I. F. DIX NAMED NEW WASHINGTON-IDAHO TELEPHONE CHIEF

Word reached here today of the appointment of I. F. Dix as general manager of The Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company in Washington and Idaho, succeeding C. E. Hickman, formerly of Portland.

H. D. Phillips, president of the company, in announcing the appointment of Mr. Dix at Seattle, said that the Pacific company business in Oregon would remain under the jurisdiction of H. R. Bailey of Portland, state manager since last December in charge of all departments of the telephone organization throughout Oregon.

Mr. Dix assumes his duties as the new general manager in Washington and Idaho on May 1. He came to the Pacific Northwest a few months ago from Southern California where for ten years he had been plant superintendent and general plant manager at Los Angeles. He began his telephone service 25 years ago in New York, but has spent the past 20 years in the business on the coast.

Mr. Hickman, who retired from the post now taken by Mr. Dix, will soon complete his 30th year of continuous service with the telephone company, all of it in Washington, in Oregon, his native state, and Idaho. He will retain his residence and his office in Seattle where he has been located since January, 1926.

PORTLAND GRAIN EXCHANGE GIVEN CONTRACT PERMIT

WASHINGTON, April 30.—The Portland grain exchange of Portland, Oregon, was designated a contract market for wheat in an order signed today by Secretary Hyde. The action gives that exchange the right to carry on future trading in wheat.

The action was in response to an application of the exchange which showed that it had complied with the conditions and requirements of the grain futures act. It will be the second market in the Pacific northwest permitted to carry on future trading. The Seattle grain exchange was designated a contract market in January 1926.

LANDING FIELDS TO BE PERMITTED ON FOREST RESERVE

The need for airplane landing fields and airports has been officially recognized for the first time by the U. S. forest service, according to information just given out by the district forester's office in Portland, Ore.

This official recognition is in the form of a new regulation approved by the secretary of agriculture governing the use and protection of national forest lands.

The existing regulation covering the issuance of special use permits for roads and trails has been amended to include airplane landings, reading as follows: "Roads and trails which are free public highways, and airports and air navigation facilities, which are open to the free use of the public."

Permits may be issued to municipalities, companies or individuals. Where no charge is made to the public by the lessee, the permits are issued free of charge, but where a commercial business is carried on, the forest service will fix a reasonable rental charge. Forest officials point out that all permits under the new regulation of the department of agriculture must conform to the air commerce act of 1926. Among the special stipulations to be included in all forest service permits are that authorized representatives of the department of commerce may inspect such airports, that whenever the president may deem it necessary for military purposes, the security of war may, assume full character of airports within national forests, that the premises shall at all times be kept free of inflammable refuse and every precaution taken to prevent fire, and that barrels of sand and fire extinguishers must be kept at all times on the airport.

COMMUNITY AND STATE FORESTS SHOW INCREASE

With 1,755,658 additional acres of forest land in the United States brought under state administration in the last three years, the total area of state forests now stands at 6,536,725 acres, according to reports to the Forest Service, United States Department of Agriculture. The greatest extension in state forest area during the three-year period since the end of 1925, was reported by the state of Washington, which added 1,200,000 acres. Pennsylvania added 167,788 acres to its 1925 total, and Michigan was a close third with an increase of 167,000 acres. Three states—Delaware, Georgia, and South Carolina—which had no state forests three years ago, reported forest lands under state administration at the beginning of this year.

Oregon is now concluding a land exchange with the U. S. forest service whereby she will acquire a state forest of some 70,000 acres in Coos and Douglas counties, known as the Millcreek tract.

Three years' growth in state park areas added a net area of 67,834 acres to the 1925 figure, bringing the total area of state parks to 436,877. Municipal and county forests and parks increased in total area from 697,447 acres at the end of 1925 to 726,577 acres at the beginning of this year.

The aggregate area of forest land owned by states, municipalities and counties in the United States on January 1, 1929, including other forest land besides that in forests and parks, was 12,126,945 acres.

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There are at present three official emergency landing fields within the national forests of Oregon and Washington—near Summit Ranger Station on the Mount Hood national forest; near Oakridge on the Cascade; the Race track, near Bend, Washington, just outside the Rainier forest.

