thence to Greenville, Pa., where detectives learned that Mrs. Mowry had lived before she left to marry a "Doctor Campbell."

Several features of the slaying of Mrs. Mowry are similar to those of the killing of Margaret Brown, New York governess, who was found dying with her clothing afire, behind a refreshment stand near Bernardsville, N. J., a year ago.

Miss Brown had drawn her life savings from a bank and gone away, saying she was to marry a "doctor." Her slayer was never apprehended although some bonds identified as having belonged to her were sent to authorities with a note in which the writer said he was the slayer.

were abducted by the rebels and sentenced to death, but reprieved. They were allowed to return to the United States.

The other two, Fred Wood of Richmond Hall, Long Island, N. Y., and Albert Holliday, of Amarillo, Tex., joined the revolutionary forces "just for the fun of it," they said. They were among a detachment of 40 rebels captured by federalists near Guadalupe, and now are held as prisoners of war in Juarez, Mexican federal authorities.

Gilbert, returning to his home state yesterday, gave a melodramatic account of his involuntary service with the rebels. It began with a trip to Juarez with Butler, a chance acquaintance. Both were abducted, Gilbert related, and after Butler had boasted that Gilbert was an experienced aviator, the rebel leaders connected them with the bombing of Jimenez and sentenced them to die.

Robert Swain, of El Paso, a member of General J. Gonzalo Escobar's staff, interceded and saved them from a firing squad after insufficient food, hard, wire bonds, a filthy prison and threats from a muttering mob of rebels had brought them to the verge of despair. Gilbert did not know what became of Butler after they returned to Texas.
