HEAVY LOANS CUT DOWN RESOURCES OF OREGON BANKS

SALEM, Ore., April 23.—A report on the condition of Oregon banks and trust companies, released today by A. A. Schramm, state superintendent of banks, shows that on the call of March 27, the 237 banking institutions in the state had aggregate deposits of \$289,405,237.49 and total resources of \$338,741,453.93. This is an increase of \$3,950,163.54 over the total of \$334,751,294.41 for the corresponding call of February 25, 1928, but a decrease in resources of \$15,412,119.36 since the call of December 31, 1928. Deposits since the latter call have decreased \$15,455,467.82.

These decreases are accounted for by increased borrowings and national bank notes. "While this decrease in deposits and resources is generally regarded as seasonal in character," says the statement, "it is interesting to note that since 1921 there has been an average annual increase in the amount of such seasonal reduction."

In general banks are said to have experienced a heavy demand for money during the last 60 days, due particularly to the unusual winter which has resulted in a heavy demand for feed. The holding of unsold agricultural products is another reason given for the demand for loans.
