ROSEBURG MAN'S KIN TAKEN SOUTH FOR HIS HEALTH

Hastening to southern California, where he expects to undergo treatment for chronic troubles due to advancing years, C. L. Ford of Newport, Washington, accompanied by Mrs. Ford and their son, Mr. Syl Ford, of Tacoma, Idaho, California, reached Roseburg yesterday afternoon and were entertained at the home of R. M. Wood, a brother-in-law. Ten days ago Mr. Syl Ford passed through Roseburg en route north in response to a wire message that his father was alarmingly ill at a hospital in Newport. In 19 hours after leaving this city he drove his Buick sedan into the northeastern Washington town and visited his father. After a few days there it was decided to take Mr. Ford, Sr., to California. A bed was fixed up in the sedan and the patient made entirely comfortable, and the party reached here last evening. This afternoon the car again moved out onto the highway, south bound. Mr. C. L. Ford, more than 70 years of age, is a son of Ninewa Ford, a western pioneer of 1842, and who crossed the plains with that first memorable wagon train. Mrs. Ford is the daughter of one of Walla Walla's earliest pioneer couples, Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Wood. They pioneered in eastern Washington when that now rich and productive section was wilderness, and Mr. Ford served with the volunteers in the Nez Percé Indian war and helped to make the country safe for the offshoot frontiersmen who flocked westward in the years following. Friends of this old pioneer couple are expressing pleasure that they are being taken to the sanitarium of the southland, and that they are traveling in the car, and with that son, who appreciates them so greatly that he left business interests and rushed over the 1500 intervening miles as fast as a modern automobile and gas could carry him to the bedside of a man and woman who have lived to make the West fit to live in, and that these old people can now enjoy the leisure time they have so well earned.

GARDEN VALLEY NUT GROWER BACK FROM CONVENTION

G. C. Bailey, Garden Valley fruit and nut grower, a director in the Lebanon unit of the Pacific Cooperative Nut Growers' association, has returned home after attending a meeting of the organization at Lebanon Saturday. As the Lebanon unit is the closest branch of the east organization, most of the local growers are affiliated with that unit.

The meeting, Mr. Bailey states, was well attended. The general manager, W. H. Bentley was present and made an excellent talk. The association has been somewhat slow in making payments to growers, Mr. Bailey says, but this was explained by the general manager, who assured the growers that payments will be made more promptly in the future, due to a change in the marketing arrangements. The manager has just returned from a trip East where he contracted for the sale of all of the coming Oregon crop, subject, of course, to approval when the market price is established. He also went to Washington, D. C., where he met the tariff commission to present an appeal for a higher tariff on walnuts and filberts.

Arrangements were made to secure a stamping machine in order to mark all Oregon walnuts in the future, Mr. Bailey reports.

MAYOR PUTS BARRIER ON FREW'S PAY

men engaged in a heated discussion of the matter with City Attorney Riddle.

Attorney Riddle in expressing his opinion of the case upholds the position of Mayor Hoover or not an appointive officer is vacated when a new council is seated, or if it continues until a successor is appointed and qualified.

Attorney Riddle contends that an appointment runs out simultaneously with the term of the council by which the employee was appointed and that the mayor can make a vacation appointment until ratification is secured.

The councilmen, however, declare that they have legal advice that an appointive holds office "at the will of the council," and cannot be removed by the mayor without "a two-thirds vote of the council," the provisions being contained in the charter, which on the other hand, places all appointments in the hands of the mayor.

In view of this condition the entire situation revolves around the question of whether or not an appointive office expires with the termination of the administration under which the appointment was made, and upon this matter legal opinions widely differ.

The councilmen, in discussion with Attorney Riddle, pointed out that it is necessary to have the streets clean and that it is important to keep the street crews at work, and that it would be highly impractical to let the streets go without attention while the council and mayor fought out the matter of an appointment. The attorney, however, holds the opinion that the mayor can make an appointment that will stand until an agreement can be reached. The council, on the other hand, points out that this course is not practical because any appointment can be removed by a two-thirds vote of the council, so that an appointment unsatisfactory to the council would not be allowed to stand.

Improvements Discussed

Considerable time was spent discussing proposed improvements.

WORK STARTING AT ONCE ON POWER LINE FOR AIRWAY LIGHTS

(Associated Press Local Wire)

MEDFORD, Ore., April 15.—Work will start at once on construction of power lines to the sites of 35 airway beacon lights between Delta, Calif., and Drain, Ore., on the Medford division of the coast airway system. The beacon lights are to be located in isolated areas and their installation and the preliminary work will entail an estimated expenditure of approximately \$250,000. Until the beacons are installed there will be no night flying originally scheduled to begin June 1.

The work of erecting the fifty-foot towers and building power lines to them is expected to require six weeks or two months under the most favorable conditions.

The beacon lights are to be of the revolving "circulating" type and are set at an angle of two degrees.
