KIDNAPING CASE INFORMANT SLAIN; SUSPECT BROTHER

JOLIET, Ill., April 20.—Another important Chicago syndicate agent in the famous kidnaping case of last December has been assassinated in his own doorway, possibly because he "talked too much."

Joseph Perconti, 36, slain by shot or shotgun bullets shortly before last midnight, is the man generally believed to have given police information on which they found the kidnappers of 10-year-old Jimmy Rankin, who was one of those arrested with the kidnappers, and when the case against him later was dismissed, the understanding was that it was in consideration of information which resulted in the conviction of two men for the abduction.

Perconti had just put away his automobile in the garage at the rear of his home last night when two or more men from a carriaged automobile discharged sawed-off shotguns at him at close range. The two weapons later were found 150 feet away.

Among those being sought today for the slaying was Perconti's brother, Tony, who was one of those charged with the actual kidnaping of the Rankin boy but who never was apprehended. Police believe Tony may have killed his brother in the belief that Joe Perconti's story to officers had involved him in the abduction.

MEXICO GRANTS SANDINO PERMIT FOR "LONG REST"
