After the farm bill is out of the way, Senator Watson said, the senate will take up the reapportionment measure and then the bill providing for the taking of the 1930 census. These will be acted upon while the senate finance committee is considering the tariff bill which the senate is expected to pass in the meantime.

Hoover Hears Advice

A wide extension of the activities of the bureau of markets in supplying producers of perishable vegetables with information as to the best localities for marketing was urged upon President Hoover today by Representative Free, republican, California.

In this connection the California effort of the marketing service of the California Growers Exchange. He said that this organization has representatives in all the principal markets who furnish daily information as to prices and also the supply of the particular commodity in question at that point. He also recommended that brokers who handle perishables be licensed.

Farm relief also was discussed with the president by a committee from the Grain Dealers' National association, which left a memorandum of its views as to what an agricultural measure should include. Among other things the committee recommended lower prices on products intended for export, improved storage facilities and opposed any system whereby prices would be fixed by the government.

MRS. SIELAFF TO TELL OF HARDY'S ALLEGED X PLOT

(Associated Press Local Wire)

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 10.—The Examiner in a copyrighted story today announces that it had located Mrs. Lorraine Wiseman-Sielaff, one of the figures in the Almeda Simple McPherson kidnapping story investigation, in Seattle.

Mrs. Wiseman-Sielaff, who has been sought as an important witness in the impeachment trial of Superior Judge Carlos S. Hardy of Los Angeles, was quoted as saying she would go to Sacramento at once and volunteer to take the stand for the prosecution.

The newspaper says Mrs. Wiseman-Sielaff made an affidavit declaring Judge Hardy had asked her if she could produce a woman known as "Miss X" in the McPherson case and that she (Mrs. Wiseman-Sielaff) agreed to do so.

Judge Hardy is accused of committing judicial misdemeanors in acting in behalf of Mrs. McPherson while her kidnapping story was under fire. The affidavit as set forth in the Examiner says Mrs. Wiseman-Sielaff agreed to produce a woman who would "admit" being the companion of Kenneth G. Ormiston, Angelus Temple radio operator, at Carmel, Cal., nearly three years ago.

This was during Mrs. McPherson's mysterious absence from Angelus temple. Upon her return she declared that she had been kidnapped and had escaped. The Los Angeles district attorney's office charged the evangelist and her mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, with conspiracy to obstruct justice as the result of Mrs. McPherson's story before the grand jury. The charge later was dropped.

The newspaper quoted Mrs. Wiseman-Sielaff as saying she met Mrs. McPherson, Mrs. Kennedy and Judge Hardy at various times in arranging to carry out the "Miss X" agreement.

MARINES EXPLAIN HONDURAN BOMBING

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, April 10.—Explanations of reports of the bombing of Las Limas, Honduras, today contained a version of the affair different from that which has caused excitement at Tegucigalpa, capital of Honduras.

The marine reports said that on March 31 as airplanes reconnoitered near the Nicaraguan-Honduran border they were fired on by outlaws in the vicinity of Brazil, which is near Las Limas. A bullet struck the plane and "a group of bandits was bombed by the United States marines, destroying one shack in that area."

The marine headquarters statement further quoted Nicaraguan government officials as saying that the region in which the two villages are located is so close to the border that it is claimed by both Honduras and Nicaragua. Neither government has officials in either village, although Nicaraguan and Honduran forces have cooperated along the border area in stamping out the outlaw bands.

The story told in Tegucigalpa was that Las Limas, which was mentioned as in Honduras, was bombed by marine planes. Fire followed, destroying the entire town.

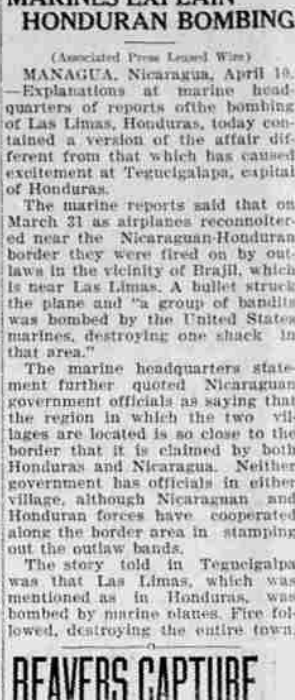
