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## AIMEE McPHERSON WILL TAKE STAND IN HARDY TRIAL

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 17.—With the possibility that Aimee Semple McPherson, the state's "star" witness, may be called upon to testify late this afternoon, interest in the impeachment trial of Superior Judge Carlos S. Hardy, centered today on the question of how long it will take managers to introduce the deposition of Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, the evangelist's mother.

There are 123 of the 276-page depositions remaining to be read. It took the managers four hours to cover about the first half yesterday so it is estimated that it will take at least as long today to complete the testimony taken in Portland, Ore., recently.

The assembly board of managers made it definitely known today that they were to call Mrs. McPherson. Heretofore they have hedged on the decision to place the evangelist on the stand. They were not agreed as to the value of the testimony she might lend to the case and for a while it looked as
