FLOOD THREAT OF MISSISSIPPI GETS STRONGER

Quincy levee broke Wednesday after the river stage here had dropped nearly a foot.

No one as a matter of fact, seems to know which levees are most likely to go. They have no means of knowing as these dikes have a way of breaking when and where they are least expected to do so.

It is the condition of the levees which cause the uncertainty. Ever since last fall the river has been high and since March it has been above flood stage. The continued high water has soaked the dikes clear through and left them soft. Muskrats have bored holes, and "sand boils" resulting from sand strata moving under the levees, have made matters still worse. Levee guards, standing on what they consider sound places, do not know when the embankment will crumble beneath them.

Toll in Wyoming
CHEYENNE, Wyo., April 26.—Two dead and property damage in the immediate vicinity of Cheyenne estimated at well over \$100,000, was known to be the toll of the blizzard which isolated this section of Wyoming Wednesday.

With communication still cut off over most of the storm area, it was known that the property damage figures would mount and it was feared that marooned motorists and sheep herders caught far from shelter by the blizzard, might form additions to the casualty list.

A single telegraph wire from Cheyenne to Denver, which was repaired late last night, ended Cheyenne's isolation after all wires in every direction had been down for more than 48 hours.

Telephone and telegraph company officials estimated that it would be two weeks or more before normal service over the wires could be restored. Damage to wires in the immediate vicinity of Cheyenne was estimated at over \$75,000.

Cheyenne Activity Halts
Cheyenne presented the appearance of a deserted town with business at a standstill. Most schools closed and automobile traffic paralyzed. Snow, more than a foot deep, blocked downtown streets and electric power service was curtailed throughout the town.

Near Thermomolis, Wyoming, searchers found the body of George Ross, a sheep herder, buried under a snow drift less than one hundred feet from his tent. Ross apparently was caught away from the tent when the blizzard started and was unable to find his way back to it. H. H. Reed, of Glendo, Wyoming, dropped dead on a highway near Chugwater, Wyoming, apparently from exhaustion, after he had battled the snow drifts in his car for several hours.

COTTON MILL WORKERS IN BOMBAY ON STRIKE

BOMBAY, India, April 26.—A large scale cotton mill strike was started here today. Employees of 28 out of 84 mills responded to the labor leaders' general strike call and threw down their tools after the general lunch period.

A total of 100,000 men was involved. The trouble was believed to be the outgrowth of a failure of a conference between union representatives and mill-owners to discuss the alleged victimization of workers in the Wadia group of mills after the recent strike there.

The strike later extended to all cotton mills except about a half dozen and it was estimated that 120,000 men were now out.

WOMAN WHO POSED AS MAN DRAWS 9 MONTHS' TERM

LONDON, April 25.—Mrs. Irma Valerie Apple-Smith, London's woman masquerader, who for many months passed as a "man about town" under the name "Colonel Barker" was sentenced to nine months imprisonment at Old Bailey today on a charge of perjury in causing a false statement to be entered on the register of her marriage with another woman.

The woman had pleaded guilty to this charge yesterday, but not guilty to a second charge of perjury in falsely representing herself as a retired colonel in the British army.

DEATH TAKES COL. BUELL, BUFFALO BILL'S CRONY

LOUISIANA, Mo., April 26.—Col. Clarence Buell, one of the last surviving cronies of Col. W. F. Cody (Buffalo Bill), is dead at his home here. He had been ill for a month.

As Buell left his home in Baltimore, Md., and made his way to Cheyenne, Wyo., where he became a cowboy, Indian fighter, and friend of Buffalo Bill, he had resided here 33 years and had served as a deputy United States marshal. He never revealed his age.

COOS CHINOOK PIRATE GETS 60 DAYS IN JAIL

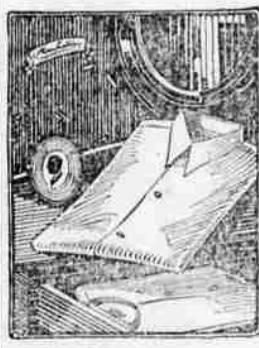
