INDIAN DENIED TRIAL
IN MEDFORD COURT

PORTLAND, May 3.—Trial of Teddy Captain, Klamath Indian charged with second-degree murder of a tribesman, Morris Lotches was set for June 19 in federal court today. Captain's attorney's request that the trial be set for Medford was denied. Judge McNary raised the Indian's bond to \$7,500.

Captain declared at the time of the shooting, that another Indian had insulted Captain's mother and sister and that as he aimed to shoot him, Lotches, Captain's friend, stepped into the line of fire.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 3.—Two men were in a hospital here today, both seriously wounded as the result of a revolver duel over the affections of a girl.

John Pietzel, proprietor of a pool hall, has a bullet through his chest. An unidentified man, about 25, who gives only the name of "Smith," is near death with three bullet wounds in his chest and one through his head.

W. F. Gorman, an employee of the pool hall, said the two men had been quarrelling all morning. Finally Smith shouted at Pietzel: "I can shoot you this minute if I want to. I have a gun."

Pietzel laughed and shortly afterward went into a rear room. Smith followed him. The shooting followed.
