IN SANTO DOMINGO

IN CONNECTION with the recent visit of Charles G. Dawes to Santo Domingo to devise a scheme of government financial reform, there is reminder that Santo Domingo owes to bankers in the United States some \$20,000,000 on which kind-hearted Uncle Sam is collecting interest for them through the expedient of supervised customs collections. This is dollar diplomacy in its full flower. If we ever get into trouble in the western hemisphere, it is likely to be because of some such arrangement as this, for the case of Santo Domingo is not unique. Our government lends its power to back collection agencies in other weak countries, too.

In Santo Domingo's case, the customs receipts were pledged by a government which amounts to a dictatorship. The people of Santo Domingo had nothing to say about it and do not like it. They chafe under such a humiliating arrangement. It leaves the government treasury as bare as Mother Hubbard's cupboard most of the time. That is why Dawes was called in to try to balance the budget. His remedy was drastic. It calls for a reduction in government expenditures of \$1,427,000 a year. That does not affect the people of Santo Domingo, however, so much as it does the government officials, who are constantly extravagant for the benefit of themselves and their favorites. President Vasquez has agreed to swallow the Dawes pill, bitter though it be. It will be a good thing for Santo Domingo, which needs to economize and pay its debts as the only possible means of rescuing itself from foreign domination.

A Los Angeles laundry answers newspaper criticisms of a recent advance in prices for rough-dry laundry with this explanation: It was the custom to accept 30 pieces of rough-dry to be done for a dollar, with the proviso that there should be two small pieces for every large one in each lot. First people stopped sending small pieces, sending only large ones. Then they began sewing pieces together, in some cases as many as three sheets or eight towels being so consolidated and sent as one piece. The laundries got together and agreed to accept rough-dry only by the pound. Can you blame them?

A new bank in New York City makes a bid for business by offering to pay bills for its depositors. The customer simply sends all his approved bills to the bank and the bank does the rest. There is no writing of checks. Now who will suggest a way to relieve us all of the necessity for making deposits?
