prime minister, Mackenzie King, that the sinking of the vessel, which was of Canadian registry, would be the subject of formal discussions between the American and Canadian governments, both Ottawa and the legation have been very reticent regarding the content of the note.

Treaty Most Concern
Unofficial views of the matter, however, are to the effect that the Canadians are more interested in the points at issue between the two governments over the anti-rum smuggling treaty of 1924 between the United States and Great Britain—which binds Canada as a dominion of the British commonwealth—than they are over the actual sinking.
On two previous occasions when Canadian vessels were seized by coast guard vessels for rum-running, the Canadian government informally made known that it was not in sympathy with certain interpretations placed by the Americans on points in the 1924 treaty under which the ships were seized.
Would Straighten Kinks
It has been said in reliable quarters here that Great Britain and Canada are particularly interested in having these divergent viewpoints straightened out before a more serious event than that of the I'm Alone arises. The I'm Alone case is regarded as embracing most of the contested points and enables the governments to bring the matter up for discussion.
The Canadians are said to recognize the implication that the right to search and seize within one-hour's sailing distance carries with it the right to use violence to effect the seizure. They are understood, however, to question whether this implication holds on the high seas in cases where the pursuit has merely been begun within the treaty limit.

ONE SURRENDERS AFTER HOT CHASE AND THREE OTHERS ARE REPORTED TO BE SURROUNDED.

BATON ROUGE, La., April 8.—A scheduled murder trial was turned into a manhunt today by the escape of four convicts from the Louisiana state penitentiary. One of them was captured after a gun battle on the main street of Magnolia, Miss., and early today the other three were reportedly surrounded.
Two of the convicts, Steven J. Beck, bank robber, and Jim Heard, burglar, were scheduled to go on trial at St. Francisville today for murdering a trusty.
The other two were Adam Webster, serving a sentence for breaking entering, who was captured, and Fred Wilson, purse snatcher. Sheriff Thad Elsey of Pike county, Miss., was notified that the convicts were headed in the direction of Magnolia and he and a deputy set out to meet them.

BATTLE AND CHASE

Dashing into Magnolia the convicts stopped their car in front of the post office and all four opened fire on the sheriff and deputy who appeared half a block away.

After more than 100 shots had been exchanged without damage the convicts fled through a yard and three of them commandeered the automobile of a passing motorist and sped away. The car was found abandoned several miles away and the trio were thought to have taken to the woods.

SAMUEL LEAKE OF DIXONVILLE DIES AT AGE 65 YEARS

Samuel Walter Leake, aged 65 years, a well known resident of the Dixonville community, died last night after an illness of about six weeks. Mr. Leake was born September 5, 1864, in Ray county, Missouri, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Samuel Leake, and came to Oregon in 1890. Three years later, November 25, 1893, he was married to Dora Agee, a member of a well known pioneer family, and after a short residence in Oakland moved in 1896 to the present location east of Dixonville, where he engaged actively in farming until last fall, when ill health forced his retirement from active labor.
He is survived by the widow and one son, Walter Leake, of Roseburg, and a granddaughter, Helen Patricia. He also leaves five brothers, three in Missouri, one in Denver and another in Santa Ana, California, and three sisters, all in Missouri.
Funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at the chapel of the Roseburg Undertaking company, arrangements being in charge of M. E. Ritter. Rev. Frank Matthews, pastor of the local Baptist church, will officiate. Interment will take place in the Masonic cemetery.

MISPLACED DECIMAL IN PRESCRIPTION CAUSES 3 DEATHS

LONDON, April 8.—An inquest held today into the deaths of three boys who came up to London from Sudbury recently to be treated for ringworm, brought out that a misplaced decimal point in a prescription caused the fatalities.
The boys, Charles, Leslie and John Thorpe, aged 10, 7 and 5 years, respectively, died under mysterious circumstances after being given medicine from a prescription compounded at the hospital to which they applied. The jury decided they had died from poison accidentally administered.

