

HEALTH UNIT IS PLEASED WITH RIBBON CONTEST

The Douglas County Public Health association feels justly proud of the effective work done by the blue ribbon contest recently sponsored by that organization. The purpose of the contest was to check up the number of physically fit children in the several localities and encourage the children who have physical defects to have them corrected before they should cause them more serious trouble and also to remedy the general physical condition of the children.

To this point the teachers responded willingly with the county health nurse and with the cooperation of the parents and children a big program resulted.

Riddle had seventy-seven pupils enrolled and thirty correctives were made, twenty-six of which were dental corrections.

Myrtle Creek, with an enrollment of one hundred and six pupils, had fifty correctives, thirty-seven being dental corrections.

Glendale had fifty-one correctives out of one hundred and fifty pupils, thirty-eight of which were dental.

Camas Valley, having the largest percentage of these four towns participation won the prize of five dollars offered by the health association. Of its fifty-six pupils, twenty-six had dental work done and ten increased their weight. Much credit is to the teachers of Camas Valley school for the interest they have shown in this corrective work.

The principal, Mr. Harvey Park, made special trips to Roseburg in the interest of the work.

In the Roseburg schools, Fullerton school had fifty-two pupils who had dental work done. Fekler's enrollment is ninety-three. Benson school had seventy dental corrections out of two hundred and six pupils. Rose school had ninety-one dental corrections out of two hundred and sixty enrollment, making in all two hundred and twelve dental corrections in Roseburg.

The health association assisted in supplying money from the Christmas Seal fund wherever it was needed.

The contest was a new project in Douglas county, and credit for its success is due the local doctors and dentists, parents of the children, and Dr. DeWalt Payne and Miss Helen M. Atwood, of the County Health Unit. Miss Atwood spent hours and hours of tedious labor and the result was most gratifying.

ESCAPED OREGON CONVICT CAUGHT IN BRIEF CHASE

SALEM, Ore., May 10.—Charles Grant Williams, convict, was returned to the state penitentiary and locked away Thursday afternoon after two hours and a half of freedom in the brush southeast of Salem.

Williams escaped from under the gun of a guard over a prison gang dismantling the old state training school for boys by slipping around the corner of the building, commandeering a parked automobile in which he coasted down an inclined roadway for more than a quarter of a mile and then took to the brush.

He was recaptured in an old orchard near the Pringle school house at 3:30 in the afternoon by Guards Buck Smith and Orin Turner and returned to the prison.

The guards first saw Williams moving through the orchard from a considerable distance and started after him. When they next sighted him he was only about 20 feet away and surrendered without resistance when they covered him with their guns and called to him to throw up his hands.

Williams had been shot at by Guard T. C. Barnes about noon in the brush half a mile east of where he was captured.

On his return to the prison Williams was chided about his efforts to start the automobile, which he denied, and was told by Superintendent Henry Meyers that it would be a long time before he got another chance to steal a car.

As a response Williams thumbed his nose at the superintendent.

WINDSOR, Conn., May 10.—Despite the belief of a medical examiner that Walter Treadway Huntington, 21-year-old Harvard junior, had been slain here yesterday, County Detective Edward J. Hickey today was concentrating his investigation on a search for a weapon which would bear out his theory that the youth had committed suicide.

An autopsy performed by Medical Examiner Henry N. Costello convinced the physician that the student was slain by a shot through the temple. It could not be learned on what circumstances Detective Hickey based his suicide theory as the only known clue—pieces of yellow paper—contained only the name "Billy" when pieced together and was said to have shed no light on the case.

Huntington was home from Harvard college for a brief visit. The discovery of the body was made early Wednesday morning by a farm hand on the Murphy farm. A diamond ring was on one of Huntington's fingers and his clothing was not disturbed. Death had been caused by a bullet fired through the left temple. Detective Hickey after conducting a preliminary investigation declared that Huntington was alive when his body was left or thrown on the field. Persons living in the vicinity of the farm had heard no shooting during the night.
