CHAS. RUSSELL'S \$500,000 ESTATE OBJECT OF SUIT

PORTLAND, April 23.—William S. Russell, son of Charles S. Russell, lumber exporter, who died March 11, has started action in circuit court here to contest his father's will, claiming that it is not a legal document.

The Russell estate is valued at approximately \$500,000. A will dated November 25, 1927, was filed recently and admitted to probate. It left the estate in trust with the United States National bank here, instructing the payment of the income to the widow and to William S. Russell up to \$1250 monthly.

Russell contends in his complaint, which names both the widow and the bank, that the will was made prior to November 25, 1927, and before his father's marriage to Duclah Russell on November 24, 1927, and that for these reasons it is void. He contends his father died intestate and that the estate should be administered accordingly.

DES MOINES, Iowa, April 23.—J. W. Reeder, who held President Hoover's hat on inauguration day, has been named defendant in a suit filed in district court by his five sons who seek to have the trust deed to their father's \$500,000 estate set aside.

HAL D. PATTON SERIOUSLY SICK AT SALEM HOME

SALEM, Ore., April 24.—Hal D. Patton of Salem, candidate for a consular post under the Hoover administration, is reported seriously ill at his home here. Patton served several terms in the state senate and is a member of the Salem city council. He is in the stationery business. Patton has some hope of receiving the consular appointment to Kobe, Japan, a position once held by his father, the late T. McE. Patton. A civil service requirement for this appointment, however, may bar his selection.
