AUTHORESS OF SEX PAMPHLET CHOOSES PRISON TO FINE

and emotional facts. It gives the proper terminology for the sex organs and functions, and has four diagrams.

Sought to Show Place of Sex in Life
It endeavors to eliminate fear by stating candidly that universal disease is becoming more common, and it points out that sex is more than a physical sensation but takes in the emotions of the mind and soul and that is why so much of happiness is dependent on it.

"I wanted my boys to know the facts of sex," Mrs. Bennett said. "And I wanted them to see them in a wholesome way, not to feel that sex was something unclean and stealthy, that one talked about in whispers with other boys."

"I wanted them to read about sex so they would not feel it was a nasty subject and have nasty thoughts about it. It should mean everything that is highest and best and happiest in human life, but it can be easily perverted and ruined and made the cause of horrible suffering of both mind and body."

"I believe that the men who served on the jury—one of them stood during the entire trial—were themselves the victims of unscientific sex training. I should be willing to venture that most of them had irreparable harm done to their own minds in childhood by nasty concepts of sex—and any reminder of it is unwholesome to them."

"It is because of this lack of sex education; this lack of scientific information on the subject, that I wrote the pamphlet for my own children. I do not blame the jury now, but I do protest against the policy of laws which make truth criminal. I am against a system of censorship which puts the opinion

of one prejudiced person or group of persons against that of the educated and advanced people of the country.

"It is criminal to tell the truth, then I am willing and anxious to go to jail for my principles."

Mrs. Bennett insisted, however, that in spite of her own predicament she considered that the matter of sex education had improved immeasurably in this country in the last ten years.

Many Other Books "Just as Frank" "Sex education is now available in boys' camps, in public schools in Y. M. C. A.'s," she declared. "There are any number of good books obtainable now that were not on the market when I wrote my article for my own sons. In fact, there now would be no need of my writing it, because there are several that are just as frank and even more detailed than mine."

Morris Ernst, attorney for Mrs. Bennett, pointed out that the government itself published and circulated such pamphlets. He quoted from "Sex Education," a pamphlet issued by the treasury department of the U. S. public health service: "The United States Public

Health Service has prepared a number of pamphlets to meet the need of special age and sex groups. "Since the government itself acknowledges the need for sex education, where is the logic in making a criminal of a woman who supplies it?" demanded Ernst, pointing out that the defense was not given an opportunity to put on the stand experts who would testify to the educational value of the pamphlet.
