CHICAGO CUBS WIN BY SHUTOUT OVER 1928 CHAMPIONS

Showing of Team Thus Far Indicates It Has Good Chance to Capture 1929 Pennant.

Not that any one has denied it, but the time seems to have come for the experts to grant that Joe McCarthy's Chicago Cubs have something more than uniforms to prove they're baseball players and possible National League pennant winners.

Facing the St. Louis Cardinals at Chicago yesterday, the Cubs played bang-up ball behind Pat Malone's great pitching and won, 3 to 0, for their fourth victory in five starts. Holding the slugging Cardinals to five hits for his second victory of the season, Malone stretched the Cub pitchers' scoreless inning streak to 28.

"Old Pete" Alexander puzzled the Cubs until the fourth when Hornsby connected for a home run with the bases empty. After that they pecked away at the veteran with enough effectiveness to score single runs in the fifth and sixth innings.

Cincinnati Has Swatfest

After holding the Cincinnati Reds scoreless for six innings, Carmen Hill, bespectacled star of the Pittsburgh Pirates, blew up with a long report in the seventh and the Reds scored six runs before Remy Kremer could halt the carnage. The Reds added three more in the eighth to bring the final score to 9-4. Fifteen hits rolled off Red bats while Red Lucas was holding the Pirates to six. George Grantham didn't get any of them but he scored three times because Lucas insisted on giving him four consecutive passes.

In the American league, George Thibault pitched Detroit to a one-run shutout over the St. Louis Browns at St. Louis but he had some help from his mound rival, Jack Ogden. Jack's balk in the first inning coupled with two singles allowed the Tigers to score the only run of the game. Dale Alexander, big first baseman of the Tigers, was credited with driving in the tally, the 14th he has accounted for this season. That total incidentally leads both leagues.

In the only other major league game of the day, Al Thomas gave the Cleveland Indians nothing that they could hit and the Chicago White Sox galloped away with a 10 to 0 decision. About half the Cleveland pitching staff tried to stop the Sox batting spree with a distinctly noticeable lack of success.

SEALS BEAT OAKS AS OTHER TEAMS ARE WASHED OUT

The Seals, who had been engaged all last week in a nip and tuck battle with the Oaks, defeated their rivals from across the bay yesterday 12 to 3, and won the series four games out of seven. The game yesterday was the only one scheduled for the day in the coast league, having been postponed because of weather troubles.

Los Angeles and the Missions were scheduled to tangle on the local lot today in the first of this week's series. Sacramento was lined up at Oakland, San Francisco against Hollywood at Los Angeles, and Seattle at Portland.

The league leading Mission Reds have thus far in the season given many indications of walking off with the 1929 pennant. They were to engage this week against the second place Angels, and the tussle was expected to give the fans plenty of thrills. The Missions, however, with a big lead and much determined effort, should make a good showing.

GOV. INSPECTION OF FUTURE TURKEY CARS IS PLANNED

Directors of the Douglas County Turkey Growers association met yesterday at Oakland, the main purpose of the meeting being to pass a resolution asking the market department of the Oregon State college to arrange voluntary government inspection for future turkey shipments.

It is the plan of the association to market turkeys f. o. b. cars in the future whenever possible. Heretofore the turkeys have been sold at the warehouse and have been graded by representatives of the buyers. It was found, however, that the birds can be sold more profitably when the association does its own grading and loading, as the expense is reduced slightly below the amount charged by the buyers.

It will be necessary, however, in such cases to give the buyer some definite protection in the matter of grades. During the last shipping season there was a great deal of dissatisfaction because of the variation in grading by the different buyers. The association has a certain standard and under the government inspection plan there will be an impartial representative present to see that the birds are packed in accordance with the government standards. He will then issue a certificate that the birds come within the standards specified and this will be proof to the buyer of the quality of the birds purchased and at the same time the association can do its own packing.

Plans have been made for a school for inspectors to be held in one of the intermountain states during the summer.

TURKEY BREEDERS HOLD MEETING

The Douglas County Turkey Breeders association held a meeting at Oakland yesterday afternoon with an attendance of about 25 growers. The by-laws were adopted and several matters relating to the business of the organization were discussed. As Mrs. J. A. Form of Canyonville will be unable to serve as a director it was decided to appoint Mrs. George Olivanti, of Olalia, on the board of directors.

Plans were discussed for the turkey fair to be held in December or January. Representatives were present from both Oakland and Roseburg inviting the fair to their respective cities, but no decision was reached.

County Agent J. C. Leedy discussed the plan for tattooing turkeys in an effort to prevent theft, and demonstrated the machine used for that purpose. Eleven of the growers present announced their intention of adopting the proposed system.

EXPORT DEBENTURE PLAN EXPLAINED BY SENATOR McNARY

(Continued from page 1)

on exports of raw agricultural commodities or their food products. The bounty is payable in a form of currency denominated export debentures. The amount of the bounty so payable upon the export of an agricultural commodity is one-half the amount of the import duty on such a commodity. In the case of exports of food products, the bounty payable is proportionate to the amount of raw commodity consumed in the manufacture of the product. Debentures are legally tenderable at their face amount in payment of import duties.

"The cost to the government is the amount disbursed as the export bounty through the issuance of export debentures. Except insofar as exporters of debenturable commodities are also importers, the negotiable debenture certificates necessarily would be sold sufficiently below par to induce importers to use them in preference to cash in the payment of import duties. For this reason, the domestic market for the commodity would be influenced by somewhat less than the full amount of the debenture.

"The effect upon production of any increase in the price of the commodity would depend on the policy which the board might choose to adopt in invoking this optional provision."

Jardine's Ideas Adopted

Senator McNary said that with the exception of the export debenture plan, the bill he reported "is based largely on the plan advanced by the former secretary of agriculture, Mr. Jardine, and embodied in senate bill 4602 of the last session of congress."

The chairman said the senate bill did not presume to completely solve the farm problem.

"Neither this bill nor any other single measure," he declared, "could do all that needs to be done to strengthen the economic position of agriculture and to place it on a permanently better basis.

"There are a number of fundamental considerations underlying a sound and effective program for the aid of American agriculture in addition to the specific provisions of the present bill.

"While it is true that the troublesome problems have loomed large in our national thought, it should be recognized that there is a long time approach to the solution of the so-called agricultural problem.
