INJURED LIST PUT AT LEAST ONE HUNDRED

ditional victims of the tornado that yesterday claimed the lives of 13 children and one teacher in the greatest disaster ever known to this western Virginia mountain village.

Several children were reported missing early today, and because of the wide area from which the school drew its students, no complete check was possible.

Blow Without Warning

Caught without warning as they were re-entering the two story frame school house after the noon recess, some of the children were blown 100 yards and others buried in the wreckage when the building was demolished by the storm.

A S. Noblin, principal of the school, estimated that about 155 pupils were in attendance, in addition to the eight teachers. Noblin lost consciousness when hurled to the ground but was not seriously injured.

About 15 children, the most seriously injured, were taken in ambulances to Bristol and Kingsport while others were sent by automobiles, trucks and wagons to the nearest railroad station at Clinchport where a train was converted into a movable hospital to take them to Bristol. Twenty-seven children were transported to Bristol on this train.

The scene on the train was pathetic. Many small boys and girls suffered in silence and bore with stoical calm their broken arms and legs. Some feebly attempted to carry on conversations with their attendants and one small girl fainted from the pain of a broken leg when placed in an ambulance. Identification tags were pinned to the children.

Because of the location of Rye Cove, it was more than two hours before aid could reach the strike on a road over the mountain roads.

J. M. Johnson, a farmer, was standing on the mountain side when the storm struck and watched its progress for three miles.

"The school building," Johnson said, "vanished in a moment's time. You could see it going down the valley. It ripped apart and a rain of lumber and debris began."

The Red Cross had taken over relief work today and the unit at Bristol was being reinforced from Washington and Cincinnati. Tents and other supplies were administered to those suffering from lacerations while all available physicians and nurses at Bristol and Kingsport were called into service.

The list of known dead at Rye Cove follows: Ava Carter, 24, a teacher of Cove Creek, Va.; Miss Millie Stone, Rye Cove; Bruce Cox, 18, of Gate City; Polly Carter, 14, of Rye Cove; Bonnie Fletcher, 14, and Bernice Fletcher, 14, of Rye Cove; James Carter, 14, of near Rye Cove; Bertha Mae Barnett, 12, Rye Cove; Emma Lane, 6, and Ethel Lane, 14, of Rye Cove; Della Bishop, 10, of Cove Creek; Little Lee Carter, age and address unknown; three unidentified dead.

Casualty Victims

WASHINGTON, May 3.—Telephone reports to the Associated Press today placed the number killed by tornadoes in nearby sections of Virginia and Maryland at nine. Five were reported dead at Catlett and Woodville, Va., three near Laytonville, Md., and one at Unity, Md.

The dead at Catlett, Va., included Charles L. Allen, 50, and his two daughters, Misses Myra Allen and Emma Allen, 16, and H. H. Laws, aged 40. Marshall Hawkins, 14, of Woodville, Va., lost his life when struck by falling timbers.

Three members of the Childs family, Mrs. William H. Childs, 59, Florence Childs, 9, and Hampton Childs, 15, were killed when a twisting wind swept the farmhouse of F. Bowls Childs near Laytonville, Md.

Mrs. Amelia Kaupp, mother-in-law of Charles F. Haight, of Catlett, Mo., was fatally injured when the storm struck the eight dwelling.

Four persons were reported as receiving injuries in the Maryland storm and the list of injured in the Woodville and Catlett tornadoes was placed at eight. Some of them are in a critical condition.
