Miss Mary Kathleen Wright, a pretty 34-year-old nurse, who is on duty there between 8 a. m. and 4 p. m.

Several prisoners now are ill in the hospital and Miss Wright and Dr. Morris Hyman, the prison physician, both seemed pleased to have an assistant. They said the oil man was the first registered pharmacist ever assigned to the hospital and Miss Wright was of the opinion that he would be a "fine" helper with the many duties of the infirmary.

The usual visiting day for white prisoners, who number about 200 of the approximately 500 inmates, is Friday, but Sinclair, in common with other dormitory residents, will receive on Sundays. His attorneys will be allowed to call any day.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 7.—With buyers in a mood of doldrums, egg prices underwent a decided slump today. Standard extras and standard firsts declined one cent to 25 and 27, respectively. Medium extra experienced a similar slash to 25. Current receipts took a drop of 14 to 26 cents. Medium firsts remained at 25 cents.

A peculiar twist of one big bid sent butter standards to 42 cents, the same price as extras. It was the opinion of buyers that this advantage would not hold through today's bidding. It was reported that 20,136 pounds, the largest for any day this season, went into storage Monday.

The market is well supplied with fresh fruits and vegetables. Pine apples, strawberries, egg plant, cucumbers, green peppers, green peas and new potatoes are being offered at comparatively reasonable prices.

Hog and cattle prices were advanced at the stockyards Monday because of the scarcity of arrivals, and this is likely to influence retail
