"Foreign markets are steady."

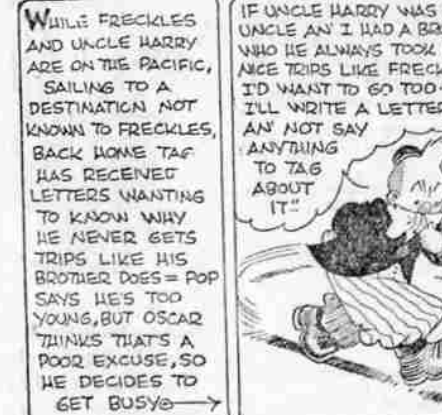

BRITISH GOLFERS BEAT AMERICANS, REGAIN RYDER CUP

(Associated Press Special Wire)

MOORTOWN, England, April 27.—British professional golfers today regained the Ryder cup by a smashing victory in the singles after their American rivals had established a bare lead in foursome play yesterday.

The cup changed hands when Young Henry Cotton won from Al Watrous 4 and 3 giving the British a point score of 62, enough even if the Americans should win the eighth match which was not finished.

The British pros surprised and shocked the Americans by their effective work in the singles after faltering in the foursomes where the home team was considered in better position.

In quick succession today Johnny Farrell and Walter Hagen fell before Charles Whitcombe and George Duncan. Leo Diegel struck a blow for the United States with a clean cut win over Abe Mitchell but Compton stopped Sarazen and Turnesa lost to Doormer before the next American point was registered by Horton Smith with a victory over Fred Robson.

The final score was registered at 7 1/2 to 4 1/2 when Ernest Whitcombe downed Al E. Pizora two up and one to play. This extended the American reversal in the singles to six defeats in eight matches played.

SALEM BOY WINS FIRST IN OREGON SPEAKING CONTEST

(Associated Press Special Wire) CORVALLIS, Ore., April 27.—Marvin Ryes of Salem was first place in the finals of the state extemporaneous speaking contest at Oregon State college last night. His subject was "The future of transportation in Oregon."

Grace Mason of Pendleton was second. Her subject was "Oregon as a future Mecca for tourists."

In the interpretation contest Norma Brown of Heaverton won first place, and Louise Thomas, Marshfield, second.

Winners in both contests received \$50 and a gold medal for first place, and a bronze medal for second.

C. A. Howard, superintendent of public instruction in Oregon, presided.

BOSTON REGAINS FIRST PLACE IN NATIONAL LEAGUE

Although the antics of the Boston Braves at the Polo grounds yesterday enabled them to defeat the startled Giants by 4 to 2, and so to mount the National League pennant, the rumble of Chicago and St. Louis artillery, heavy and light, occupied the attention of baseball addicts all along the front.

Falling for once to get high class pitching, the Cubs proved themselves equally able to win by brute strength as they outslugged the Pirates by 9 to 6. The belated Na-

bona league opening at St. Louis saw the Cardinals subject the Reds to torture by 9 to 2.

Jesse Haines was the master of the Reds in the St. Louis opening. Haines pitched a perfect 11 innings. The Cubs achieved seventeen hits on four home runs, Jake May and Eppa Rixey, and never permitted the Reds to even threaten.

The victory put the Macks back into first place, fourteen points ahead of the Browns, with whom they were tied before the games of yesterday. The Athletics gained an edge because of having lost fewer than the St. Louis team, which on games alone, is half a game ahead.

At Chicago yesterday the Browns assaulted old Red Faber for five runs in the eighth to win by 7 to 3. Coffman and Crowder divided the St. Louis pitching. Cleveland defeated Detroit by 11 to 5 and the Red Sox shaded the Senators by 2 to 1 in remaining American league games.

OREGON TRACKMEN DEFEAT STATERS

(Associated Press Special Wire) CORVALLIS, Ore., April 27.—The University of Oregon trackmen defeated Oregon State college 5 to 4 in the annual dual relay meet here yesterday. Five of the four relay marks set last year were broken, four of them by Oregon men.

Oregon ran the two-mile in 8:23.4, lowering the mark two-thirds of an inch.

The university men ran the 880 in 1:31.4, besting last year's time three-fifths of a second.

Oregon state lowered the time in the Suttle relay by doing it in 1:05.15. Last year's time was 1:06.45.

The university added two-fifths of an inch to the shot put with an average toss of 42 feet, 10 2/5 inches.

The four-mile relay record was bettered 4 1/5 seconds by Oregon. The new mark is 18:55.

The university athletes won four events out of nine on yesterday's program before the Orange teams could get going.

MISSIONS HANG ON TO LEAD IN COAST LEAGUE CIRCUIT

(By the Associated Press) The Mission Reds at San Francisco, again provided conclusive evidence yesterday that when the Pacific coast league standings are summed up this week-end, they will be the topnotchers for the third successive week.

The Reds defeated the Los Angeles Angels 10 to 7 and made this week's series between the two clubs even.

Oakland presented the Senators with their third consecutive defeat this week with a score of 8 to 4.

Hollywood evened up the series with San Francisco by winning their clash 4 to 2.

The Seattle Indians, tail-enders of the league, broke into the win column for a change, against the Portland Beavers, in the latter's home town, the score being 12 to 3.

Collard did well to hold the Beavers to 8 hits. Beck was hit for a total of 11 by the Redskins.
