SENATE BOARD FIGHTS HOOVER ON FARM BILL

The Senate board of the farm organizations, issued late yesterday in response to inquiries from newspaper men, the president emphasized his previous declarations that a definite plan of principles was adopted by the Kansas City convention and that it was the plan of the party and not of one individual or group.

He said it was necessary the result of compromise; that it represented an effort to get together and establish fundamental principles and necessitated the yielding of views "by all of us"; that it was supposed by all elements of the party in the campaign, and that "upon it we have a clear mandate."

Reference to a mandate on the Kansas City plan also was made by Mr. Hoover. In his message at the opening of the special session of congress, and it is known that with suggestions for minor changes he approved the house bill without a debenture proposal.

Hoover Deplores Rift
WASHINGTON, April 20.—President Hoover deplores the lack of unanimity in the ranks of farm organizations over farm relief legislation on the ground that it only encourages those opposed to all farm relief.

President Hoover said that if the farm aid question was to be taken out of the political field and transferred to the realm of economics there was need for unity among the farm organizations. He maintained that there must be some compromise and converging of conflicting views if there was to be any real relief legislation.

He emphasized his view that the Kansas City convention adopted a specific plan, which was the plan of the party and not of any individual or groups of individuals or

organizations. The working-out of this plan, he added, necessitated some yielding of view by all concerned.

On that proposal there was clear mandate in the recent election, Mr. Hoover continued.

To Aid Water Areas
WASHINGTON, April 20.—Chairman Smith of the house irrigation committee has introduced a bill to authorize creation of a \$10,000,000 revolving fund to be loaned by the secretary of the interior to drainage and levee districts, counties, boards of supervisors and other political subdivisions.

The loans would be non-interest bearing and for a period not exceeding forty years. They would be secured by serial refunding bonds to be deposited with the secretary of the treasury and would constitute the first lien on the lands.

The measure would provide that not more than \$40,000,000 be appropriated in any one year toward the fund.

SLASH OF RATES ON RAIL-BARGE LINES ORDERED

connection with rail lines. It is both undesirable and unnecessary to set forth in greater detail the through routes and joint rates sought.

By further terms of the decision the railroads are required to enter into negotiations with the inland waterways corporation for the purpose of fixing the division of the joint rates as between the different agencies of transportation required to associate.

Several conferences have been held between railroad traffic officials and officials of the waterways corporation over the subject of division without result.

Rates to Be Equal
In consequence the commission said it did not attempt to limit the territory or describe rates by destination. It ordered the routes to make the joint rates and establish the through routes petitioned for by the barge line, subject only to a limitation that the rail carriers should not be required to make these where the use of the barge facilities would considerably lengthen hauls as compared with the available all rail routes. In addition it refused to allow the barge-rail rates to be 20 per cent lower than existing rail rates in all cases, and established a 10 per cent differential as sufficient on routes where the use of the barge would require longer hauls.

Further the commission denied the corporation's petition for the establishment of through routes which would utilize barge-rail-water rates, between points on the Atlantic coast and the lower Mississippi valley.

"There is nothing to show that the establishment of large-rail water rates made differentially under the all-rail rates would be in the public interest," the decision said. "We shall not at this time require the establishment of such rates."

AUTO OWNER BURNED TO DEATH AFTER COLLISION

TORONTO, Ont., April 20.—J. W. Barnes, president of the Eze Manufacturing company, was burned to death here early today after the car he was driving crashed head-on into a street car.

With the crash the automobile and the front portion of the street car caught fire. Barnes was imprisoned in his automobile, but the crew of the street car and twelve passengers escaped by climbing through windows.

agreement possible. They declare that their demands were scaled down to the lowest limits and amounted to less than one-third of the original reparations debt fixed by the reparations commission and that the German offer was less than a quarter of that debt. The margin between the proposals was so big that one side or the other must make a big change in its attitude.

Since the allies were determined not to pay the price necessary to pick up the negotiations, few here could see how a resumption can be made.

Tiger Scents War
PARIS, April 20.—Marcel Hutin, writing in the Echo de Paris today, says that Georges Clemenceau, France's wartime premier, takes an exceedingly grave view of the

attitude of Dr. Hjalmar Schacht in the present reparations deadlock. The journalist quotes Clemenceau as follows:

"His (Schacht's) refusal and his designs tend toward nothing less than a new war."

He further quotes "the tiger" as saying:

"The Germans have only to refuse now to pay the Dawes annuities to justify maintenance of our occupation of the Rhineland zones after the period provided in the peace treaty."
