"Finally, I wish to again reiterate that the problem of law enforcement is not alone the function or business of government. If law can be upheld only by enforcement officers, then a scheme of government is at an end."

an advocate of placing a limit of 500,000 tons on the annual importations of duty free sugar from the Philippine Islands.

"The public should be made aware of the far-reaching consequences," he said, "of these attacks on the proposed farm tariff relief." He added that the sugar fight was between farmers who had invested their savings in farm lands and equipment in this country and American capitalists who had invested in Cuba and the Philippines.

"It is a well known fact," he said, "that Wall street has a billion dollars invested in Cuban sugar. Under the island's tariff-favored position in the American market, Wall street found it more attractive to invest in the islands rather than in the United States. Without American capital, energy and leadership Cuba never would have increased its sugar output to the point where its overproduction threatens ruin for the American sugar industry."

LOCAL MARKSMEN MAKE POOR SCORE IN SUNDAY SHOOT

Roseburg trapshooters participating in the Oregonian's telegraphic shoot, had their poorest day of the season yesterday. Weather conditions were very unfavorable so that the team was forced to report a score of 72. C. A. Lockwood, E. J. Wainwright, and Walter Cordon each turning in a score of 24.

Roseburg was matched with Coquille, Prineville-Redmond and Central Douglas, the latter team being made up of marksmen of Sutherlin and Oakland. Coquille and Central Douglas turned in perfect scores, while Prineville-Redmond is unreported.

Roseburg was in sixth place last week and so is practically sure of a place on the 15-team match which is to be shot off later, but will probably drop further down the percentage column as a result of the poor showing yesterday. The shoot Sunday was the last of the qualifying round and the 15 highest teams will be matched for the final contest.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Roseburg Undertaking chapel with Rev. Matthews officiating. A Masonic service will be held at the cemetery.

U. S. AGREEABLE TO FRENCH PLAN FOR NAVY SLASH

GENEVA, April 22.—Hugh S. Gibson, American delegate to the preparatory disarmament conference in session here, announced today the United States was disposed to accept France's proposal of limitation of naval tonnage by categories. The offer, he said, was made in the hope of facilitating a general agreement on naval reduction.

The French proposal is that which provides for assignment of a total tonnage to each nation. This total is to be divided among categories of ships by specified tonnage as a basis of discussion.
