Waits 3 Years to Die, and Is Freed



After being sentenced to hang for murder and waiting three years to die, Mrs. Catherine Casler, above, of Chicago, was freed when her case came up for a new trial. One state witness, also accused of a part in the murder, died and Loren Patrick, who is serving a life term for the slaying of William Lindstrom, cabinet-maker, refused to testify against Mrs. Casler.

College Degree's Value Shown by Survey

Worth \$56,000 More Than High School Diploma, Figured on Earning Capacity.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., May 8.—(A. P.)—A college degree is worth \$56,000 more than a high school diploma, according to statistics gathered by Dr. C. H. Glenn, superintendent of Birmingham schools. The figures are based on the Alpha Kappa Psi fraternity's survey on occupational incomes from all types of occupation and grades of education.

The statistics were compiled from 7,369 reports received by the fraternity from all states in the union. The survey was conducted to show whether a college education actually paid in dollars and cents.

"The untrained man," Dr. Glenn found, "with only an elementary education, goes to work at 14. He reaches a maximum income of \$4,450, earning on the average less than \$1,700 a year. His total earnings from 14 to 60 are about \$44,000. "The high school graduate goes to work at 15, four years later, and passes the maximum of the elementary trained man in 19 years. "He rises steadily to his own maximum of \$2,800 at 50 and then falls off to about his 10-year average. His earnings from 18 to 60 total about \$88,000, just \$24,000 more than that earned by the elementary trained boy. This indicates that each of the four years of a high school boy's life is worth \$6,000 to him. "The college graduate goes to work at 22. By the time he is 31 his income equals that of the high school graduate at 19 and continues steadily to rise. Total earnings from 22 to 60 is approximately \$144,000. The \$56,000 above the high school graduate figure represents the cash value of a college education, making \$144,000 for each of his four-year term."

UNHEEDED FROST WARNING COSTLY TO ROGUE VALLEY

MEDFORD, Ore., May 9.—Grain fields of the upper Rogue river valley, who failed to smudge Monday night, will find that their orchards have been damaged, Floyd Young, government frost expert, said today. He made a survey of the orchard district yesterday. Young issued a warning to orchardists that it would be advisable to smudge this year until the end of May, owing to the lateness of the season. The frost danger period here usually ends around May 10. The apple crop has been the chief sufferer from frost this season.

False Honeycomb Proves Deception to Bees

Ingenuity of Georgia Apiarist Enables Him to Increase Profits on Queens.

VALDOSTA, Ga., May 8.—(A. P.)—With queen bees selling for as much as \$5 each and the whole world for a market, J. W. Sherman, South Georgia apiarist, has developed a way to deceive the creatures so that their capture is merely a matter of routine.

He manufactures a false honeycomb that is so perfectly constructed that even the queen doesn't recognize the deception and makes her way to the special cell that Sherman has devised as a trap. He never fails to lure the queen from any given comb section.

Sherman says the strategy makes it unnecessary for him to scurry around the whole hive, probably injuring or killing many bees in the search for their queen.

There never are many queens. Usually there is only one in a hive. When there are more they fight. A queen is hatched from the same kind of egg that hatches a worker or a drone. She becomes a queen only when, as a grub, the workers single her out for special feeding. The same food, given any other grub, would produce a queen bee. The workers feed only enough grubs to keep the colony supplied with a queen.

The queen, mating only with the drone that flies as high, fast, and far as herself, has the entire responsibility of populating her colony. The workers do not produce eggs. Surplus drones, which neither collect food nor make honey, are stung to death by the workers.

Apiarists who breed queen bees for the market frequently take food from the comb in which a queen bee is being reared and place it in other sections, the deception encouraging the workers to feed several queens at the same time.
