FEDERAL ARMIES IN MEXICO MARCH FOR "FINAL" BLOW

(Associated Press Special Wire)

MEXICO CITY, April 23.—News was expected hourly today of initial clashes near Matamoros, Sonora, between the principal rebel army, entrenched there and federal.

Last reports from General Talamantes, commanding 2,000 federal cavalry several miles in front of infantry and the main army said he had advanced cautiously as far as Luis, 12 miles south of Matamoros, but had found no enemy.

He was advised to be careful of ambush and not to move too far ahead of the main army, lest the 6,000 or 7,000 rebels at Matamoros and Sabantonia cut his horses to pieces before reinforcements arrived.

Moving of the principal federal

column, containing more than 8,000 men, with artillery and baggage was proving slow work, with further trouble on the newly constructed bridge over the Rio Fuertes, north of San Blas, Sinaloa, causing some delay.

With the outposts of the two armies so close to each other, however, long delay in initiating the clash—in which General Calles hopes to repeat his devastating victory over the army of the north at La Reforma, Chihuahua—was not believed probable.

General Juan Andres Almazan, "hero" of La Reforma, sent word to Chapultepec castle that he was beginning the movement of his 10,000 troops through Plio to pass into Sonora, and would shortly be in a position to attack the rebel army at its rear.

General Calles' tactics involved inflicting a crushing defeat on the rebels at Matamoros and driving those left alive northward against the army of General Almazan, where "extermination" could be completed.

The government made public statistics which it said were complete on the massacre at La Reforma. They showed 1,100 rebels killed and 2,000 made prisoner in three days' fighting. Sixty-one federal soldiers were killed and 312 wounded. A federal army of 8,600 men was engaged, the report said, with a rebel army of more than 5,000 men.
