The opportunity that Roseburg is having in the coming of the Philharmonic Orchestra of Los Angeles on May 1 is one that would be an important musical event in a large city. It is very seldom that so fine an organization is heard in a town, as it would be practically impossible for local people to offer a guarantee such as symphony orchestras usually receive. No sym-

phony orchestra can meet its expenses from the sale of tickets. Should the price of symphony tickets be raised to the point where receipts from that source could maintain the orchestra, only the wealthy could afford the pleasure of the concerts. From such a condition we are saved by the artistic ambition and generosity of wealthy patrons of the arts who supply the funds to augment the comparatively scanty income derived from the sale of tickets.

The wide variance between the expense of a symphony orchestra and the receipts from tickets is caused primarily by the large weekly payroll of the musicians. These men must, in the very nature of the thing, be of the highest artistic caliber. They are most carefully chosen with the sole purpose of fitting into the organization in a way that will maintain the highest standard.

The man who measures all good in terms of business and to whom business means the accumulation of dollars by means of commerce immediately asks, "Then why have a symphony orchestra?" And it must be answered that if the guarantor considered his organization from a commercial standpoint only, he probably would not sponsor one. Being wiser, however, he reasons justly that business which brings profit, education and pleasure to hundreds of thousands cannot be measured in terms of dollars but must have other considerations.

The man who maintains a symphony orchestra brings into existence a living, breathing force which ennobles and enlightens the whole community. He has adopted into his family the whole community and is giving it a heritage of more than worldly wealth.

would involve continuation of basic annuities of 2,500,000,000 gold marks (about \$600,000,000), with prospective increases dating from the beginning of the next fiscal year, and continuing to an uncertain total. Germany has repeatedly insisted the Dawes plan annuities are far beyond her capacity to pay.

notice of a fight to the end against such a move.

Senator Johnson, republican, California, chairman of the immigration committee, announced today he would call the committee together "immediately" to consider the proposal for suspending the national origins provision, which has been proclaimed effective July 1 and provides a new basis for immigration and drastically revises the present quotas.

Tariff Revision Opposed

Senator Reed, who ranks high in his party's councils in the senate, also has declared against any attempt at "limited" tariff revision. He announced after the reading of Mr. Hoover's message to congress that he would not consider himself bound to any limited tariff program and would support moves for upward revision of any rates regarded as necessary, whether in agriculture or industrial classes.

The declaration of Reed, who is a member of the finance committee, brought into the open the talk in the senate of a revolt for general tariff revision. There are signs

that many members of the majority party are ready to support Reed, and a great deal of pressure has been directed at the senate for some time looking to a general overhauling of the 1922 tariff act.
