

NEW SEATS ARE PURCHASED FOR CIRCUIT COURT

The contract for the seats for the circuit court room in the new court house were let yesterday by the county court to the Benton Planning Mill of Corvallis, who submitted a bid in the sum of \$1,110. Kilham's Stationery company bid \$1,800, A. H. Andrews company of Portland \$1,250 and McKean, Darby and Baldwin of Roseburg \$1,932.

The seats are to be constructed of vertical grain oak and will be finished in mahogany. The contract for the venetian blinds was let to McKean, Darby and Baldwin for \$1,185. J. Burnett of Portland bid \$1,175 and W. Farrington of Portland, \$1,250. While the Burnett bid was low, the proposal was for 52 inch blinds, each shade covering the entire group of three windows. The shades to be furnished by the local firm will be for each window. The blinds will be finished in ivory enamel, matching the walls, and ceilings and harmonizing with the granite finish of the exterior.

Only one bid was received for razing the present court house. The proposal was submitted by F. F. Patterson and W. V. Hurst, who offered to do the work for \$1,000 plus the salvage. The bid was rejected and the court will have the work done for account and will sell the material.

It is expected that the new building will be ready for occupancy about the middle of June. The plasterers are now completing their work, the floors are being finished, and the final interior work will be underway very soon. The acoustical plaster is being placed in the circuit court room, this plaster being especially porous, so that it absorbs sound and prevents echoes.

EMERGENCY PEAR FREIGHT RATE IN ROGUE CONTINUED

MEDFORD, Ore., May 6.—The emergency pear freight rate of 3.00 per hundred pounds will be extended by the Southern Pacific railroad to cover the 1929 movement of Rogue River valley fruit, according to word received today by the Rogue River Traffic Association from J. H. Mulchay, assistant freight traffic manager. The association recently petitioned the railroad for the extension. The old rate was \$1.13 per hundred, and the granting of the request means a saving to growers of more than \$150,000 in freight rates.

The emergency pear rate was ordered by the interstate commerce commission last year when fruit growers of Oregon, Washington and Idaho asked for a parity rate with California shippers. This matter is now before the interstate commerce commission for decision. The local traffic association last week asked similar organizations in the Hood River, Wenatchee and Yakima districts to join in the attempt to secure a continuance of the emergency rate.

The Southern Pacific railroad must secure the permission of all carriers participating in the fruit haul before the emergency rate again becomes effective. The emergency rate was to have expired June 31, next. Under the present plan it will be extended to Dec. 31, next.

ALBERT B. FALL'S RANCH BOUGHT BY EDW. L. DOHENY

ALAMOGORDO, N. M., May 6.—The 700,000-acre Tres Ritos Land and Cattle company, owned by Albert B. Fall, was sold at public auction here today to Edward L. Doheny, oil magnate, for \$166,250 plus \$2,000 interest to satisfy a mortgage foreclosure judgment. Doheny's representative, Olla Wellborn, was the only bidder.

The \$800,000 estimate of the ranch valuation was the figure given by Harry B. Sinclair's attorneys. The oil man himself a year ago told a Washington jury that he had purchased a one-third interest in the property for \$223,000 in thirty bonds a few days before Teapot Dome was leased to him in December, 1922.

M. D. Thatcher, whose estate holds the mortgage on the ranch was Fall's son-in-law.

TOY TUNNEL HELPS UNDERGROUND CITY

NEW YORK.—Bush Terminal in Brooklyn, sometimes known as New York's "city within a city," is adding a toy vehicular tunnel to

its already extensive system. Tractors, a little larger than toy automobiles, will pull four by six foot trailers through this tunnel, which will extend from one end of the Terminal to the other, connecting the various enterprises within it. Some 35,000 persons live here and all are engaged in various trades. The tunnel is expected to collect goods from different buildings so that they can be shipped out quickly in full carload lots.

"Suppose there are 17 manufacturers in the different buildings connected by the tunnel," says W. L. Sturges, mechanical superintendent of the Terminal. "If they all have small shipments for Philadelphia they can be brought together to make up one carload lot."

FATHER AND SON FEUD ENDS IN JAIL FOR BOTH OF THEM

EVANSTON, Ill., May 6.—Like father, like son. The Sieferis, pere et fils, are in jail.

"I want my son locked up," said Arthur Siefert, who is the father, to Police Sergeant Johnson. "And that goes for the old man," said Paul Siefert, 20, the son. Their story was this: The father had attempted discipline by spanking only to learn that the son, having come to man's estate, was in no mood for such antique methods of reprimand. The youth said readily enough that he had administered two eye blackings to his father, but he charged that the elder Siefers, being unable to spank his son, had engaged four youths to beat him.

During the recital of their problem, the father and son started to fight in the police station. "You're both right," said the sergeant, and forthwith he locked them up.

LOOKINGGLASS STUDENT STUDIES WOOD SEASONING

OREGON STATE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 7.—Glenn Voorhies of Lookingglass, senior in forestry, is in charge of an experiment to discover the effect of kiln drying upon the shrinkage and moisture content of cottonwood and to determine maple veneer. He is attempting to find a satisfactory drying period for each veneer and the most effective method of placing the veneer sheets in the kiln. Results so far have been satisfactory.

Veneer for the experiment was furnished by the Doernbecher mills, said to be the only concern in Oregon cutting broadleaf maple and cottonwood veneers. It is Mr. Voorhies' opinion that if satisfactory drying methods are worked out, other mills will begin to cut veneer from the two species.

USED RADIO TO HAVE ESTABLISHED VALUE

SEATTLE, Wash., May 7.—Two of the most important radio announcements of the month came from the Majestic Distributing company through word released today by Wm. J. Walsh, assistant manager.

According to Walsh this condition is similar in every respect to the automobile industry when it was in its infancy and the question of used merchandise first arose.

FAMOUS OKLAHOMA OFFICER PASSES

ARDMORE, Okla., May 6.—Buck Garrett, 58, veteran peace officer of Oklahoma, died at his home here today.

Garrett's death came just seven years after his life long friend and fellow officer, Bud Bailey, was killed in Wichita Falls, Texas. Garrett figured prominently in the capture and trial of Clara Smith Hamon, who shot and killed Jake Hamon, republican national committeeman, in an Ardmore hotel in 1920.

It was Garrett who brought the young woman back from Mexico after she had been traced to Chihuahua City by Sam Blair, then a Chicago newspaper reporter. During her trial, in which she was acquitted, Garrett served as her bodyguard.

TWO MEN DROWN IN CELILO FALLS NEAR THE DALLES

THE DALLES, Ore., May 7.—Macedonio Torres, 18, and Manuel Esquivel, 22, were drowned in the Celilo falls of the Columbia river near here yesterday when the boat in which they were sitting drifted from the shore and was caught in the swift current above the falls. Louis Martinez and Jose Jimenez, both 22, were rescued after Martinez had gone over the main falls and Jimenez had managed to catch onto a fishwheel piling at the brink of the roaring falls. Martinez went over the falls feet first and touched the rocky bottom of the river. Upon coming to the surface he grasped a dipnet extended to him by Bill Wesley, an Indian, and was pulled to safety. Jimenez was rescued six hours later when a weighted fishline was finally caught by him and a rope obtained which he fastened about his waist. He was then pulled to shore. The body of Torres was taken from a driftnet two miles below the

falls by Matt Storey and John Katerline, Oregon City commercial fishermen here for the salmon run. Esquivel's body had not been recovered at a late hour.
