WASHINGTON, May 2.—During an attack today upon Senator Jones, republican, Washington, Senator Hoffin, democrat, Alabama, was warned by Vice-President Curtis that Senate rules prohibited one member from referring to a colleague in an "uncomplimentary manner" and the Alabama senator was short in a statement about Jones.

After Hoffin had started his attack on Jones for voting against the Alabama's Breckin resolution, Mr. Curtis took over the chair as presiding officer.

"The senator from Washington," Hoffin began, "is not temperately fit to—"

The sentence was not permitted by the vice-president to be finished.

"I would warn the senator of the rules which prohibit him from referring to another senator in an uncomplimentary manner," Mr. Curtis said.

Reading from newspaper accounts of the vote on his resolution yesterday, Senator Hoffin declared that the vote was said to have been involved.

"Playing politics while the rights of Americans are at stake," he shouted, "Playing politics like Nero playing the fiddle while Rome burned."

HUNT VISITOR HERE—
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Oregon Hop Growers Line UP FOR UNITED BATTLE

SALEM, Ore., May 2.—Approximately one-fifth of the 517 hop growers in Oregon have in five days responded favorably to the proposal that the growers and others interested in the industry be organized into an association to co-ordinate action and to carry on educational and research work to promote the industry, according to Frank E. Needham, who is directing the organization movement.

Mothers of college students—many hundreds of them in person—will be honored in Corvallis the weekend of May 11 and 12 at the annual Women's Day events. For the first time mothers of men students as well as those of the girls have been included in general invitations to come and be guests of the students and the college, completion of the memorial union building having made entertainment of the larger group possible.

Women's week-end on the campus, which will be celebrated for the sixth year, has become a traditional entertainment and educational event when the place of women in the modern world is considered. No restriction among the mothers as such has been created nor is any contemplated, but it is the one occasion of the year when mothers come in a body to take part for a day in the college life of their children.

The annual mothers' banquet Saturday night will be held for the first time in the memorial union building, where covers will be laid for 1500 persons. Principal speaker for this occasion will be Mrs. W. P. Remington of Portland, wife of Bishop Remington of the Episcopal church. Her subject will be "Mothers in Relation to the Spiritual Side of Life."

President W. J. Kerr at this banquet will speak on "Mothers in Relation to Schools." Marshall Dana of "Mothers in Relation to World Affairs" and Marlen Miller, famous columnist on the Oregonian, will speak on "Mothers in Relation to Society."

Mrs. Remington will also address a morning assembly of women students.

An entertainment event of the afternoon will be the annual dance festival on the campus lawn, while a new event this year is a special luncheon Saturday noon for launch of the American Association of University Women's memorial scholarship fund in honor of Dr. Margaret Snell. Many former students of Dr. Snell will attend.

Mothers of several Roseburg students will attend the weekend event on the college campus, as Roseburg is represented by several students on the college roll.

next, led by the band, and the Cavemen. A beautiful float, occupied by bathing beauties, who throw flowers to the onlookers, was a feature of the Grants Pass section.

Grants Pass and Roseburg cars followed, and then came the lumber section of the parade. This was particularly interesting to persons not acquainted with the lumber business, and who had an opportunity to see the huge trucks and trailers with their heavy loads of timbers, the big caterpillars and other equipment used in the logging operations in the Glendale vicinity. An interesting display was also made by the Douglas County Fire Patrol.

The first prize for decorated cars was awarded to Boyer and Street of Astoria, second prize to Mrs. Bud Belcher. The first prize for floats went to Mr. Regis, of Glendale, and second to the Glendale Health association. First prize for logs went to J. S. Woodruss, and first for lumber to Jenks Lumber company. The health group of the schools won the first prize for the schools and the circus group took second place.

Program at Mill
The parade wound its way to the mill grounds, where the program was introduced by R. M. Eberle, president of the chamber of commerce. The invocation was given by Rev. Joseph McVey, after which Mr. Eberle gave the address of welcome. A flag was presented to the city of Glendale by the Grants Pass post of the American Legion. A group of school girls then appeared in a Maypole dance. The mill crew started work at 11 o'clock, and during the noon hour the visitors were given an opportunity to go through the plant, being piloted by special guides.

During the noon hour the Roseburg and Grants Pass bands played concerts. The Glendale ladies served out "hot dog" sandwiches and coffee to hundreds of the visitors, but most of the people present were supplied with lunches, which were spread out on the tables furnished for that purpose.

At 1:30 p. m. the formal program

opened with a short address by Governor L. L. Patterson, followed by the chief talk presented by George Neuner, U. S. district attorney. J. H. Mulvey, Southern Pacific representative, also made a brief talk. This was followed by an exhibition drill by the Umpqua post drum corps, and the sports at the mill pond.

The log bucking contest was won by Carl Christiansen, his time being 3 minutes, 39 seconds. The log rolling contest went to Paul Bartel with C. H. Good second. The pole walk in which boys tried to walk a slippery pole over the pond in an effort to reach a flag at the end of the pole, furnished a great deal of amusement. Paul Bartel won first prize and A. Young second.

Immediately following the sports at the mill pond, there was a caterpillar race staged for the Patho cameraman, the huge tractor racing across the field dragging heavy logs.

The baseball game was played between teams from Glendale and Myrtle Creek, Glendale winning by a score of 18 to 7.

Numerous street concessions operated by individuals and by the American Legion posts, supplied plenty of amusement during the afternoon, and evening, and more particularly during the street carnival which opened at 5 p. m. A dance was held at the Auditorium from 9 p. m. until midnight.

Altogether the day was most successful and the program was presented in a manner that caused the citizens of Glendale to be deserving of a great deal of credit.

A four-hour count to secure an estimate of the crowd attending resulted in the listing of 900 visiting automobiles and a crowd estimated at 5,000 people. The jubilee ran full force until the small hours of the morning, as the crowds that left in the afternoon were replaced at night by another group that was particularly interested in the street carnival and dance and remained until well after midnight.

He thus also rejected DeGroot's request for a public hearing. Mitchell having told him that a hearing had been held under Secretary Mellon, and that "it would be a waste of time to comply with Mr. DeGroot's request for any further hearing."

Still After Mellon
WASHINGTON, May 2.—A proposal to call Secretary Mellon for questioning regarding his right to head the treasury department in view of an old statute forbidding the treasury secretary to engage in trade or commerce was discussed for two hours today by the senate judiciary committee, but no action was taken.

The committee decided to meet again tomorrow.

Introduction of a deposition made by Mr. Mellon in an old lawsuit in which he told of his interest in a transaction of the Aluminum Company of America, of which he is a stockholder, has raised the point as to whether the committee is to examine the secretary for violation of the law or whether it is to confine its inquiry to an investigation of the law.

Senator Borah, republican, has asked the committee. If it is to hear the evidence of Senator Walsh, to make the inquiry an open one and give Mr. Mellon opportunity to be heard.
