SUIT FILED AGAINST B. W. BATES AS RESULT OF WRECK

Suit has been filed in Portland by Agnes Reed of that city for \$10,000 damages as a result of an automobile accident which happened a short time ago. The car in which Miss Reed was riding collided with a car belonging to Ross Bates, son of B. W. Bates. At the time the accident occurred Mr. Bates and Ross were out of town, and the car was being driven by Fred Ward, a student at Hill Military academy, where young Mr. Bates is also attending school. As the car was registered in Mr. Bates' name suit was filed against him. The driver of the Bates car was freed of responsibility in the report made by the traffic officer. The machine was protected against all liability for personal injury and the insurance company has taken entire charge of the suit.

TRAFFIC CONTROL BRANCH IDEA NOT CARRIED OUT

SALEM, Ore., April 18.—Although an act of the 1929 legislature authorizes the establishment of a branch state traffic control office in eastern Oregon, Secretary of State Hoge says the branch will not be established. Pressure had been brought on the state department to locate the branch at The Dalles, with Jay Salzman in charge. Instead, Salzman as assistant to Chief Traffic Inspector Rafferty, will be charged with the traffic office while Rafferty gives more attention to actual highway patrol supervision.

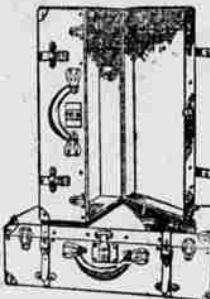

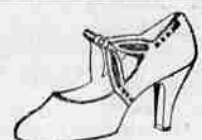
