

FLORIDA WARS ON INSECT TO SAVE FRUIT INDUSTRY

Invasion of Mediterranean
Fly Compels State to
Use Every Means of
Extermination.

Congress Votes \$4,250,000
to Aid Warfare; Damage
Already Inflicted
in Hawaii.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—The
sensational battle with the Medi-
terranean fruit fly at Orlando, Fla.,
may be only the opening shot in
one of the country's greatest fights
to exterminate a foreign pest, fed-
eral officials fear.

The full force of the federal gov-
ernment's powerful machinery for
fighting fruit pests is behind the
drive. Congress has already appro-
priated \$4,250,000 to carry on the
fight.

Decision of the federal horticultu-
ral board to embrace all of Flori-
da in a quarantine controlling the
movement of fruits and certain
vegetables opened the door to fed-
eral participation in the battle. It
was reached after conferences with
Florida officials and citrus grow-
ers.

The quarantine is in no sense an
embargo, but all shipments will be
made in accordance with regula-
tory measures.

Pest Long Known
For 100 years the Mediterranean
fruit fly has been known to science
and during that time has spread
throughout the world. Until it ap-
peared in Florida, North America
was the only large area to escape.
There is no knowledge of the
manner in which it gained en-
trance. Heretofore, it has been
kept out of this country by an em-
bargo on certain products from in-
fested countries. The process has
required the constant vigilance of
the federal horticultural board.

Every possible barrier against
the pest had been erected by state
and federal quarantine and it was
believed little danger of its gaining
entry through the medium of com-
mercial shipments of fresh fruits
existed.

Great Danger Seen
Destructiveness of the fly in other
countries and the fact that it is
almost impossible to control adds
to the seriousness of the outbreak
in this country.

The Mediterranean fruit fly is
one of the worst enemies of fruit
grown in tropical and semi-tropical
countries. In the Hawaiian islands,
where it has caused great damage
since 1910, it attacks 75 kinds of
fruits, including oranges, grapes,
fruit, lemons, limes, peaches, ap-
ples, guavas, pears, plums and
grapes.

An indication of its potential
danger to various parts of the
United States is seen in the fact
that it attacks such vegetables as
tomatoes, and even destroys cot-
ton bolls.

Most of the things subject to
the pest now are grown or can be
grown in the southern states, the
gulf region, California and the
southwest.

The fly lays its eggs beneath the
skin or shell of fruits, nuts and
vegetables, and the feeding larvae
may destroy the interior comple-
tely. Often damage is not apparent
until infested fruit starts falling.

**HAWLEY SAYS NO
ALIEN DICTATION
OF U. S. TARIFF**

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Chair-
man Hawley of the house ways and
means committee today declared
before the chamber of commerce
of the United States that while
tariff suggestions from foreign
countries had been considered by
the committee in framing tariff re-
vision legislation that "we alone
have the right to say what shall
happen" to the market created by
"American ingenuity and American
labor."

Speaking after C. H. Calman, of
the Canadian parliament, suggest-

ed that his country might be
forced to take retaliatory measures
against increased schedules. Chair-
man Hawley said that in the United
States the tariff was regarded
entirely as a domestic question.
"To be settled by us alone."

"We have no intention of ex-
cluding foreign products from the
American market," he said, but
added that the United States had
no intention of throttling her in-
dustries and impeding her own de-
velopment. The ways and means
committee, he said, considered and
"scrutinized" communications from
foreign countries, but centered at-
tention on the evidence submitted
by the thousands of American wit-
nesses.

**HEFLIN ATTACK
RESOLUTION LOST
IN U. S. SENATE**

WASHINGTON, May 1.—The
senate refused today by a vote of
68 to 11 to adopt the resolution of
Senator Hefflin, democrat, Ala-
bama, condemning the attack on
himself at Brockton, Mass., after
he had delivered an address there.

