Interest in the coming on May 1 of the great Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra is increasing every day. MURDERER ADMITS SEVEN WIVES AND 3 PRISON TERMS

(Associated Press Local Wire)

ELIZABETH N. J., April 16.—More wives have emerged from the dim past to shadow the much married life of Henry Colin Campbell, bigamist and confessed slayer of his first wife, Mrs. Mildred Mowry, identified by finger prints a quarter century old as Henry C. Close, who served time in Sing Sing prison, and in Auburn prison in New York for embezzlement, and in San Quentin prison, California. Back in 1899 on a forgery charge, Campbell had admitted to Prosecutor Abe J. David that Close is his right name, and confessed three more marriages. This brings his known record to seven wives.

Three members of the state hospital for the insane examined Campbell at the request of the prosecutor, and declared he is sane and is not a drug addict. Campbell confessed that he lived with three of his bigamous wives simultaneously. Campbell said that he operated a sanatorium in Montclair at one time. He married a Sarah Phelan, who was nurse at the sanatorium, and while living with her met a Marie Becker and had one child by her, who was named Dorothy. At the same time he said he maintained as his third wife a Maude Allen. Later, according to David, he married a Mary Powers at Pawtucket, R. I.

LIQUOR SERVICE ON STEAMER LINE ONE WAY AFFAIR

SOUTHAMPTON, England, April 17.—David Burke, general manager of the United States Lines, arriving in Southampton today aboard the Leviathan, said that only wines would be carried on the westward bound voyages of the steamer in accordance with the policy of the ship's new owners. He declared that there was no intention of selling liquor over open bars nor any idea of stocking whiskey or any other form of spirits.

"When only wine is carried and the quantity allowed on each west-bound trip will be determined by the number of passengers booked for the vessel," said Mr. Burke. "There will be a conference in London this week to decide upon the amount per head. The drinks will be served to passengers in their cabins and to obtain it they will have to place an order with the chief steward, but once it has been served to them, they will be able to consume it either in the smoking room or the dining room."

DRY'S LEAD MOVE TO PROBE KILLING IN AURORA RAID

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 17.—A resolution calling for legislative investigation of the killing of Mrs. Lillian De King in a dry raid at Aurora is in the hands of a house committee for consideration.

The resolution, introduced by Rep. John P. U. of Batavia and jointly sponsored by Rep. Frank McCarthy of Elgin, was voted upon favorably by the judiciary committee of the Illinois house of representatives.

Mrs. De King was killed by Roy Smith, a deputy, during the raid on her home. A coroner's jury recommended that Smith be held for the shooting.

McCarthy pushed the resolution, declaring that the people of Aurora were "up in arms over the affair." "This is not a wet and dry fight," he said. "Dry's want the investigation as much as the wets because they feel that unless all plots are brought to light the crime will be laid at their door."
