KEEP PROMISE TO THE U. S. MESSAGE SAYS

Of Industry.

"The government has a special mandate from the recent election, not only to further develop our waterways and revise the agricultural tariff, but also to extend systematic relief in other directions."

Favors Federal Board

"I have long held that the multiplicity of causes of agricultural depression could only be met by the creation of a great instrumentality clothed with sufficient authority and resources to assist our farmers to meet these problems, each upon its own merits. The creation of such an agency would at once transfer the agricultural question from the field of politics into the realm of economics and would result in constructive action. The administration is pledged to create an instrumentality that will investigate the causes, find sound remedies, and have the authority and resources to apply those remedies."

"The pledged purpose of such a federal farm board is the reorganization of the marketing system on sounder and more stable and more economic lines. To do this the board will require funds to assist in creating and sustaining farmer-owned and farmer-controlled agencies for a variety of purposes, such as the acquisition of adequate warehousing and other facilities for marketing; adequate working capital to be advanced against commodities lodged for storage; necessary and prudent advances to corporations created and owned by farmers' marketing organizations for the purchase and orderly marketing of surpluses occasioned by climatic variations or by harvest congestion; to authorize the creation and support of clearing houses, especially for perishable products, through which, under producers' approval, cooperation can be established with distributors and processors to more orderly marketing of commodities and for the elimination of many wastes in distribution; and to provide for licensing of handlers of some perishable products so as to eliminate unfair practices. Every penny of waste between farmer and consumer that we can eliminate, whether it arises from methods of distribution or from hazard or speculation, will be a gain to both farmer and consumer."

"In addition to these special provisions in the direction of improved returns, the board should be organized to investigate every field of economic betterment for the farmer so as to furnish guidance as to need in production, to devise methods for elimination of unprofitable marginal lands and their adaptation to other uses; to develop industrial by-products and to secure a score of other fields of helpfulness."

No Bureaucratic Rule

"Certain safeguards must, naturally surround these activities and the instrumentalities that are created. Certain vital principles must be adhered to in order that we may not undermine the freedom of our farmers and of our people as a whole by bureaucratic and governmental domination and interference. We must not undermine initiative. There should be no fee or tax imposed upon the farmer. No governmental agency should engage in the buying and selling and price fixing of products, for such courses can lead only to bureaucracy and domination. Government funds should not be loaned or facilities duplicated where other services of credit and facilities are available at reasonable rates. No activities should be set in motion that will result in increasing the surplus production, as such will defeat any plans of relief."

Initiative With Farmer

"The most progressive movement in all agriculture has been the upbuilding of the farmer's own marketing organizations, which now embrace nearly two million farmers in membership and annually distribute nearly \$2,500,000,000 worth of farm products. These organizations have acquired experience in virtually every branch of their industry, and furnish a substantial basis upon which to build further organization. Not all these marketing organizations are farmer-owned or farmer-controlled. In order to strengthen and not to undermine them, all proposals for governmental assistance should originate with such organizations and be the result of their application. Moreover, by such bases of organization the government will be removed from engaging in the business of agriculture."

Long Time Required

"The difficulties of agriculture can not be cured in a day; they can not all be cured by legislation; they can not be cured by the federal government alone. But farmers and their organizations can be assisted to overcome these inequalities. Every effort of this character is an experiment, and we shall find from our experience the way to further advance. We must make a start. With the creation of a great instrumentality of this character, of a strength and importance equal to that of those which we have created for transportation and banking, we give immediate assurance of the determined purpose of the government to meet the difficulties of which we are now aware, and to create an agency through which constructive action for the future will be assured."

"In this treatment of this problem we recognize the responsibility of the people as a whole, and we

shall lay the foundations for a new day in agriculture, from which we shall preserve to the nation the great values of its individuality and strengthen our whole national fabric."

Other Subjects

In addition to proposed farm legislation, the president's message urged completion of legislation initiated at the last session for the suspension of the national act of the immigration act; the taking of the 1930 census and the reappointment of congressional representation.

In the matter of revision of tariff rates Mr. Hoover declared the test in the main was whether there had been a substantial slackening of activity in an industry during the past few years and a consequent decrease of employment due to insurmountable competition in the products of that industry.

The president emphasized that to discrimination against any foreign industry was involved in equalizing the difference in costs of production at home and abroad and told congress that in determining changes in the tariff account must be taken of the broad interests of the country as a whole, adding that such interests include American trade relations with other countries.

In proposing a reorganization of the tariff commission, Mr. Hoover said it should be placed upon a basis of higher salaries "in order that we may at all times command men of the broadest attainments." He asserted that seven years of experience had proved the principle of flexible tariff to be practical, but that the basis upon which the commission makes its recommendations to the president for administrative changes in the rates of duty should be made more automatic and more comprehensive, to the end that the time required for determinations by the commission be greatly shortened.

more general as the clerk dropped off the last paragraph of Mr. Hoover's communications in which the president expressed the wish that except for reappointment, national origins and census legislation, the scope of the activities of the session should be held to farm relief and the tariff. When the reading was concluded the entire republican membership and half of those on the democratic side arose and applauded.

The brief session of the senate brought forth the first farm relief discussion of the extra session.

Senator Watson of Indiana, the republican leader, asked Chairman McNary of the agriculture committee if a farm measure would be ready by Thursday. McNary replied the committee would introduce a bill then and would have a report ready by Monday. He said he expected to make the agricultural relief bill the unfinished business of Monday.

With a smile on his face Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the democratic leader, inquired of McNary if he expected a unanimous report from his committee. The Oregon senator said he did not know because the committee was still busy but he hoped for one.

Brookhart Criticizes

WASHINGTON, April 16.—Senator Brookhart of Iowa, one of President Hoover's most ardent campaigners last fall, declared today that the executive had taken "an entirely inconsistent" position in his message to congress with respect to agricultural products that have a surplus.

As Senator Brookhart interpreted the message, he said it was opposed to a government organization buying at cost of production and selling at any price.

"Therefore," he added, "a tariff on all such agricultural products with a surplus will remain ineffective and will not protect agriculture."