Senator Hefflin had argued con-
siderable religious debate over his
resolution after he had charged
that opposition to it was influ-
enced by the Roman Catholics.

Senator Watson of Indiana, the
republican leader, called for a vote
on the resolution today after Heff-
lin had given notice he would dis-
cuss it again.

Those supporting the Hefflin
resolution included the republicans,
Koblenz of Indiana and
Buckett of Kentucky. At the time
of his visit to Brockton to address
a meeting of the Ku Klux Klan,
Senator Hefflin was assailed with
misallies, one of them a bottle,
which missed him and struck a
policeman.

**ENGLISH MAIDS REJECT
RICH AMERICAN'S BAIT**

LONDON, May 2.—The Rev. Jo-
seph Sheppard, minister of Isling-
ton chapel, announced today that
he has been unable to find anyone
in his district who would accept
the offer of a "rich American" of
a luxurious home and an allowance
of \$15,000 annually to the woman
who would leave London, marry
him and live in the United States.

The minister said that he made
the offer known to a large number
of women and girls in his district,
but while appreciating the offer
all told the same tale.

"We would rather be poor in En-
gland than millionaires' wives in
America."

POLICE HEADS AND POLITICIANS FACE CHICAGO CHARGES

CHICAGO, May 1.—With six po-
lice captains, several prominent
politicians, and others—25 in all—
reported named in true bills by the
Cook county grand jury, State's At-
torney John A. Swanson, and his
 aides today hinted at further sen-
sational disclosures concerning a
syndicate which is said to have
netted \$20,000 daily through the op-
eration of slot machines.

The true bills were expected to
be returned today in the form of a
conspiracy indictment.

Among those reported named by
the grand jury were:

Police Captains Patrick J. Col-
lins, brother of the late Michael
Collins, minister of defense and
finance of the Irish Free State,
who was assassinated; Dennis
Malloy, once discharged from the
police department, but reinstated;
Richard Gill; Michael Tobin;
Hugh McCarthy, and Michael De-
laney.

Dr. William H. Reid, former city
smoke inspector and prominent
south side politician whose home
was bombed twice.

Frank J. Heran, custodian of the
police department.

Sergeant Robert Sullivan.
Edward "Spike" O'Donnell, re-
puted beer runner, racketeer and
gangster.

Arthur E. Dyer, republican com-
mitteeman.

William Hogenhausen, republican
ward committeeman and secretary
of William Hatten, commissioner
of public service.

The slot machine crusade grew
out of an investigation into the
death of Mrs. Selma Burnham,
wealthy widow of the head of the
Burnham Vending Machine com-
pany. The company's records were
searched for possible clues to her
death. They furnished none, but
did give the authorities an inkling
of the vast operations of the slot
machine syndicate.

**STRANGLER LEWIS
BEATS STECHER IN
THEIR 6TH MATCH**

LOS ANGELES, May 2.—Ed
"Strangler" Lewis, of the dazzling

**NO ELECTION THIS
YEAR ON TWO EXTRA
PORTLAND JUDGES**

SALEM, Ore., May 2.—The at-
torney general's office stated yes-
terday that if petitions for refer-
endum of the Multnomah county
circuit judge act are successful the
measures cannot be voted on until
the regular election of November,
1930. There has been an impres-
sion that the measure could be
voted on at a special election June
23, this year, but it is explained
that this cannot be done.

The legislative act providing for
the special election in June limited
such election to referendums that
might be invoked against the ex-
cise and the intangibles tax acts.
No referendum has yet been start-
ed against those acts. The income
tax act was not included for the
reason that its proponents hoped,
by leaving it out of the special
election bill, an attack on it would
be forestalled.

If the referendum of the bill cre-
ating two new circuit judgeships
in Multnomah county and the in-
come tax referendum are to suc-
ceed the competed referendum peti-
tions must be filed with the sec-
retary of state not later than June
3, this year. The petitions must
have at least 15,556 names.
