Heflin Draws Ridicule
WASHINGTON, April 27.—The senate was told yesterday by Senator Heflin, democrat, Alabama, that he would discuss with them "the Roman republican conspiracy" in the United States senate. He made this statement after he again had been denied a vote on his resolution to condemn the attack made upon himself at Brockton, Mass., last month.

Despite the attempt of senate leaders to bring the Heflin resolution to a vote and permit consideration of the pending farm relief bill, Senator Blaine, republican, Wisconsin, objected. He said he was "vehemently" opposed to consideration of a "personal" matter.

Senator Heflin was on his feet at the outset of the session and again denounced what he said were the Roman Catholic influences opposing his resolution. Amid a roar of laughter, he put in the record a list of the senators up for re-election next year. He warned they would be called upon to meet "this issue."

A story from Birmingham, Ala., published in the Washington Post today and stating that the Alabama Woman's League for White Supremacy had denounced Heflin as "foolish and fanatical" was the target of his attack today. He said the Alabama organization "was a mischievous concern with not more than 100 members."

WOMAN'S FAILURE TO SELL TURKEYS LED TO FORMATION OF POOL

BOISE, April 27.—If Mrs. C. G. Brink of this city had not tried in vain to sell a load of fine Thanksgiving turkeys back in November, 1923, Idaho turkey growers might not today have a \$1,000,000 market for their product.

Arriving in Boise with her turkeys, one cold day, Mrs. Brink found that local butchers had contracted with the farmers for their supply. They were not interested in her fine fat birds. She tried to dispose of them from house to house, but the housewives had ordered from the butchers and were

not in a turkey-buying mood. Mrs. Brink had a sorry day of it.

Following that experience, she decided that the solution of the marketing problem was the formation of a turkey pool. By 1924 she had interested 14 turkey growers in an association. By 1925 it had 1800 members, and the eastern markets were clamoring loudly for their prize turkeys. During the Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons 100 carloads of turkeys, each carload valued at \$10,000, rolled out of Idaho railroads.

Although she has been secretary and general manager of the Idaho Turkey Growers' association since its inception, Mrs. Brink still raises several hundred turkeys a year on her own farm. She takes an active part in the civic life of Boise and belongs to the local Business and Professional Women's club.

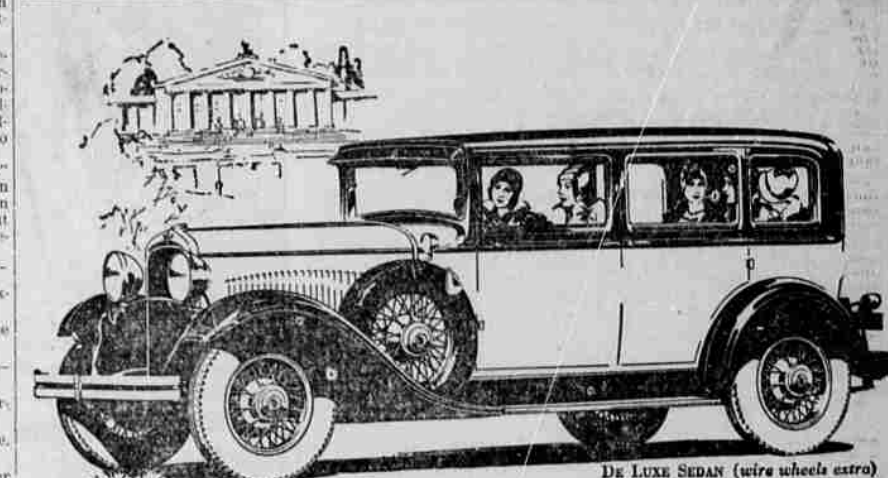
