JOS. W. BAILEY, FORMER TEXAS SENATOR, DIES

Noted Political Figure of Past Days Drops Dead After Argument in Court Room.

Public Career Started 45 Years Ago in Georgia; Served Four Terms in Congress.

Measure Drafted by House Sub-Committee Given Hoover O. K. With Some Changes.

DEBENTURE IDEA FOR FARM BILL LACKS ACCORD

WASHINGTON, April 13.—By a vote of 17 to 4, the house agriculture committee today rejected a proposal to write the export debarment plan into the new farm relief bill.

Proposal to Substitute It for Equalization Fee Principle Meeting Opposition.

HENLE, (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, April 13.—Some members of the senate agriculture committee have definitely turned to the debarment plan of the National Grange as a part of the farm relief plan in place of the equalization fee.

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While there is as yet no certainty that a majority has been won over, it is the opinion of many committee members that the plan has an excellent chance of becoming part of the senate farm bill unless President Hoover declares against it.

Senator McNary of Oregon, chairman of the committee, has taken no stand on the plan but he has noticed that the committee was "very much impressed" with the testimony of agricultural department experts that the plan was working out well in Norway and Denmark.

Senator Norris of Nebraska, and Norbeck of South Dakota, republicans, and Caraway of Arkansas, and Heflin of Alabama, democrats, are in favor of the plan. Senator Capper, republican, Kansas, believes it should be given careful consideration, and other members of the committee have expressed themselves as impressed with the showing made by those supporting the proposal.

Veto Not Expected It is the opinion of Senator Caraway that with the debarment plan in the measure, the agricultural problem would be nearer a solution than it ever was. He is inclined to believe that President Hoover would not veto a bill with the plan in it, if it were provided that the proposed farm board could