MANY REASONS TOLD FOR CHICKS DYING IN SHELL

Chicks dying in the shells at hatching time may be traced to a number of conditions, says F. E. Fox of the poultry department of Oregon State college. The fault he finds may be due to lack of vitality or in breeding of the parent stock, or to lack of care in keeping the eggs at a proper temperature while saving them for hatching. If they are kept too hot or too cold, the embryo will be injured, and may develop right up to hatching time, and then die in the shell. Long holding of the eggs also weakens the embryo and causes it to die at hatching time.

The operation of the incubator also affects the hatch. If the temperature is too high or too low, the chicks developed may be too weak to get out of the shell. The moisture conditions may be unsatisfactory, thus preventing the normal development of the embryo by hindering the absorption of lime from the shell or affecting the proper shrinkage or enlargement of the air cell. Often a late hatch indicates too low a temperature, and an early hatch, too much heat. Either condition tends to weaken the embryos, killing many of the weaker ones outright.

Opening the incubator, during the hatch, either to take out empty shells or to help a chick out of the shell, is undesirable, as the moisture is allowed to escape, causing the membranes on the chicks to become so dry as to make it difficult for them to get out of the shell.

If evaporation of the egg, as indicated by weighing 19 eggs, is found to be more than 16 per cent, moisture may be supplied by placing a pan of wet sand in the bottom of the incubator, or lukewarm water may be sprayed over the eggs just before they start pipping, suggests Mr. Fox. He recommends that the temperature of the machine be kept at 102 to 103 degrees the first week, and after that from 103 to 104 degrees. Beginning with the third day, the eggs are turned twice daily until the nineteenth day. If the weather is warm, cooling the eggs in the evening until they feel cool to the lip or eyeball is often beneficial.

FAITHLESS WIFE AND PARAMOUR GET TERM OF 20 YEARS

MADISON, Wis., April 29.—Within 48 hours after she urged her paramour on in a murderous attack on her husband, Mrs. Rose Pope, 29, was sentenced to prison for 20 years. Phil Polster, 26, her paramour, who attacked her husband, John Pope, 38, a farmer, with acid and a wooden mallet Saturday night, received a similar sentence. They pleaded guilty to a charge of assault with intent to commit murder. They planned to kill Pope so they might marry.

Pope revived from the attack while they were seeking an automobile to carry him away, and escaped. He said his wife and Polster threw acid in the farmer's face and as the blinded man staggered into the yard, beat him with a wooden mallet until he dropped unconscious.

Pope partly regained consciousness and heard his wife urging Polster to "give him one more to make sure." He simulated death, but was struck again and left for dead. While his wife and her companion hurried to get an automobile to haul his body away, Pope remained consciousness. He escaped to a store a quarter of a mile distant. The attackers, returning and finding him gone, fled in fright.

COPCO STOCK FINDS READY SALE; PRICE ADVANCES TO \$101

At a recent meeting of representatives of the investment department of the California-Oregon Power company at Medford, Oregon, it was announced that sales of the company's 6 per cent preferred stock to its customers and friends in northern California and southern Oregon had progressed very satisfactorily during the past year. The issue of 15,000 shares approved by the railroad commission of California in March, 1927, is practically sold out, only a few shares remaining to be sold.

Since February 1, 1928, the stock has advanced in price from \$98 per share to its present selling price of \$101 per share. The company is limiting sales in an effort to give everyone in the territory which it serves an opportunity to invest and thereby profit in the earnings of the company.

MAN, DESERTED BY WIFE, KILLS THEIR 3 SONS AND SELF

FORT WILLIAM, OHL, May 1.—A 39-year-old paper mill employee deserted by his wife, yesterday strangled his three small sons and then committed suicide by throwing himself in front of a train. Discovery of the triple killing came after the finding of the body of Mike Walchin on the railroad tracks just after a freight train had passed.

Going to the Walchin home to notify relatives of his death, police found the three boys, Charles 7, Francis 5 and Norman 2, side by side in bed. They appeared to be asleep but on examination it was found they had been strangled to death with a silk scarf which had belonged to their mother.

