MANY FORMER GLENDALE PEOPLE ATTEND JUBILEE

Ex-Residents Return to Join
in Celebration Marking
Opening of the New
Sawmill.

GLENDALE, May 3.—Among the many former residents of Glendale to come to the city to attend the Lumber Jubilee was Mrs. J. B. Howell of Grants Pass. Mr. and Mrs. Howell made their home in this city for a number of years. Mrs. Howell is a daughter of one of the earliest sawmill men in this locality, D. McCullough, and the creek on which he had his sawmill now bears his name. The site of this early day sawmill is on McCullough creek about a mile from Lystul siding. This mill was operated by water power and consisted of a single up and down saw and was built in the early '50s. Mrs. Howell spent part of her early childhood days with her parents at the home on McCullough creek, near where the mill stood. Traces of an orchard that they planted may still be seen.

Mrs. Jesse Smith, formerly Miss Nellie Johnson, who spent many of her earlier days in this vicinity, was another visitor to the Jubilee. She now resides on a ranch near Myrtle Creek. Her husband was a logger many years ago for the former Lystul-Stuvland Lumber Co. when this concern was operating on McCullough creek.

Mrs. W. A. Blackford said she just had to come to Glendale to see what all this Lumber Jubilee was about. She spent most of her girlhood days here and has a large circle of friends locally.

D. G. Millett, a resident of Glendale and Fernvale in the early 1900s, is spending several days in the city renewing old acquaintances and visiting with his many friends here. While he came down to attend the Lumber Jubilee, Mr. Millett was a very interested visitor at the Odd Fellows meeting held last Tuesday evening, where he was presented by the lodge with a fine gold emblem attesting to his 25-year record of being a member in good standing for that period. He now resides at Molalla, Oregon.

Chas. Noah of Fort Klamath, Oregon, is here attending the Lumber Jubilee. Mr. Noah lived up near the old Glendale mill at Fernvale for some time, moving away in 1905, and is well acquainted with

the early day lumberjacks of Glendale.
Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Rothermal are visiting with the Sydners. The Rothermals have a very wide acquaintance in this vicinity as Mr. Rothermal was president of the Glendale State bank for several years prior to the time of selling out his interests to J. O. Lystul. Mrs. Rothermal was very active in social and community affairs. Mr. Rothermal is interested with the Glendale Lumber company in a retail yard at Stockton, California, where they now reside.

Clarence Wimer and family of Roseburg visited with the Fawcetts Wednesday during the Lumber Jubilee. Mr. and Mrs. Barney Nass of Myrtle Creek came down to attend the Jubilee and incidentally to visit with Dr. and Mrs. A. F. Fawcett. Nass worked in a lumber camp near here about twenty years ago.

James Moore of Roseburg and John Moore and family of Astoria are visiting at the home of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Moore. James is working for the Southern Pacific railroad company. John is manager for a wood and coal company. They came to attend the Lumber Jubilee as they have many friends here, having spent their boyhood days in Glendale and vicinity.

Mrs. Laura Poole, nee Daugherty, now residing at Estacada, Ore., was in attendance at the Lumber Jubilee. The Daughertys formerly resided on the Ferndale road at what is now known as the Kline place.

Playing with the Roseburg band here Wednesday were two former Glendale citizens, Ed C. Throne, who now resides on upper Cow creek, played a cornet. Ed Whitsett of Portland was in attendance at the Jubilee. He was accompanied by his mother, Mrs. Susie Whitsett. The Whitsetts are early-day residents of this city and at one time conducted a livery stable here, and later on operated a boarding house.

Mr. and Mrs. Albert Tutelman and son were Jubilee visitors. They are residing at Portland. Mrs. Tutelman will be better remembered here as Maggie Totten and before her marriage was a resident of Fernvale.

Pat Dooley, who has a mine down Cow creek near tunnel 6, was a visitor to the Lumber Jubilee. Dooley has been in this section of the country for many years. Mrs. Fred Cornell, a former resident of this city and now residing at Myrtle Creek, came to attend the Lumber Jubilee and visit with her many friends here.

NO BULL ABOUT GLENDALE PARADE

GLENDALE, May 3.—One feature intended for the big parade on Lumber Jubilee day did not show up and those in the "know" wondered why. And you may wonder what?—Likewise, why? Ralph Quine had made arrangements for a team of oxen to take part in the parade. This team of oxen is seen now and then on the streets of Glendale. It is driven by an odd character living about 8 miles up Cow Creek and Ralph thought it would be quite an attraction. Inasmuch as there are many people in this day and age who have never seen an ox team, but he reckoned not with the chauffeur of these oxen, a Mr. Leo Parks. Now Parks has a number of combinations for his teams.

Sometimes it is a straight ox team, another time it may be a cow and an ox, another time a cow and a horse, or an ox and a horse that find themselves hitched up.

Now Parks was pleased with the idea of appearing in public with his ox team as he is not adverse to attention. But Mr. Parks commenced being ambitious and ambition has ruined other men throughout the ages. Mr. Parks evidently figured if one ox team will attract a certain amount of attention then two ox teams will, or should, attract twice as much attention. That's simple, so far, but when one has only one ox team, what to do, that's the question. Now bulls and oxen look alike and no one will know the difference and having some bulls on hand Parks proceeds to try to train them to go as good as oxen should go and make a double ox team. One of these bulls had at a previous time gored Parks so that he had to be taken to a doctor for repairs. While training or practicing with the bulls one of them is reported to have become so hostile that he, the bull—not Parks, attacked a horse which had to be killed.

Well, Parks was affronted and if he couldn't play the way he wanted to play then he wouldn't play at all. But Quine decided he could not afford to take any chances on a pair of half broken vicious bulls going on a rampage on the crowded streets of Glendale during the jubilee, so all negotiations were broken off. So that's why there was no bull about the parade—or any ox team.
