

MUCH ROUTINE BUSINESS DONE BY CITY COUNCIL

Regular Session Last Night Filled With Important Business; Theatres Ask Protection.

The city council had a very busy session last night, considerable business being brought up for attention.

A request was received from A. E. Kout, through his attorney, Carl Winbury, for permission to install a gasoline pump in front of his garage building at Jackson and Court streets. The council several months ago passed a resolution prohibiting installation of gas pumps along the highway, but in this case it was pointed out that there was a pump in front of the building for several years, and continued there until after the resolution was passed, but was removed when a change was made in the pump. It is now desired to restore the pump. The matter was referred to the street committee.

R. L. Whipple appeared before the council on behalf of the Impqua Chiefs and asked for the usual permission for exclusive concession rights during the annual Strawberry carnival, which is to be held the first week in June this year. The request was granted.

City Treasurer Thomas reported that there is a great deal of delay on the part of city residents in paying street improvement assessments, forcing the city to expend its general fund money in interest. This matter was referred to the committee on judiciary.

Several applications were received for the vacant position of night policeman. Petitions and recommendations for the several candidates were laid before the council, but action was postponed until some future date.

A communication was read from the Impqua Amusement company asking that some protection be given against tent shows. It was pointed out that the theatres are regular taxpayers and are endeavoring to constantly improve their service to the community, but that they are badly handicapped by the tent shows that visit the city several times during the year. It was asked that the council take some action to increase the license fee, the recommendation being made that the present charge of \$50 for the first night be continued, but that the charge for successive nights run on an increasing scale instead of a decreasing rate as at present. The request was referred to the committee on ways and means.

The proposed new garbage ordinance, which requires residents to keep cans, bottles, metal scraps and all other hard refuse separate from scraps, animal matter and other perishable garbage, and providing a severe penalty, was referred to the judiciary committee.

Several serious accidents have occurred there because of inability of car drivers to see cars or pedestrians coming onto the approach.

EXPORT WHEAT AND FLOUR RATES CUT BY WESTERN LINES

CHICAGO, May 7.—A freight rate cut of 5 1/2 cents to 1 1/2 cents per 100 pounds on wheat and wheat flour for export was announced today by western trunk line railroads.

The reductions were made, it was explained at the solicitation of the president of the United States and subject to the approval of the Interstate commerce commission. They will be issued with the understanding "that they shall expire on September 30, 1929, and that they shall not be considered a precedent nor as an admission by the carriers that the rates today in effect are not reasonably low under existing laws."

A statement issued by E. H. Boyer, chairman of the Western Trunk lines committee, said the reductions should only be construed "as indicative of the attitude of the carriers to assist the president of the U. S. in his program for relieving an emergency to the extent that these abnormal reductions in rates may help the situation."

The rates from the Missouri river to Chicago and from St. Paul and Minneapolis to Chicago, represent a reduction of six cents per 100 pounds from the Missouri river to the gulf. It is a reduction of 1 1/2 cents per 100 pounds and from St. Louis to New Orleans a reduction of 5 1/2.

2 NEGROES NAMED FOR WEST POINT, ANNAPOLIS EXAMS

(Associated Press Local Wire) WASHINGTON, May 7.—For the first time in many years, two negroes have been nominated to take the entrance examinations at the Annapolis naval academy and one at the West Point military academy.

Named by Representative Oscar de Priest, republican, Illinois, the only negro in congress, they are Laurence Alexander Whitfield, Claude Henson Burns and Alonzo Souleigh, all of Chicago. Whitfield, described as a Phi Beta Kappa member at the University of Chicago, and Burns are his candidates for the naval academy, and Souleigh for the army school.

The nominations were made under the privilege of De Priest, as a member of the house, to select two candidates for the academy at Annapolis and one for training at West Point. If any or all should fail to pass the physical and mental tests, alternates may be named.

There have been several negro cadets and midshipmen at West Point and Annapolis in the past, among them Colonel Charles P. Young, who graduated at West Point and later became military attaché to Liberia. He died several

years ago and is buried in Arlington cemetery.

Several South Carolina negroes were appointed to Annapolis in 1872 and 1873, but failed in their second year. In 1874, another negro came to the naval academy from Mississippi, but he left a year later.