Friends of the family said Mrs. Walchin had left some time ago to go to Regina, Sask. They did not know the cause of the trouble between the couple.

STEALER OF COINS AND BUYER GIVEN TERMS IN PRISON

WELLS, Upper Austria, April 30.—Ernest Deiters, trusted servant of the Duke of Cumberland, England, today was sentenced to three years at hard labor with a fast day every three months for theft of valuable coins, gems and watches of the duke's collection. The Goldsmith Pirochka, who purchased the stolen goods after they had been melted down and their value as antiques destroyed, was sentenced to two years' imprisonment.

The testimony showed that Deiters sold the various articles in the form of scrap gold and silver for \$1,020 which he lost at gambling. The goldsmith acknowledged at the trial today that he had sold the entire lot for \$98,000 although he gave Deiters only \$1,020.

YOUTHFUL AUTO THIEVES PAROLED FROM PRISON TERM

PORTLAND, Ore., April 30.—Homer Van Horn, 18, and Rupert Jones, 19, who stole an automobile in California and drove it to Ashland, Ore., were sentenced to one year and a day at McNeil Island today and then paroled by Federal Judge McNary. Van Horn was paroled to his father, and Jones to his attorney.

Van Horn's father, F. D. Kenoyer, of Manhattan Beach, Ore., was instrumental in obtaining the parole for his son. He had not seen him for 16 years. When young Van Horn was but two years old his father and mother separated, the mother going to California and the father remaining in Oregon. Since that time Kenoyer had not seen his son. He learned, however, that the mother had remarried. When Kenoyer read that a boy named Homer Van Horn was under arrest, he came immediately to Portland.

LORD YOUNGER DIES SUDDENLY, AGED 77

LONDON, April 30.—Lord Younger, bitter enemy of David Lloyd George, Liberal leader and former premier, collapsed at the Prince of Wales theatre last night and died almost immediately of heart disease. He was 77 years old.

Lord Younger, an old school conservative, added Andrew Bonar Law, former conservative premier, in putting Lloyd George into power as coalition premier in 1919, but in 1922 ruthlessly consigned him to the political background when he insisted the coalition had outlived its usefulness. The general election following was a conservative landslide.

WIDOW DENIES SHE SHOT HER HUSBAND

STRAFFORD, Conn., April 30.—Mrs. Gladys Foster Bearse, young widow of Oliver Bearse, 51, of Stratford, who died Thursday from a bullet wound, was ready to give her version of the shooting at the coroner's inquest this afternoon when she says will refute the police charge that she fired the shot. "I want to tell just what happened," she said this morning. "I didn't shoot my husband, and I think the coroner will believe my story."

"I don't think he intended to shoot himself. I think he did it to scare me." Mrs. Bearse referred to her husband throughout the interview as "Deaky," a pet name.

SENATORS HALT SESSION TO SHAKE LINDBERGH'S HAND

WASHINGTON, April 30.—The senate took a ten-minute recess today to greet Col. Charles A. Lindbergh.

Standing between Vice-President Curtis and Senator Bingham, republican, Connecticut, who brought the aviator into the chamber Lindbergh smiled and shook hands with the senators as they filed by to congratulate him on his exploits.

When the senators had passed, the senate pages pressed forward and shook hands with Lindbergh while the galleries broke into applause.

Lindbergh appeared before a senate committee today to tell what he knows of airports in other cities and to offer suggestions for the construction of a new one in Washington.

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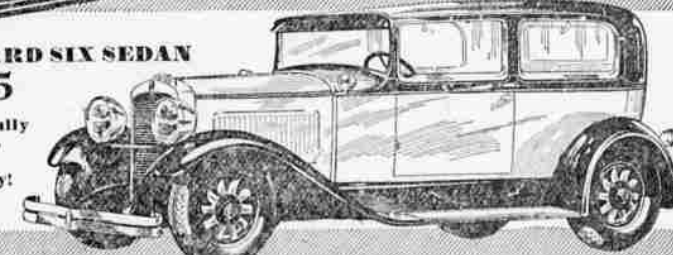