Apparition of Atheism Stalks Einstein Idea of Relativity, Cardinal O'Connell Declares

BOSTON, April 8.—William Cardinal O'Connell, dean of the Roman Catholic hierarchy in the United States, believes that behind the Einstein theory of space and time there lurks the "ghastly apparition of atheism."
The cardinal so expressed himself yesterday in a communion breakfast address before the New England Province of Catholic Clubs of America in which he stressed the necessity of religious faith and assailed the "pseudo-intellectuals."
After condemning "petty, befogged professors" who have set up some new standard "to attract attention to themselves" the cardinal turned directly to the subject of the Einstein theory.
"Nobody Understands
"Why do men and women who pretend to be intellectual forget the very rudiments of life?" he asked. "What does all this worked up enthusiasm about Einstein mean? It is evidently in worked-up, fictitious enthusiasm because I have never yet met a man who understood in the least what Einstein is driving at, and I have

The man, who said he was S. L. Fisher, 50, attempted to escape by dropping from the second story window of the bank building. He was stunned by the fall and captured.

CLACKAMAS JUDGE PAROLES CULPRIT ON STRICT TERMS

OREGON CITY, Ore., April 8.—Last week Lawrence Forsythe was convicted of attacking a young girl. Today he appeared in circuit court and heard the sentence: "Five years in the penitentiary with a parole to this court."
The courtroom listened in astonishment. But the next words of the court eased the strain:
"I'm not only revoking your driver's license but I am forbidding you to even ride in an automobile. You will report to this court once a month and bring a personal financial report with you. I want you to account for every nickel you earn and every nickel you pay out or spend in any other capacity."
"You will also pay the costs of this suit."
The prisoner nodded his head. Sentence was pronounced by Judge J. U. Campbell.

SALEM MAN FACES SERIOUS CHARGE

SALEM, Ore., April 8.—Fred H. Royston, 35, a former student at Kimball theological school here, was arrested today charged with doing "an act which manifestly tends to make a minor delinquent."
Royston was released from jail when \$2,000 bail was furnished by bondsmen. Date for preliminary hearing has not been set.
According to the complaint, Royston, who has been working as a painter, enticed four little girls, each about 6 years old, into the basement of a building which he was painting.
Royston served a term at McNeil Island a few years ago on a Mann Act charge.

H. F. SINCLAIR LOSES FIGHT TO KEEP FROM JAIL

Contempt Conviction For
Defiance of Senate in
Oil Quiz Upheld by
Supreme Court.

Must Serve 3 Months and
Pay \$500—Refusal to
Answer Queries Held
Without Excuse.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, April 8.—The conviction of Harry F. Sinclair for contempt for refusing to answer questions during the Teapot Dome investigation by the senate oil committee was approved today by the supreme court.

Under the decision the oil operator must serve three months in jail and pay a fine of \$500.
Justice Butler, who some months ago delivered the opinion canceling the naval oil reserve leases, spoke for the court, emphasizing the importance of protecting the individual from unreasonable and arbitrary disclosure of his private affairs. He said that questions put to Sinclair were not of that character.

Silence Inexcusable
The fact that the information sought by the committee might be of importance in a suit pending against Sinclair did not excuse him from answering, the justice stated, because the information was properly within the inquiry of the committee and the questions were pertinent.
Justice Butler stated that the court in its decision in the Mal S. Dougherty case had laid down the rights of the two houses of congress to conduct investigations necessary to aid legislation but that neither house had the right to inquire into the private affairs by requiring disclosure not in aid of legislation.

During the investigation of the naval oil reserve leases by the senate committee, Sinclair testified several times but refused to answer certain questions concerning the Teapot Dome lease, taking the position that because a grand jury was considering indictments, the senate committee had lost jurisdiction.
His counsel contended that as court proceedings had been begun against Sinclair alleging conspiracy to defraud the United States he was within his rights in refusing to answer questions before the committee relating to the contracts and leases upon which the prosecution was based.

After his conviction in the trial court here he appealed, and the court of appeals asked the supreme court to give it instructions on five of the more important law points involved. The supreme court at the request of the government consented to pass on all phases of the appeal instead of answering the specific questions, thus expediting the final determination of the controversy.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—The supreme court today ruled that naturalized Canadians and other quota immigrants were prohibited from crossing the border to work or search for employment without a passport.

DAIRY TOUR TO BE MADE WEDNESDAY

Meetings of interest to dairymen, at which time N. C. Johnson, extension specialist in dairying, will be present and lead the discussion relative to feeding and management have been arranged by J. C. Leedy, county agricultural agent.

All interested persons are invited and urged to attend.
