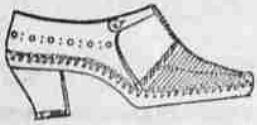

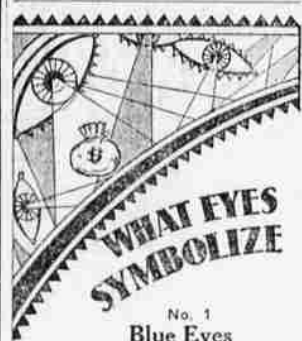

LEGION POST URGES PURCHASE FULL-SIZED AIRPORT

A resolution urging the city airport commission to purchase the full tract of land originally laid out for airport purposes and approved by the voters in the special bond election was adopted by Empqua Post of the American Legion at the regular meeting held last night.

The commission has been working upon the theory that it would be best to buy 50 acres of the 140-acre tract, which would leave an additional \$5,000 for improvements. The legion post, however, feels that it would be better policy to secure enough land to permit future extensions, pointing out that the land values may advance so materially that the cost to the city of acquiring additional acreage in the future may be prohibitive. It is felt by the legion post, which initiated the movement and carried it successfully through to approval by the voters, that enough land should be obtained to make it possible for the city to gradually add to the improvements and provide a first class aviation field. The resolution resulted in a great deal of discussion and was passed unanimously.

It was decided to observe the usual custom of cooperating with the other patriotic organizations of the city in sponsoring the Memorial day program. A committee will be named to meet like committees from the other groups and will work out arrangements for the celebration.

A committee was also appointed to cooperate with the Spanish war veterans in working out the arrangements for their department convention to be held here July 15-16 and 17.

Vincent O'Brien, who is in charge of the Junior League activities reported that all of the teams are now practicing and that some excellent games have been played. A county team, made up of the best players from the several groups, will be selected by May 20 to play at Portland.

"RIDE" GIVEN 3 GANGSTERS IN CHICAGO'S FEUD

cases against them. Last week attorneys obtained their release from the county jail under heavy bond on the promise of their appearance when the trial was called. McTurn had been trapped in a downtown hotel where he had been hiding since the day of the seven-fold murder. Scallisi, however, snatched into police headquarters one day and surrendered, observing he had been one of the dozen listed as "wanted" by the police for investigation.

End of a "Ride" The pair were found heaped in the seat of a coupe that had been nosed into a ditch near Wolfe lake, just this side of the Illinois state line, their bodies covered by a blanket. Twenty feet away officers found a third body, identified tentatively as that of Joe Guinta, another gangland habitue.

Guinta, who was thought to be the third victim, was a west side tobacco store owner and also had been questioned in connection with the Moran gang killings. All marks of identification had been removed from the bodies.

The men, police said, were probably taken for the familiar gangland "ride," shot to death with pistols or machine guns and the car ditched on the lonely prairie road. The cushion had been removed from the back seat and the bodies dumped in its place.

PROPOSED NEW TARIFF LAW IS CLOSELY EYED

a bill in the nature of an amendment to the existing act be reported.

The ways and means republicans met the specific request of the president for reorganization of the tariff commission by providing authority for him to terminate the terms of office of the present six commissioners at his will by the simple process of sending the names of their successors to the senate for its advice and consent.

The reorganized commission would be composed of seven members, instead of six, and the president would be unrestricted in his selections so far as political affiliations of his appointees were con-

cerned. Under existing law not more than three commissioners may be of the same political party.

Salaries of the commissioners would be advanced from \$10,000 to \$12,000 and their terms of office would be for seven years instead of twelve as at present. The commission secretary would be paid at the rate of \$7,500 annually.

Wool Men Satisfied PORTLAND, May 8.—The entire organization of the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers looks with pleasure upon the new tariff bill scheduled on wool, Edgar L. Ledwick, official of the cooperative, said here today. To wool growers and to importers of vegetable oils the tariff bill introduced in congress by Representative Hawley of Oregon appears to be satisfactory.

Lumbermen Complain Charles Dant of Dant and Russell, one of the leading Pacific Northwest lumber companies, said today the new tariff bill leaves much to be desired from the viewpoint of Oregon lumbermen. "On cedar lumber and shingles," Dant said, "the duty is 25 per cent ad valorem. For years there has been a demand that something be done to shut out the shingles and cedar from Canada, and this demand appears to have been recognized in the new bill.

"But the bill is of no value to this district because it does not include Douglas fir and hemlock. The tariff on cedar and shingles, however, does shut out Canadian

competition for the mills in parts of Washington."

Although the duty on fresh beef is practically doubled by the bill B. C. Darnall of Swift & Company does not greet the proposition with enthusiasm.

Darnall said such a high duty will keep beef out of this country "and cause home grown meat to go so high in price that consumption will be curtailed."

"I do not," he said, "consider a tariff that decreases consumption advantageous to any industry."
