He said details of the bill had not yet been formulated, but that he was discussing some of its features with advisors and expected to have it ready for introduction soon, possibly late today.

CAPTAIN OF LOST VESSEL SAVED; 13 STILL MISSING

MANILA, April 30.—Charles Olsen, veteran captain of the ill-fated inter-island steamer Viking, which caught fire and exploded last Sunday, was washed ashore on Taguigul island in the Visayan sea after being 23 hours in the water.

Olsen telegraphed to Manila today that the cabin boy of the Viking also was washed ashore on the island, as was the body of the second machinist.

The machinist is the only known casualty but no word has been received of the fate of 12 others of the crew. They were believed to have perished. Twelve survivors picked up by the Swedish steamer Delphi arrived at Corregidor island, Manila bay, this morning. Army physicians reported that two were severely burned but would recover.

The Viking caught fire late Sunday in the Visayan sea midway between the islands of Masbate and Cebu. She was destroyed when the fire reached gasoline in her cargo.

GOVERNOR TO BE SPEAKER AT JUBILEE

is running a special train from Roseburg, leaving at 7:30 p. m. and the auto caravan will start from the city at the same time, led by a group of traffic officers directed by E. R. Thurber.

The train and caravan are due to arrive in Glendale considerably before the time for the morning parade, which will start at 11 o'clock. The parade will feature lumber equipment, Glendale industrial floats and fraternal floats from neighboring towns.

Following the parade the crowd will move to the Glendale mill grounds where there will be an address of welcome and time given for the inspection of the new mill.

Tables have been built under the mill sheds where the basket dinner will be spread at noon. Visitors are expected to take their lunches and coffee will be furnished at the grounds. The Southern Pacific company will have a guard over the special train so that lunches may be safely left in the cars. The cars will also be kept spotted on the tracks during the day, so that visitors may obtain rest.

Bands Will Play

During the noon hour the crowds will be entertained by band concerts. The Roseburg and Grants Pass bands will be present and will play several selections during the hour. The Umpqua Chiefs and Squaws from Roseburg and the Cuyamaca from Grants Pass will then be presented in a group of stunts, after which a May Day fete will be given by a group of dancing girls from Grants Pass and Glendale.

The principal address of the day will be made by George Neuner, U. S. district attorney, of Portland, who has spent many years in southern Douglas county and has a deep personal interest in Glendale's achievements.

Umpqua post of the American Legion will present its drum corps in a drill following the address. This drum corps, which is one of the crack organizations of the state, is expected to put on several extra maneuvers for this exhibition.

An interesting program of sports has been outlined at the mill pond, where there will be log rolling contests, log bucking contests, pole walk, coin grab, tag-o-war, and other such stunts.

May Pole Dance

The crowd will then move again to the ball grounds, where there will be a May Pole dance by the Glendale school children, followed by a baseball game between teams from Glendale and Grants Pass, running races and athletic contests.

At 5 o'clock the street carnival will start. Concessions will be operated by the Roseburg and Grants Pass units of the American Legion. The street carnival will continue until midnight, and after 8:30 there will be a dance in progress at the Auditorium. There will also be a motion picture show during the afternoon and early evening for those who do not care to attend the ball game.

Glendale has worked hard to make a success of this great jubilee and has good cause for staging such an event, as every prospect is for an immediate expansion and development of that enterprising and enthusiastic community.
