LOWLY CINCINNATI
REDS DOWN CUBS
IN BATTING DUELUpward Climb of Cardinals
Halted by Pittsburgh;
Waite Hoyt Twirls
Third Victory.

Fighting in the western baseball sector Sunday saw the St. Louis Browns continue their mad pace as two national league favorites fell before so-called underdogs. The Cincinnati Reds, conceding to be as far under as it is possible for dogs to get, left the Chicago Cubs reeling under a 17 to 12 blow at Redland field, but found themselves severely battered by Bruin bats before it was called a day. The Reds led at one time by 12 to 2, only to see the Cubs pull up to within one of a tie by scoring once in the fifth.

Jess Petty pitched his first winning game of the year on turning back the Cardinals to 6 to 2 with only four safe hits. The Pirates themselves had their troubles with old Pete Alexander, and made the game safe only by a three-run assault against Sylvester Johnson in the ninth after Alex had given way to a pinch batsman.

Giants Trim Phillies
About 42,000 fans were enticed to the polo grounds by word that the Giants would trample the Phillies twice in the same afternoon. After Fred Fitzsimmons had toyed with the Shotton troops to win the opener by 8 to 2, rain fell in such a business-like way that giant officials were forced to send their customers home short-changed. Tracks Jackson picked up two home runs in the single melee, as did Hack Wilson in the game at Cincinnati. Hack, incidentally, batted home five runs, a record for the season to date.

The rain which drenched Flatbush and environs gave the Robins a chance to prove themselves as adept at losing in six innings as they were known to be in nine. The Braves accepted this decision by 5 to 2 and remained at the top of the peculiar standing of the national league clubs. Babe Breaslett got three hits, including a homer.

Hoyt Wins 3 Straight
Dube Ruth's second home run and Waite Hoyt's effective pitching pulled the Yankees through by 7 to 2 at Washington after the rain held up. The contest was delayed for more than an hour. Hoyt took his third victory of the young season, with a defeat yet to be experienced.

Boston fans, to the number of 25,000, finally had a chance yesterday to see a major league championship contest on the Sabbath, but the Athletics, entirely out of sympathy with the gala spirit of the occasion, romped back to Philadelphia with an edge of 7 to 3. The Red Sox led by 2 to 1, going into the sixth, but a well-timed assault upon Charlie Ruffing in that round solved Connie Mack's problem.

Blug Miller and Jimmy Dykes contributed home runs to the Mackian cause, and Dykes in addition crashed out two doubles. Eddie Rommel attended to the defense by serving the knuckle ball in his best style.

The 6 to 3 victory of the Browns at Detroit, coupled with the success of the Athletics, left these two contenders in a tie for top honors in the younger major circuit, each with a mark of .667.

The White Sox shaded the Indians by 2 to 1 at Chicago in the remaining American league skirmish.

MISSIONS CLIMB
FARTHER AHEAD IN
PENNANT STRUGGLE

Slight coast league clubs, functioning at top speed, staged seven-batter batting attacks for position in the stands yesterday, and when the smoke of battle had cleared away, the fiery Missions Red, who for three weeks straight have led the league in the campaign for the 1929 pennant, were farther ahead than ever.

Aroused to the point of anger be-

cause of the harsh treatment accorded the veteran Harry Krause in the morning, the Missions stepped out in the afternoon to batter their way to a 10 to 3 victory and the week's series here. The morning game resulted in a 5 to 2 win for the Angels.

Billy Lane's Hollywood boys defeated the San Francisco Seals twice in the day. The Seals won the first battle 2 to 1, in ten fast innings, and the second 4 to 2, in seven innings.

After the first game of the scheduled Seattle-Portland double-header had gone five innings one out in the Seattle sixth, it began pouring, so that umpires suspended the proceedings, and half an hour later called it off entirely, with the field resembling a miniature lake. Seattle won in the official innings 4 to 1.

The Oaks and Sacramento Senators broke even on yesterday's doubleheader. The home-towners taking the morning game 8 to 7, and the Sacs the afternoon 7 to 5. The morning win made it five in a row for the Oaks, who overcame a 7 to 2 lead to turn the trick.

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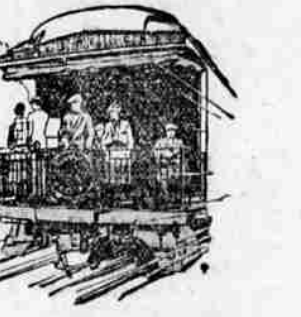

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BLAST DESTROYS
STEAMER; 17 OF
CREW MISSING

(Associated Press Lead Wire)

MANILA, April 29.—Seventeen members of the crew of the inter-island steamer Viking were missing today and apparently had perished in an explosion of the vessel's cargo of gasoline after it had caught fire in the Visayan sea, midway between the islands of Masbate and Cebu.

The ship was a total loss. The Swedish steamer Zeith rescued twelve survivors and the British freighter, City of Newcastle, and the inter-island steamer, Amata, came to the rescue but failed to find other members of the crew. Charles Olson, veteran inter-island skipper, is among those missing. Some of those rescued were badly burned.

NO LASTING PEACE THROUGH
FEAR, COOLIDGE SAYS

PHILADELPHIA, April 29.—Writing in the May issue of the Ladies' Home Journal, former

President Coolidge says "Men will not long recognize the sword as the major source of authority." "So long as there is evil in the world," he continues, "armies and navies will be required for domestic and international police service, but peace will never be made permanent by fear alone. It must have a main foundation of justice and good will strong enough to satisfy the reason and conscience of humanity."

Mr. Coolidge's article discusses "The Promotion of Peace Through Limitation of Armaments," and is the second of three on peace to appear in the publication.
