

JUNIOR BASEBALL LEAGUE IS READY FOR FIRST GAMES

Increased interest is being shown in the Junior baseball league, sponsored by the Junior League of the American Legion. Over 30 boys attended a meeting at the Roseburg Junior high school Wednesday, April 17, with E. A. Britton as chairman. Plans were perfected for the organization of four teams to represent Roseburg in the Junior league. Jim Soules will have charge of the team selected from players residing north of Douglas street. Rudy Hitzman will work with players south of Douglas street and east of Stephens. Frank Hill and E. A. Britton should produce a splendid team from the district between the railroad and the west line of Stephens street. All players west of the railroad will be coached by Pete Dibel and A. Cacy. Practices will start immediately and by May first the teams will be ready for action. Any juniors interested should communicate with the Legionnaire in charge of his residential section.

The Oakland Juniors are already practicing and have a strong team, coached by Ed Ward and J. T. Bridges.

The Sutherlin boys are all pepped up and with Jack French and Professor Hichbottom in charge should almost reach Chicago.

Harry Hill has 15 players signed up at Wilbur and they promise to make 'em all hustle.

Dillard and Happy Valley are doubling up on the rest of the gang and Willard Meredith claims nothing short of a championship.

Schedule of games will be adopted by May first and teams should have players enrolled previous to that time. County championship team must be named by June 15. Registration cards will be prepared in near future. All boys are eligible providing they do not reach their 17th birthday before September 15.

ESCAPED CONVICT BACK WITH ONE FOOT MISSING

(Associated Press Local Wire) SALEM, Ore., April 19.—When Charles M. Burchette escaped from the state penitentiary July 26, 1917, nearly 12 years ago, he was a sound man physically. When he was returned today, he had one foot missing. He said he lost it in a train accident. Burchette was received at the prison from Multnomah county March 7, 1916, to serve from three to 15 years for robbery. He was made a trustee and was working outside the prison when he escaped. He was not heard from until his arrest at Hoquiam, Wash., this week.

BAGSHAW'S CASE STILL UNDECEDED

(Associated Press Local Wire) SEATTLE, Wash., April 19.—The "Bagshaw controversy" at the University of Washington was as far from settlement as ever to night. A student board of control meeting, called to consider Enoch Bagshaw's offer to resign as head football coach at the end of next season, was postponed until Friday after a conference between board representatives and administrative officials.

During the interim board members, faculty representatives and President M. Lytle Spencer, who was responsible for tonight's delay, will discuss a proposal with the hope of reaching an entirely new plan agreeable to the administration, Bagshaw and the board.

SENTENCED MANUFACTURER PAYS OWN FARE TO PRISON

(Associated Press Local Wire) MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 19.—John L. Robinson, president of John L. Robinson and company, cotton dealers, who chose to pay his own expenses to the federal penitentiary at Atlanta rather than go in the custody of a marshal, was on his way to the prison today unescorted.

He was sentenced by District Judge Harry R. Anderson on a mandate from the sixth circuit court of appeals, Cincinnati, charging him with aiding in the misapplication of the funds of a local bank.

MISSIONS TROUNCE BEAVERS 3RD TIME AND LEAD LEAGUE

MISSIONS DEFEAT BEAVERS AGAIN AND NOW LEAD LEAGUE

(By the Associated Press) Continued heavy clotting among the eight coast league clubs created a change yesterday in the standings, and virtually brought the series to a head, so far as tense competition is concerned.

With the help of two home runs by Smead Jolley, right fielder, the San Francisco Reds evened up the week's work against Oakland by winning 6 to 2.

The Mission Reds forged ahead to the top of the league by defeating the Beavers for the second consecutive time this week. The score was 6 to 0.

Sacramento's Senators hit the ball hard, unloading a string of base hits and homers upon three Los Angeles pitchers to score their second straight victory over the Angels 12 to 2.

Hollywood's Stars won from the Seattle Indians in the northern city by a score of 5 to 2, in a game which was featured in the first inning by the outburst of Ernie

Johnson, managers of the tribesmen, from the game for arguing with the umpire.

Los Angeles is second in the series standing with an average of .636, while the Mission Reds average .660, and Sacramento fourth with .522.

SINCLAIR LOSES OIL FIRM CONTROL

(Associated Press Local Wire) NEW YORK, April 18.—The Herald Tribune said today it had learned in well informed Wall street circles that Harry E. Sinclair, under three months' sentence for contempt of the United States senate, had lost control of the Sinclair consolidated oil corporation of which he is chairman of the board of directors.

The paper said a group which included Blair and Company, incorporated, New York bankers, Arthur W. Cutten, Chicago financier, and the Fisher brothers, automobile makers of Detroit, is understood to be the new dominant interest in the company's affairs.

BOMB STRIKES AS HOME GUARD DOZES

(Associated Press Local Wire) CHICAGO, April 18.—Michael Desalvo had known for three months that bombers would come, for extortionists had threatened violence if he did not pay them \$9,000. For three months, therefore, some member of the Desalvo family was on guard at the combination store and home 24 hours a day.

Last night the guard dozed, and an explosion wrecked the front of the building. Desalvo and members of his family were thrown from their beds, and windows in the neighborhood were shattered. Two dynamite bombs were used. Desalvo told police that he had received threatening letters, signed only by the black hand symbol.

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STORM DAMAGE MAY BE DEDUCTED IN TAX RETURNS

(Associated Press Local Wire) WASHINGTON, April 18.—The board of tax appeals ruled today that storm damage may be deducted from gross income in computing income tax in the cases of Mrs. Mary Cheney Davis, owner of Greystone farms at Dover, Mass., and the late Charles E. Choate, owner of a country home at Southboro, Mass.

Mrs. Davis sought to deduct \$30,000 from her income for 1921 because of damages done her property by a severe ice storm in November of that year. Choate had sought to deduct \$15,000 for damage done to his property by the same storm.

FORGER GETS TWO YEARS

(Associated Press Local Wire) BAKER, Ore., April 18.—Orville Kunzler, 30, Boise, Idaho, was facing two years in the state penitentiary today after he had been sentenced by Circuit Judge McCulloch yesterday. Kunzler waived a grand jury indictment charging him with forging a check for \$27 on a cigar store here April 9.

CLAIM OF BEING DRY AGENT DOESN'T BAR PRISON TERM

(Associated Press Local Wire) SAN DIEGO, Cal., April 18.—Although Paul J. Holland, federal prohibition officer, testified that E. C. Linthecum as an "under cover" man in his employ, Judge Marsh denied probation to Linthecum yesterday and sentenced him to San Quentin prison for illegal possession of a still. The court further denied release on bail to the convicted man, pending an appeal. Holland, formerly in charge of the San Diego office of the United States dry enforcement service, came to San Diego yesterday to testify for Linthecum at

his probation hearing. Linthecum has aided him in a number of cases and still is in federal employ. Holland testified. King J. Powell, head of the sheriff's dry enforcement squad, told the court that the defendant had violated the law, regardless of what connection he might have with the federal service, and Judge Marsh accepted his view of the situation.
