4 KILLED, 40 HURT ON N. Y. 'L' RAILWAY

vated train at 167th street, in the Bronx. Fire broke out on one of the wooden cars of the "L" train. There was a panic after the crash. Many women were hurt in the struggle to extricate themselves from cars not smashed in the collision.

The elevated train had stopped on signal and the express train of all steel cars rammed it with terrific force.

J. Cullen, motorman of the sub-

way train, and an unidentified youth, who was standing near Cullen's booth, were killed. An unidentified man, who was on the rear car of the "L" train also met death.

The collision occurred near the 167th street station, where the subway track run on the elevated structure. Both trains were south-bound and filled with persons on their way to work.

The fire hampered the work of rescuers. Policemen carried the injured along the tracks to the station and firemen raised ladders to the "L" structure to bring the victims to the street level.

The body of an unidentified youth was removed from the wreckage. Police said they believed there was at least one more body in the debris.

When police and firemen dug their way into the motorman's compartment of the subway train, using acetylene torches to burn away the twisted steel, they found Cullen with his hand on the emergency brake and the motor set in reverse. He had realized the imminence of a collision but too late.

The body of the boy, who was identified as William J. Schultz, 17, of the Bronx, was found wedged near the motorman's compartment. An hour after the collision stragglers were still trying to get out of the trains.

Passengers in Panic—They told of the wildest excitement after the crash. The passengers were thrown into the sides by the terrific impact to become a flying, screaming, struggling mass.

Police and firemen had to fight their way through a mad tide of humanity to reach the injured many of them unconscious, who were being trampled on the floors of the cars. Other firemen quickly extinguished the blaze, the danger of which had intensified the panic.

The elevated train had stopped on a signal just outside the 167th street station to allow a preceding subway train to clear when the following subway train came around the curve in the tracks to blow into its wooden rear coaches. Some witnesses said the subway train was not going over ten miles an hour at the time of the crash.

HOUSE'S NAVAL BODY HEAD HITS GIBSON'S PLAN

Mendelev, the preparatory commission rejected an amendment by Soviet Russia to substitute the word "reduction" for the word "limitation" for the word "limitation" and likewise throw out another amendment which Maxim Litvinoff, soviet vice foreign commissar, quickly introduced for "limitation and reduction."

Count von Bernstorff, the German delegate, dwelt on the fact that the great naval powers have announced their readiness to reduce the tonnage of their navies, adding, "Germany now demands a reduction in land forces. It is quite impossible for Germany to accept a conference which will degenerate into mutual protection against disarmament."

M. Litvinoff then quoted the remark on the naval question by Hugh S. Gibson, the American representative, made last week that the time had come to scrap the word "limitation."

Level Already Reached—Lord Cuthbertson tried to clarify the situation by recalling as the Chilean delegate had done that the league covenant calls merely for reduction down to a level compatible with security. He emphasized that some of the powers may already have reached that level and that hence it would be better not to change the word "limitation."

The British delegate explained that Great Britain had constantly reduced its army from its pre-war strength of August, 1914, by eliminating nine cavalry regiments, twenty-one infantry battalions and sixty-one artillery batteries and had reduced its army budget from £36,250,000 in 1925 to £23,223,000 in 1928. Therefore, he stated, it was possible that at the international conference Great Britain may have to say it is already down to the level required in the covenant.

The commission later approved a Czechoslovakian proposal exempting from limitation those national armaments which are not under control of the central government.

Alfred A. Wheat of New York to the District of Columbia supreme court.

Hoover Favors McCoy—WASHINGTON, April 29.—President Hoover is believed to be strongly inclined toward Brigadier General Frank McCoy of the army as governor general of the Philippines. However, it is his intention to defer the appointment for several months, as acting Governor Eugene A. Gilmore is administering the post at Manila to his satisfaction.

General McCoy is acting as chairman of the Paraguay-Bolivian commission of conciliation and investigation, and it will be probably many weeks before the commission completes its affairs.

Henry Scattergood of Philadelphia has been recommended to President Hoover by Secretary Wilbur for assistant commissioner of Indian affairs.
