HOW LARGE IS ROSEBURG?

"How large is Roseburg?" asked one of the members of the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra after the concert last Wednesday evening. When given the approximate figure he expressed great surprise. "Why," he said, "we played for 1200 people here, but in Sacramento there were only 1000 people in the audience." That is not the entire story either. It seems that seven times as much money was spent on publicity and advertising in Sacramento as was spent in Roseburg. Why should Roseburg, a city of 6,500 or 7,000 people, give such a musical organization as the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra a larger audience than Sacramento, California, a city of 80,000? One answer is that our population is made up of PERSONS. People of Douglas county are practically all home-loving, intelligent folks. Without reference at all to conditions in the other city mentioned, but as a further reason for the difference in attendance figures at the concert, folks here enjoy good music, they love flowers, keep their homes surrounded with beautiful lawns, give their children good educations—do all of the things that real happy American citizens do. Not merely a few out of many thousands, but practically all. How large is Roseburg? Just a small city as numbers go but we loom large, quality considered.

During the month of April, 65 homesteaders took up their residence in the state of Oregon. The total number of new settlers for the first four months of this year is 157 as compared with 96 the same period of 1928. Further, and of considerable interest, the 157 settlers bought a total of 4,605 acres of Oregon land investing a total of \$251,000. Needless to point out, Douglas county receives its share and more, of new settlers in Oregon. The significant fact about the above imposing figures is that something had to yield a tremendous influence to cause people firmly located and established in other places, to pick up their personal property and their money and come to Oregon, re-invest their money and decide to make their homes here. What was the influence capable of causing such a migration to Oregon? The above figures are made available through the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce and it is reasonably safe to assume that the state chamber and the various city chambers of the state are largely responsible for influencing people to make their homes in Oregon.

Don't forget tomorrow morning will be held the weekly school for employees. The purpose of these meetings is to better acquaint folks with the outstanding facts about the Umpqua Valley.

Now 614 are enrolled, and the weekly practices see bookkeepers, milliners, shop girls, taxicab drivers, editorial writers, teachers, lawyers and, indeed, entire families assembled to pass their leisure time in a way which combines instruction and recreation.
"Such has been the success of Mr. Camilleri's method not only in achieving for the chorus first position among musical organizations of an educational sort, but in refreshing and stimulating people after their day's work, that the interest of several wealthy patrons has been aroused. A building for its activities has been promised when the membership reaches 1000."

MODERN PLANT TO BE ERECTED HERE BY N. W. PERKINS

Marking the progress of business conditions in Roseburg is the announcement of a new and modern cleaning establishment to be erected by N. W. Perkins, owner of the Roseburg Cleaners.

Work will start immediately on a new, modern, home-like building on the corner of Stephens and Oak streets in this city to house the business of the Roseburg Cleaners. New equipment will be added and installed and several departments added.

The business has been located on Jackson street in the past and due to the run of business and steady increase in patronage the present location is inadequate to handle the work. A rug cleaning department will be added with complete and modern equipment for handling the largest rugs. The rug cleaning department will have a Stephens street entrance. Large revolving brushes have been ordered and a drying room which is equipped to handle 100 rugs at one time will be constructed.

An office and pressing room will open on Oak street, with a dry cleaning room and spotting department opening off the office. The management announces that modern cleaning equipment to be installed will make it possible to have a suit cleaned and pressed and ready for delivery within two hours from the time it reaches the shop.

Four or five new employees will be added to the present force with E. R. Boyce in charge of the production department of the business. Mr. Perkins states that the building will be ready for occupancy and business by July 15.

PORTLAND, May 6.—Once again Frank M. Troeh has added the Oregon state championship title to his list of trapshooting honors. Yesterday he turned in a 98 card, which, added to his 95 on the previous day, gave him a total of 193 for the two-day meet. H. M. Hollyfield was second with 191.

Troeh was obliged to do some excellent shooting to place as he did. As it was, he was not high out of the meet. This honor went to G. N. Ford of Del Monte, Calif., who shot two 97s for a 194, two-day total. Since Ford is not a resident of Oregon, however, he could not claim the state title.

Ford was high on all targets for the three-day meet with a score of 569 out of a possible 600, and 601 out of 650, including the doubles.

Troeh won the doubles championship with 45 out of 50.

In the shootoff for the W. E. Lamm trophy, L. W. G. Manning of Bend defeated P. J. Schneider of Monitor and Dr. C. J. Bartlett of Baker.

The Portland gun club won the five-man team event with a score of 937. Klansmith Falls was second with 918.

Mrs. Gladys Reid again won the women's championship.

THE BIRD OF THE WEEK

THE REDSTART

The redstart is a bird that belongs exclusively to the east in the United States. His range is from New York, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, northward. He is one of the very finest of all the warbler family.

He is especially famous for his beauty among the people around the southern border of the great lakes in Ohio and Indiana. He is a handsome little bird of life in the summer woods, as he flashes his brilliant salmon flame and black feathers among the trees, darting here and there, flitting and spinning about in the air in pursuit of insects, which he takes mostly on the wing. He not only impresses us by his beauty but, also by his amazing activity. He is like an electric bird, fairly babbling over with life. He is five and a half inches in length. Head, neck, back and middle breast glossy black; outer breast and underneath white slightly flushed with salmon. He is growing to bright salmon flame on the sides of the body and on the wing linings. Tail feathers partly black, partly flame, with broad black band across the end. Flame workings on wings. He is quite faded in the autumn. His call is interpreted, "Che-wee, che-wee, che-wee," very musical, and he is generous with it. He nests in the forks of trees. Their eggs are whitish speckled with brown.

MILLS RE-OPERATE AS MACHINE GUNS GAPE AT PICKETS

ELIZABETHTON, Tenn., May 6.—With five companies of national guardsmen on duty and machine guns mounted on roofs overlooking the mechanical and chemical departments of the American Bemberg and American Glanstoff resumed operations today after a strike that began April 15.

Company officials reported the forces in those two departments were virtually complete. Resumption of the various later department was planned gradually, officials explaining that the greater part of the 5,500 idle workers could not be used until the mechanical and chemical processes start.

Some flat fights between strike pickets and workers were reported, but no serious disorders occurred.

About 200 pickets marched back and front of the huge textile plants.
